THE VICAR'S LETTER.

My dear People,

Many of you took part in the Procession of Witness through the streets of Evesham in the summer of 1958, and were glad afterwards that you had done so. That demonstration of the Church's strength and determination to witness made quite an impression at the time. However, it was confined only to the parishes of Evesham Deanery and was therefore on a limited scale.

Do you remember the occasion? It was part of the 'Lambeth Walk' when the Bishops who had come from all over the world for the Lambeth Conference were visiting the dioceses of England to show that they and we all belong to the same worldwide Church. Soon afterwards the Bishops assembled at Lambeth for their deliberations, and this was one of their resolutions:—

"The Conference calls on every Church member, clergy and laity alike, to take an active part in the Mission of the Church. It is a mission to the whole world not only in area but in all the concerns of mankind. It has no frontiers between 'Home' and 'Foreign' but is concerned to present Christ to people everywhere.

"Each generation needs to be evangelised and to this all-important task we summon the people of God in every land."

Much water has flowed under the bridges in the three years since that appeal was made: waters not only of Badsey Brook and River Avon, but of Ganges and Congo, Yellow River and Mississippi, mountain torrent and jungle swamp. While I am writing these words, quite a number of people have died of hunger since I began the page, and several new lives have begun in this world while I am writing this sentence. There are now ten times as many living souls on earth to be won for Christ as there were on the Day of Pentecost, and every year Christians are a smaller minority.

All this would be frightening, if we were to leave out one all-important fact: the power of the Holy Spirit in His Church today. If the Holy Spirit's power cannot be seen and felt, it is because men and women are not yielding themselves to be the conductors of His energy and light. The remedy therefore lies with us His called and chosen servants, consecrated by our Baptism to lifelong surrender to His claims.

The Diocesan Missionary Festival, to be held this year in Eyesham gives us all a splendid opportunity—for three things:

- (1) to learn all we can about the worldwide mission of the Church:
- (2) to join our brothers and sisters in Christ throughout Worcestershire in bearing witness to our faith;

(3) to offer ourselves and our goods to God to spend and be spent in His service, wherever and whenever He calls.

An attractive illustrated programme of the Festival at 6d. can be obtained from me. The main time-table of the day, **Saturday, June 3rd,** is as follows:—

- 9-30 a.m. Corporate Communion at All Saints', Evesham.
- 10-0 onwards. Missionary Exhibition in Walker Hall, where coffee will be served.
- From 2-30. Assembly of Procession of Witness in Smithfield Market. (Choir will have been given their instructions. Individual parishioners look out for your own parochial contingent on arrival.)
- 3-0 Procession moves off. (No one will be allowed to take seats in All Saints' or St.

 Lawrence's Churches until those taking part in the procession of witness have entered and gone to their seats).

3-30 Festival Services in All Saints' and St. Lawrence's Churches. Preacher: Bishop Trapp (formerly of Zululand), General Secretary of the S.P.G.

(At 4-45 tea will be served in the Public Hall at 2/- per person. This is chiefly to supply the need of visitors from other parts of the Diocese, but if any of you would like tea tickets, please apply to me as soon as possible.)

Whether able to come to the Festival or not, will you all please use this prayer for the Festival-

Almighty God, who didst send thy Son to be the Saviour of the world, bless our Missionary Festival, that the hearts of many may be touched, their zeal kindled, and their understanding enlightened. Stir the hearts of those indifferent to the challenge of our time and give us all the spirit of prayer and service, and accept our efforts, for Jesus Christ's sake. Amen.
