#### THE VICAR'S LETTER.

My dear People,

I have just received the Annual Report for 1960 of the Worcester Diocesan Association for Moral Welfare Work. It is very pleasing to see in the figures for the People's Offering Fund that Evesham Deanery contributed the highest amount (£195) of any Rural Deanery in the Diocese, and that towards that excellent Evesham result £24 came from Badsey (6th highest parish in the Diocese) and £6-19-3 from Wickhamford (a very good showing from a parish of its size). That is a great credit to those in our parishes who worked so hard last year to achieve this result.

This is not to say that we can feel satisfied we are doing enough. I should like to quote a part of the Bishop's Foreword to the Annual Report:

"After reading this Report and thinking about the people whom our Workers are trying to help (and it is important to remember that they are 'people' and not just 'cases'), I am at one and the same time both elated and depressed. Elated because so many are giving time, talents and money to what is essentially Christian work, and depressed that, as the Chairman points out, so much more needs to be done and could be done if only every Church member was deeply concerned about Moral Welfare.

"We must face the fact that in many ways the Church is attempting to witness to its Master and do its work in a decadent Society, and Society is decadent because unprincipled people, whose one motive for living seems to be a lust for personal gain, use the God-given sex instinct as a means for making money. Through a thousand subtleties of novel, stage, screen, magazines and advertising, sexual curiosity is aroused and sexual experience suggested as a normal practice. Sex is divorced from its right context of home, tenderness, love and marriage, and, instead of romance, all that the adolescent boy and girl are left with is a premature preoccupation with the physical side of his or her nature. The picture which St. Paul paints in the first chapter of his Epistle to the Romans might well describe England today. I suggest that everyone reads what he said in the version given in the New English Bible, and if that does not incline you to support Moral Welfare Work, then nothing will. All this shows not only how important the work is, but the heroic character of our workers who struggle so bravely on in the face of so much indifference and frustration."

I am sure the Bishop is right. Our society is desperately sick, and the Church will fail her Lord if she cannot show the world a more excellent way. It is no good Church members turning a blind eye to the moral situation rather than face unpleasant

facts. It is up to us all to show a real concern in this matter and to back our trained workers to the utmost. Mere condemnation and sad head-shaking are as useless as they are un-Christian. Young people are entitled to our sympathy and understanding in their problems. It is far more difficult to keep one's balance as one grows up in these times than it was for earlier generations. For one thing, boys and girls are maturing physically much earlier than their mental and emotional development can keep pace with. They cannot help this: they are not to blame for it. The other two big factors are however open to alteration by older people. One is the breakdown of home discipline and training through the sheer selfishness and laziness of many parents, who let children have their own way rather than be bothered with making firm decisions. The other is, as the Bishop says, the shameful exploitation of 'teenagers' by commercial interests, just because this age group have so much more money now to spend and so little experience of wise expenditure.

Will you make this situation the subject of your earnest prayers?

Alfred Cull, an invalid for a great part of his life, was a charming man of great courage and patience. He had been affectionately known from boyhood as Bassett, after a famous W. Bromwich Albion footballer, because young Alfred, lame in one leg, showed no mean skill in kicking a football with 'Uncle Bass' was a great favourite with the other one. children. His father was the village baker. On his death, Alfred and his brother took over the bakery, until poor health obliged them to give it up. In recent years, though unable to go out, he had derived great comfort from receiving the Sacrament at home.

Mrs. Edith Emms was another brave invalid who for some time had been receiving Holy Communion at home. For the last few weeks she had been in Avonside Hospital after a bad fall in her home, and died quite suddenly. Since the death of her husband her life had been rather pathetic. crippled as she was with arthritis, but she never really gave in. She loved the church, and it was a great privation to her not to be able to attend. We give thanks for her release from suffering.

Robert Pethard was a faithful member of St. James's Choir for 66 years, and often sang also in the choir of St. Peter's, Bengeworth. He was much loved in both places, and in Wickhamford, which had been his home with Mrs. Pethard for the last part of his life. Because of a weak heart, he had not been expected to live as long as he did, but how thankful are all of us who knew him that God spared him to us! He was a friendly man, genuine and sincere in his Christian belief and practice. Such a life as his is a splendid example of faithful Christian discipleship. He was quite incapable of hypocrisy. A letter which he wrote to the Vicar and Mrs. Braby two years ago reveals the springs of his character and the warmth of his love for God. The occasion was a choir outing at which the Vicar had read out from a parish magazine of 1904 the report of the outing that year, written by Bob himself. It was a surprise that Bob was not expecting, and this is what he wrote in his letter:

"Many thanks to both of you for the kind words you said on Saturday at tea-time at Weston-super-Mare. I can assure you both I was a very proud and happy man to have tried and done something for my dear Master. I was 15 years of age then and had been singing treble in Badsey Choir for about 8 years. I started in the Choir at  $6\frac{1}{2}$ . I had to sing a hymn by myself to get in and it was 'Through all the changing scenes of life'. Anyway I believe everything I sing. I believe God is my Maker, Redeemer and Sanctifier, and He has also been my very best Friend on this earth. I am never happier than when I am singing to my Maker and always try to give 100 per cent. or my very best. I have done about 64 years singing now, and I hope to carry on as long as God wishes me to"

Needless to say, we sang "Through all the changing scenes of life" at Bob's funeral, at which our choirmen were reinforced by a number from Bengeworth. We shall miss him greatly. But we do not doubt that this good and faithful servant has entered into the joy of his Lord, and that the praises of his God still employ his heart.

Frederick Bayliss, of Bowers Hill, was rather a retiring figure on account of his deafness. He was a very hard worker on the land, and will be much missed as a good neighbour, husband and father.

In spite of her illness she was only away from church for two Sundays. The fact that she was absent at all shows how poorly she must have been. At the time of writing Mr. R. Harker is in hospital.
