#### THE VICAR'S LETTER.

My dear People,

In this holiday season perhaps a few more notes about the history of Badsey and Wickhamford will not come amiss. The last were in the issue of Noyember 1960. Here are some random jottings from my note-books.

My predecessors did not always have an easy time of it when they first came to take up residence. John Samon of Evesham, appointed Vicar in 1620, found that a certain Mrs. Izzard, wife of a Badsey farmer, had taken possession of the Vicarage (only a small cottage in those days), using force and refusing to be turned out. Sir Thomas Bygge, J.P. had her arrested and committed to Worcester Castle gaol for a breach of the peace.

Mr. William Millington, appointed Vicar after the Restoration of King Charles II, found that a parishioner, John Pigeon the Elder, had taken possession of the churchyard. The churchwardens, one of whom was Thomas Dark, presented John Pigeon in the Bishop's Court. The Pigeon family were not going to take this sort of thing lying down. Next year Thomas Pigeon was churchwarden. With his co-warden he presented Dinah Dark for having a bastard child. As to Thomas Dark, he seems to be the person (it is a very torn manuscript) presented at the same time for detaining the Parish Clerk's wages.

William Millington was a good parish priest according to the churchwardens' reports to the Bishop, but when his successor Charles Nixon came in 1677 he found the Vicarage in a bad state of disrepair through Millington's neglect.

One of churchwardens in 1623 (we do not know which) had quite an exciting time. He was arrested at the White Hart and imprisoned, presumably for some ecclesiastical offence (for he charges up to the church accounts his expenses in connection with this, including various sums paid to the gaoler). In those days churchwardens could be punished for all sorts of negligences, like failing to present Popish Recusants at Quarter Sessions.

Badsey and Wickhamford (like several other parishes in the Vale of Evesham) did not come under the jurisdiction of the Archdeacon of Worcester. Such parishes were known as peculiars. The churchwardens did not therefore have to attend the Archdeacon's Visitation. They did however have to make presentments at the Bishop's Visitation, usually every three years or so. Many of these presentments have survived for the later period after 1660, but the earlier ones were destroyed in the Commonwealth.

As well as presenting offenders (for anything from adultery to failing to pay church dues or chopping down trees in the churchyard) they had to report on the state of repair of the church and its books, and whether the people were coming to church and the parson doing his job properly. A few extracts will give an idea of their manifold duties:

"We present Robert Yeomans the servant of Thomas Willson of Badsey for not coming to church to divine service and sermons but once then mocking ye usages of ye surplesse being asked what was ye text of ye discourse scoft only and paying no dues to ye minister neither oblations nor wooll of sheep".

"Our church is well repaired the windows are hole And we have all things belonging thereto according as the enquiries aforesaid. Our church-yard is fenced part with Rayles and part otherways as it ever hath been accustomed. Our Minister... maketh use of the book of Com. Prayer as he ought to do at Morning and Evening Prayer. And for Administering the Sacraments burying the Dead and Churching of Women our Minister doth give warnings before the Sacrament and doth read the Exhortation. Our Minister hath fallen timber and hath workmen about itt to repair the dwelling house."

"Nothing presentable but ye Clarkes book wanting. Item we present Mary Palmer being an excommunicated pson having a child unbaptized for ye span of half a year or more last past, And we present Mary wife of John Bannister, for refusing to retourne God thanks for her safe delivery from childbirth she being delivered before Lady Day last year, also we present John Bugden and his wife for not coming to church."

"We present William Cotterell of Aldington for refuseing to pay towards the Charges of Casting the Bell and other Charges of the Church legally levyed on him according to other Neighbours which have all payed to our content. Item Our great Bell being Defective wee have taken him to ye Bellfounders house there to be repaired but it is not yet Done."

"Ye Churchwardens of Badsey have repayred ye Church that no pigeons can come in and likewise bought a Common Prayer Book for ye Clark."

After about 1730 these returns became simply a matter of form, with the bald statement: 'Nothing presentable'. After 1790 they ceased altogether. Apart from the attempt to impose through them a rigorous moral discipline (distasteful to us today), they were very useful in keeping parishes up to the mark in matters like church repair and decency in worship. When the Rev. T. H. Hunt came here in 1852, he blocked up the chancel door at Wickhamford, because the men on entering the church used to throw their coats and hats on to the Holy Table. The old stone font had been upturned and was being used as a seat in the chancel. At Badsev he found that the bellringers had knocked a rough doorway into the base of the tower, so that the barrels of cider could be more easily trundled into the beliry for the celebrations to which every bridegroom had to treat them, after they had rung for his wedding.

Our churchwardens have to go to the Archdeacon's visitation now. I wonder how a modern archdeacon would react to such goings on!

Harvest Festival. As you will see above, the Harvest Thanksgiving services this year will be held on the first Sunday in October instead of the last in September. This has several advantages, one being that the Family Service can be a Harvest Gift Service for the children, at which they bring up their own offerings of fruit, flowers, etc.

The adults' gifts of fruit, eggs, vegetables, flowers, etc. should be brought to the church on the Saturday, 30th September, before 10 a.m., at which time helpers will be welcome to decorate the church. After the Festival the gifts will distributed between the sick of the parish and Avonside Hospital. We shall be glad of helpers on Monday morning Oct. 2nd, from 9-30, to sort out the goods, arrange baskets, and clear the church.

St. James's Church Membership Scheme. Towards the end of September, every household in Badsey and Aldington will receive an attractive booklet about St. James's Church, with a letter from the Vicar inviting members of the Church of England to take an active part in the worship, life, and witness of their parish church. In the booklet there will be an outline of the Church Membership Scheme, to be inaugurated on Promise Day, Saturday, 28th October. The booklet, and the scheme itself, have been very carefully drawn up by the Parochial Church Council. During October a team of Church visitors will call on Church of England members in their homes, to explain the details of the scheme and to suggest ways in which people can offer their time and talents as well as money in the service of the Church.

The first opportunity of offering time and service to God in this venture will be through joining the team of visitors. For these there will be a series of training and briefing meetings on the evenings of Sept. 27, Oct. 4, and Oct. 9. Ask God whether He is calling you to join your fellow-worshippers (all just as scared as you are!) in this piece of service You can visit as one of a pair, or on your own, just as you
