THE VICAR'S LETTER.

My dear People.

You will be receiving this number during the twelve-day festival of Christ's Nativity, and I wish you all a happy Christmas. Christmas will have meant very little to us unless the Birth of Christ takes place anew in our own lives. "You must be born again" was the startling thing Jesus said to a middle-aged enquirer who had come round for a cosy chat. I don't expect any of us enjoyed being born. No doubt it would have been nicer to stay in the warm, dark, comfy womb. But we had no choice in the matter. We had to come out into the light.

A new Birth means also a Death – an end to old ideas, easy ways, former habits. No one who has come to find the new-born King can be at ease in the old kingdom where Self has reigned.

The Wise Men reached their goal because they obeyed immediately the Divine impulse to follow the guiding Star.

"True love can brook no dull delay:

Though toils and dangers lie their way;
And yet their homes, their friends, their all,

They leave at once, at God's high call."

So too with the Shepherds: "Let us go even now unto Bethlehem... And they came with haste." Towards the end of this month we celebrate the Conversion of St. Paul. "Arise," he was told, "and go into the city, and it shall be told thee what thou must do," "Whereupon," as he told King Agrippa many years later, "I was not disobedient to the heavenly vision."

Another thought comes from the Feast of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple. The old man Simeon had longed to see the promised Christ before he died. One day he felt an inward urge from God to go into the Temple to pray. He obeyed at once, and there was the Desire of all nations waiting for him. Suppose he had put off his visit to the Temple, just by a few minutes. Christ would have come, but Simeon would have missed his chance.

Looking back on your own life, do you not regret the many opportunities lost through not responding at once to some inward urge which you knew to be holy? Something that struck home once when you were hearing one of the lessons read in church, perhaps. You knew God was speaking to you. When you got home you let other yoices crowd in, other interests, concerns and pleasures, and God was not allowed to resume His conversation with you. The thing to have done was to make a definite appointment for renewing the encounter: a resolution to set aside a particular time, preferably that very day.

"Today, if ye will hear his voice, harden not your hearts". We just do not know what we have missed in the past through our sloth. If you are making New Year resolutions, ask yourself this. Is there someting which God has been urging me to

do, but which I have put off? If I put it off any longer, can I be sure I shall have the urge again? Am I hanging back in some way from committing myself wholly to Christ, who has said to me (of all people!), "Follow Me"?

Those New Year resolutions must be decisions for today, not vague aspirations towards doing something in the course of the twelvemonth.

Church Electoral Roll. This will be revised at the beginning of February by the P.C.C. in preparation for the Annual Church Meeting on Tuesday, Feb. 20th (Make a note now to book this date). If you are not on the Electoral Roll and are a baptised member of the Church of England over 17, who lives in the parish or regularly attends services at St. James's Church, you should apply for inclusion on the Roll. You do this on one of the enrolment forms which you can get at the church or from the vicarage. The forms, when signed, should be returned to the Vicar or to Mr. H. L. Hatcher, Hon. Secretary, before February 4th.

The Worldwide Church. Once again there has been an increase in the giving for overseas work through the S.P.G. boxes. In five years this has now risen from £15-10-0 to £55-2-8. Collections in church during 1961 for overseas missions came to £32-9-9. The latter is not particularly good, but it must be remembered that it comprises only the offerings of those who happened to be in church on the Sundays when the collections were taken. If it should be a very wet Sunday, the missionary societies have to suffer for it. Under the new Church Membership Scheme the giving for overseas work is going to be much more evenly distributed between the parishioners, and a worthy proportion of income can be allocated deliberately by the parish for overseas missions, without dependence on factors quite irrelevant, such as the state of the weather on a certain Sunday.

1961 overseas funds have been allocated as follows:— S.P.G. £55-2-8; C.M.S. £10-16-7; S.P.C.K. £10-16-7; B. & F.B.S. £10-16-7.

Church of England Children's Society boxes brought in £28-15-7 for the Society, also an increase on last year.

Congratulations to the box secretaries on their successful work: Miss Norah Smith for the S.P.G., Mrs. Bonehill for the Children's Society. They will gladly supply boxes for any homes which have not already got one. Miss Smith will also take orders for Overseas News (2/- a year), and for the Quarterly Intercession Paper.

The Vicar will be glad to have donations from parishioners towards the cost of the party. Cakes, sandwich fillings, trifles, made jellies (not packets), tinned fruit, etc., will be very acceptable gifts towards the tea, and should be brought to the Hall not later than 2-0 on that day.
