THE VICAR'S LETTER.

My dear People,

Many thanks to you for your kind and generous Easter Offering.

During the first week of May, I shall be on my annual retreat.

This month the first half of the Christian year is rounded off with the great Festivals of Ascension, Whitsun and Trinity. In this country Ascension Day is not, as in most of Europe, a public holiday. That should not prevent Christians from coming together for worship on this great Feast, for we have services arranged early and late on that day, so that everyone should be able to get to at least one of them. Coming out early to Holy Communion is the best thing of all, for it was on that morning that the Lord Jesus gathered His disciples round Him on the Mount of Olives, handed on to them the work they were to do in His Name, gaye them the promise that He would be with them always, and then vanished into the heavenly world where He is so close to us at all times, yet reigning in glory. Going to Holy Communion on Ascension Day morning always seems to me like answering an invitation from King Jesus to a specially reserved place on His Coronation Day. What an invitation indeed! Who is going to say 'No' to that one?

Just now I mentioned public holidays. Now that the old association of holiday with holy day has almost completely gone, a reform that many Christians would like to see is a re-arrangement of the public holidays so that they do **not** coincide with the major festivals of the Church. (I would retain Christmas as a public holiday, but make the three bank holidays in the summer the first Mondays in May, July and September. Thus the holidays would be at fixed dates each year, which would satisfy most people, and parish churches would not be depleted of the faithful at the greatest festivals.)

Look at Whitsun, for instance. The first Whit Sunday was the day when the Holy Spirit came to to fill the Church with life and power, finding the disciples 'all with one accord in one place', i.e. at prayer together. Nowadays Whit Sunday is the one Sunday in the year when a parish priest can be certain that his people will not be all with one accord in one place. They will be scattered anywhere from Blackpool to Bruges. At the end of the day on Whit Sunday a priest should be feeling tired but exhilarated. I must confess that I usually feel utterly depressed on Whit Sunday evening. That is certainly not due to any physical fatigue from administering to large numbers of com-Any tiredness arising from that is municants. always forgotten in the joy of having been allowed to be the means of bringing the Bread of Life to so many souls. The depression comes from seeing on this Day of days, the Birthday of the Church, so little evidence that the Church exists. Perhaps the altars of churches at the holiday resorts are thronged on this day—I wouldn't know, but I rather doubt it. At any rate, if you are going to be away at Whitsun, do not fail to go to the local parish church. If you are going to be at home, be one of those who are 'all with one accord in one place' when the Day of Pentecost is fully come. As the old Whitsun hymn says, 'Let us not miss the accepted hour'. If one of the disciples stayed away on the first Whit Sunday, how bitterly disappointed he must have been when he heard from the others afterwards what had happened.

On Trinity Sunday, if we are, like St. John the Divine, 'in the Spirit on the Lord's day', we can peep through the door that is opened in heaven, and hear, as he did, the voice of God saying, 'Come up hither'. In our worship we are lifted up into the life of heaven as we join with angels and archangels in their chorus of 'Holy, holy, holy' to the glorious God who made us, redeemed us, and sanctifies us.

The Church Bookstall. The opening by the Bishop on April 8th was well attended, and a fairly brisk trade was done throughout the day. £17 was taken, though it was not a full day. At the Spring Fair for the Moral Welfare Association, held in the Walker Hall the same morning, the net proceeds were £113-15-1, a record amount for this event. Our cake stall (Badsey and Wickhamford) made £10-5-0. Many thanks to all who contributed and helped.

The Market Bookstall is a pioneering venture, as far as the Midlands are concerned, and we hope that other rural deaneries will take up the idea. It has got off to a good start, but it is now up to the individual parishes to keep it well staffed each Saturday, for it is certainly satisfying a need. See the respective Notes for Badsey and Wickhamford elsewhere in this issue for the dates our parishes are responsible. Taking part in it is really rather exciting.

Some people have been working very hard to bring the Bookstall into being, and in particular I should like to mention Mr. Tom Cox, who has produced the stall itself, so beautifully designed, made and fitted for the job. We are very fortunate in having so able and hard-working a person as Mr. Derek Barrand (so well-known to us in Badsey) as our stock-keeper. Invaluable work has also been done by the Rev. D. A. Smith and the Rev. Bernard Marshall, the latter having been in charge of publicity. I should like to take this opportunity of thanking Mr. R. Rayner, who has been secretary to the committee, not only for this, but for the many other ways in which he has helped me. We are very sorry to lose him from this district. Others too have worked hard on the committee. and above all we have had the unfailing support and guidance of the Rural Dean.

Diocesan Missionary Festival, June 3rd. Evesham Rural Deanery has been chosen for the honour of entertaining the whole Diocese this year for the Diocesan Missionary Festival, the second to be held. Most of our capital reserves have been spent on installing the new organ last year. Now all parishes are being asked to step up their contributions to the common purse of the diocese threefold. It has therefore become quite clear to the P.C.C. that we cannot continue on the present financial basis. The P.C.C. have accepted this as a God-sent challenge to invite the co-operation of all Church members in a scheme of Christian Stewardship. At present a committee of the P.C.C. is at work on drawing up proposals for a plan which, God willing, is to be launched in the coming autumn. In the meantime something has to be done to keep the ship on an even keel in 1961. Accordingly there is to be the usual summer fete, in which the co-operation of all of you is invited. The date is Saturday, June 24th. One preparatory meeting has been held already, but offers of help of all kinds will be gladly received by the Vicar or Mrs. Braby.
