#### THE VICAR'S LETTER.

My dear People,

Miss Peggy Wright comes to us near the beginning of October to start her work among us as full time church worker, and is to be ordained deaconess by the Bishop in St. James's Church, Badsey, on Wednesday, 17th October (Eve of St. Luke), at 7 p.m. This is quite a unique occasion for us, as ordinations generally take place in cathedrals, and we are most grateful to the Bishop for consenting to come and hold the ordination here, so that many of us from both parishes will be able to take part in the service. There will be diocesan representatives and other women workers present, and a number of Miss Wright's friends and relations but, with the seating capacity increased by the removal of the old organ, there should be plenty of room for parishioners of Badsey, Aldington and Wickhamford, and I do hope to see many of you there to pray with Miss Wright and associate yourselves with her in her act of self-consecration. It can indeed be a day of renewal and dedication for us all, and I would ask you to remember Miss Wright and her ministry in your prayers at this time.

As in other services of ordination and consecration, the order is contained within the rite of Holy Communion. To those confirmed members of the Church who desire to communicate with Miss Wright on this occasion (and you are welcome to do so), I suggest that you have your tea or other meal as early as possible, and abstain from drinking and smoking between then and the service.

I have no doubt many are asking: What is a deaconess, and what does she do? I will try to answer this to the best of my knowledge, by replying to the sort of questions that are probably in your minds.

1. Are deaconesses something new in the Church?

No. They are mentioned in the New Testament. St. Paul wrote to the Christians in Rome: "I want this letter to introduce to you Phoebe, our sister, a deaconess of the church at Cenchrea. Please give her a Christian welcome, and any assistance with her work that she may need" (Phillips' translation.) I should like to echo these same words with regard to Miss Wright. There is probably another reference to deaconesses in the 1st Epistle to Timothy, though most English versions have translated it as deacons' wives. The office of deaconess developed considerably in the first four centuries of the Christian Church. She devoted herself to the care of the sick and poor, prepared women and children for baptism and confirmation, and "kept order in the women's part of the church."

2. But how long have there been deaconesses in the Church of England?

Exactly a hundred years. In 1862 the Order of Deaconesses was revived in England when Bishop Tait of London (afterwards Archbishop of Canterbury) ordained as deaconess Elizabeth Ferard.

Other ordinations followed in several dioceses. In 1920 the Lambeth Conference urged the recognition of the Order throughout the Anglican Communion. Resolutions of the Convocations of Canterbury and York in 1923 and 1925 stated that "the order of Deaconesses is an Apostolic Order of Ministry in the Church of God; the women admitted thereto are episcopally ordained with prayer and the laying on of hands; a deaconess in her ordination is dedicated to a life-long service, though the extent and manner of its excercise by her may vary at different times of her life in accordance with her circumstances".

3. Can a deaconess take services, and does she wear any special uniform?

Resolutions of Convocation in 1939-41 permit a deaconess in case of need to read the services of Morning and Evening Prayer and the Litany, except those portions reserved to the priest, and to lead in prayer. She may take informal services at any time, if asked to do so by the minister.

In church, the Deaconess has her place in the chancel. When taking part in a church service, she wears a nayy blue cassock with blue veil or Canterbury cap and with the cross of the order. At other times she need not wear this uniform, but always wears her cross.

4. What can a deaconess do in parochial work that cannot be done by any keen laywoman of the congregation?

Apart from the lifelong nature of her ministry through her ordination, and the fact that she is a full-time worker, a deaconess has been trained for her work. In the increasing specialisation of modern life, the days of happy-go-lucky amateurs are over, in Church work as in anything else. Training in theology and in social and pastoral work is essential: Miss Wright is in addition a qualified teacher. Before being ordained deaconess, a candidate must have had at least two years' practical experience in parochial work, and attends a final preparation course of one month at the Central Deaconess House, concluding with a retreat.

5. In that case, with a trained full-time worker assisting the Vicar, will not the lay people have far less to do in the work of the Church?

On the contrary, they will have more to do, and they will want to do it. The chief work of the ordained ministry in a parish, whether of men or women, is the training and stimulation of all members of the Church to exercise their ministry in the world as witnesses and servants of Christ. Our job is not to "run the parish", but to be servants of the servants of God.

6. Well, what precisely does a deaconess do?

The Bishop says in the ordination service "It appertains to the office of a Deaconess in the place where she shall be appointed to serve, in things both temporal and spiritual to minister to the welfare and happiness of those to whom she is sent;

to give instruction in the holy Scriptures and in the Christian faith, and to help the Minister of the Parish in his work of preparing candidates for Baptism and Confirmation; to assist at the administration of Holy Baptism; to advise and pray with such women as desire help in difficulties and perplexities; to intimate the names of those who are in need, sickness, or other distress to the Minister of the Parish and to be at his disposition in the work of relief and succour to the parishioners".

The Confirmation will be on Sunday, 31st March, 1963. The Vicar will be very glad to hear of adults who would like to attend enquirers' classes which will begin probably early in November.

People's Offering Service, Moral Welfare. This will be in the Cathedral on Saturday, 6th October, at 3 p.m. The Bishop will receive the offerings from representatives of the parishes, and the preacher will be the Ven. A. S. Picton, Archdeacon of Blackburn. Any who are interested, please tell the Vicar. We shall arrange transport for those who would like to go.

Son et Lumiere, Worcester Cathedral. Arrangements have been made for a party of 40 from Badsey, Aldington and Wickhamford to visit the Cathedral for the portrayal of its history in music, sound and light on Thursday, 25th October. A coach will pick up in all 3 villages, starting at the Sandys Arms at 6-30 p.m. The charge is 9/6 a person to cover the journey and a seat in the Cathedral.
