#### THE VICAR'S LETTER.

My dear People,

"There is a green hill far away". Yes, miles away. Years back. We're living in 1962. Good Friday? Well, of course, that's the first day of the Easter holiday.

Funny thing, so it was in A.D. 33. Holiday crowds streaming out of the city for a bit of relaxation. Cup Final? Well, not exactly. But a public execution provided the same sort of thrill for otherwise drab lives.

On that particular public holiday, something was done which shook the earth. Most of them shook their heads, as they trooped back home for tea. "Dear, dear, what a dreadful thing! Not nice, was it? Something ought to be done about it, by somebody or other".

Something had been done by somebody or other. By all of them. They had crucified the Son of God.

Somebody else, fortunately, had done something too. The Son of God had taken into Himself the malignant virus of cruel hatred and callous irresponsibility. There, in His perfectly healthy system, it had been sterilised, and robbed of its power over men.

Is 1962 very different? Is the hill of Crucifixion so very far away? Something ought to be done about it by somebody or other.

Why not you? Why somebody else? Why not let God perform His great work in you? About turn, look at the Cross, face up to your responsibility. Let Him do His mighty work in you, of dying to sin and rising to newness of life.

#### ANNUAL CHURCH MEETING, Feb. 20th.

The decision to hold the meeting in the school assembly hall this year was fully justified. It was a great encouragement to us all to have such a good attendance, there being 50 electors present and 6 young people not electors, who very efficiently acted as tellers in the ballots. There is no doubt that the Christian Stewardship Campaign has stimulated interest in the life and work of the Church.

In the joint Vestry and A.P.C.M. Mr. G. A. Jones and Mr. G. H. Stewart were re-elected churchwardens. Later Mr. P. S. Tucker was elected deputy warden in place of Mr. F. G. Jones, who had to resign during the year owing to indifferent health.

Mr. H. L. Hatcher, presenting the annual report of the P.C.C., stated that the Electoral Roll now stood at 380, an increase of 24 on the previous year. He referred to the Church Membership Campaign as having been the most important task on which the Council had been engaged in 1961, and Mr. Patrick Jones, treasurer of the scheme, reported on the results so far. 132 people had joined the scheme, promising amounts in weekly, monthly or quarterly envelopes, which, with the estimated income tax refund on covenants, totalled about £1300 a year. On the present rate of giving in the first three months, he expected total receipts of £1100 in 1962.

Mr. M. H. Harvey, church treasurer, presented the audited accounts for 1961, the general account showing a balance in hand of £107-14-7. A record sum in missionary boxes had enabled us to give more than ever before to overseas work. The redemption of £1000 Defence Bonds to pay for the organ had depleted our invested capital and this would have to be built up again. Mr. A. Lewis reported a satisfactory balance of £18 in the Parish Magazine account. Sales had remained fairly constant throughout the year at 360 a month.

The Vicar presented the P.C.C. budget for 1962, showing estimated income at £1325; expenditure was estimated at £694 for parochial needs, and £431 outside the parish, leaving £200 to be placed in capital reserve. The Diocesan Quota this year would be £175.

In his remarks on the coming year, the Vicar said one of the matters with which the P.C.C. would be concerned was the development of Christian Stewardship in time and talents, so that every member of the Church could feel there was something he could contribute besides money. Proposals would also be put forward for increasing the sense of Christian fellowship in the parish, for further steps towards Christian unity, and for strengthening Christian home life (in this Christian Family Year).

Mrs. Dore had been in poor health for a long while, and had been a patient in Avonside Hospital for the last two years. As a girl she had been a member of St. James's Church choir, Contemporaries speak of her great charm as a young woman, and this could still be seen in her sweet smile when one visited her in hospital. She bore her infirmities with true Christian resignation.

With the death of Mrs. Wheatley, after a short illness, we have seen the passing of a 'mother in Israel'. She and her husband came to Badsey in 1906, to open the butcher's shop so long associated with their name, a much respected one in Badsey. Lucy Wheatley bore and brought up thirteen children. A strong churchwoman and member of the Mothers' Union, she dedicated herself to bringing up her family in the Christian faith. She has always had a keen and prayerful interest in people, and in these last few years when she was incapacitated from leading an active life, her great delight was to sit in the window and watch the passers-by along Badsey High Street.
