THE VICAR'S LETTER.

My dear People,

I am very glad to be able to tell you that this coming autumn I shall have the help of additional staff in the pastoral care of these two parishes. With the agreement of the Parochial Church Councils, I have invited Miss Peggy Wright, at present a full-time Church worker at St. Peter's, Battersea in the Diocese of Southwark, to come in the same capacity to serve the parishes of Badsey and Wickhamford. Miss Wright has accepted the offer, and will come here in September or October. She is hoping to be ordained deaconess soon after coming to this Diocese.

Miss Wright is fully trained for this work, and is a qualified teacher. She has had a good deal of experience of work with young people and children, and I am sure that her assistance in this respect will be invaluable in these two parishes. We look forward to her coming, and pray that her work and ministry among us may be abundantly blessed.

Although we shall have the assistance of a diocesan grant, the provision of Miss Wright's stipend will be almost entirely met from the P.C.C. funds of the two parishes. A proportionate contribution from each P.C.C. has been agreed between them. Parishioners will appreciate, I am sure, that this new commitment is bound to involve a big strain on our parochial finances, and will challenge us to greater sacrificial giving than ever before. Badsey people have already made a splendid response to the Church Membership Scheme. If everyone does his best to fulfil regularly what he has already undertaken (and to give that little bit more, if improved circumstances allow him to), there will be no need to make any fresh appeal for funds. Wickhamford is to have its gift day at the end of this month, and this will be a great opportunity for dedicated giving.

Diocesan Missionary Festival, June 23rd. The Bishop has asked us all, as members of the family of this Diocese of Worcester, to make a special effort to participate in the Missionary Festival. I know Dudley is a long way from us, but when the Festival was held in Evesham last year, Dudley churchpeople supported us in greater numbers than some of the parishes nearer at hand. At any rate, a coach has been booked to take us from Badsey, Wickhamford and Bretforton, and we shall be glad to know as soon as possible the names of those wishing to join us. The cost (fare and tea) will be 7/- each. Please give your name (and the money) to Miss N. Smith, our overseas committee secretary (Badsey) or to me (Wickhamford) not later than June 17th.

We shall have to leave here about midday, as the procession of witness assembles at Dudley Technical College at 2-15. It is therefore suggested that you bring a packed lunch to eat on the journey. An illustrated programme of the Festival will shortly be on sale. Copies of the S.P.G. annual popular report "Thorn in the Foot" are also now on sale (1/6).

Christian Family Year. Organised events in the parishes will not be held until the autumn and winter months. In the meantime we can be praying for the influence of Christian homes on the life of the nation, and practising the art of Christian family living is a more dedicated way. A book I strongly recommend is "Anglicanism for Parents", by F. F. Rigby (S.P.C.K. 5/-), which is on sale at Evesham Market Church Bookstall, and a series of booklets at 1/6 published by the Mothers' Union: "The Family and Society", "The Family and Possessions" "The Family and Leisure", etc. For both parents and teachers who are concerned with instilling Christian ideals in adolescents, an excellent study is "Teenage Religion" (S.C.M. Press 8/6).

I should like to conclude this letter by thanking you all for your kind Easter Offering. Mrs. Braby and I look forward to meeting you at the Lord's Table on Whitsunday, that glorious Festival of the Holy Spirit, when God's people, "all with one accord in one place", receive the inward light and life and power which binds them in one Family.

P.C.C. Meeting, Tues., 5th June, 7-30 p.m.

Our Parochial Church Council, like most administrative bodies, now has a committee system in full operation, and the members of the different committees have each their particular jobs to do and spheres of activity in which to interest other parishioners. At present there are three main committees: Finance and General Purposes, Overseas, Pastoral and Social.

Hymns A. & M. Revised. The new books have arrived, and will be in use from the first Sunday in June. Those who have not copies of their own will find an ample supply in the church. It ought to be explained that the numbers of the hymns are not the same as in the old edition.

The New Look. By the time this is in print, the walls of the church will have been redecorated throughout, by Messrs. A. C. Hughes. This will be a great improvement and the clean appearance of the building will, it is hoped, add a new freshness to our worship.

The Churchyard. It is probably not generally known that, although every parishioner has the right of burial in the churchyard, this does not confer a right to the erection of a tombstone; strictly speaking, the erection of a monument without a faculty from the consistory court of the diocese is unlawful. In practice however, the court leaves it to the incumbent to grant permission for the erection of an ordinary tombstone which is not of unusual design, size or material. The incumbent and P.C.C. share responsibility for the maintenance and control of the churchyard; this task is by no means simple, for they have to consider the needs of the churchyard as a whole, in the future as well as in the present, and to ensure that whatever is erected will harmonise with the ancient fabric of the church, the churchyard cross, and surrounding walls, and will not be out of scale with neighbouring monuments. It is only natural that the outlook of individual parishioners wishing to erect monuments tends to be confined to their particular grave, and this wider responsibility of the vicar and P.C.C. for the churchyard as a whole is occasionally misunderstood.

The Central Council for the Care of Churches has recently issued a very helpful handbook on Churchyards, which includes a specimen ret of rules for a P.C.C. to adopt for the control of a churchyard. Our P.C.C. has gone very carefully into this matter, and has now drawn up a list of rules which are a modified form of those suggested in the Churchyards' Handbook. These will shortly be published; a copy will be on view in the church porch and copies will also be in the hands of local monumental masons. It is essential that everyone wishing to erect a monument in the churchyard should first submit to the Vicar in writing the proposed design and inscription, before putting an order in hand. (This is a general rule which applies to every parish).

Within the limits of these rules, there is room for considerable variety in design, and the last thing the Vicar and P.C.C. wish to do is to impose a dull uniformity or insist on standardisation.
