#### THE VICAR'S LETTER.

My dear People,

I am writing this on the morrow of the solemn and joyful service in St. James's Church when Miss Peggy Wright was ordained deaconess by the Bishop, and licensed to serve the parishes of Badsey (with Aldington) and Wickhamford under the direction of the parish priest.

It was a great privilege for us to take part in the ordination of our Deaconess in our own church, and of course it is always delightful to have our beloved Bishop with us. In his short, homely address he told us about the ministry of deaconesses, and that he would follow this venture in Badsev and Wickhamford with prayerful interest, as this is the first time he has licensed a deaconess in this Diocese for parochial work.

For myself, it is a great pleasure to have a 'staff' once again, not only to share the work, but the daily devotional life of the ministry, especially the offices of Morning and Evening Prayer. For nearly five years now I have been saying the daily offices alone (except for an occasional congregation of one or two), and it is most helpful to do it in company. It keeps the mind alert too. Now that there are two of us to maintain the Church's daily offering of Divine Service, almost complete regularity can be observed, except on those occasions when we both have to be absent for special services and functions. I hope that members of the laity will sometimes join us at Mattins at 7-15 or Evening Praver at 6-30.

Now that she is ordained, Deaconess hopes parishioners will drop the more formal 'Miss Wright' and call her simply 'Deaconess', just as you call me 'Vicar', which is more friendly and informal than 'Mr. Braby'. In the Order of Deaconesses she is known now as Deaconess Caroline.

As time goes on she will get to know more and more of you. She has already visited a number of homes, and I am sure you will give her a good welcome when she comes to you.

St. James's Church Membership Scheme. It is now nearly twelve months since our scheme came into operation. We have good cause to be thankful, for God has indeed blessed our endeavours. Not only have most members been really faithful in keeping up their contributions, but there has been a noticeable stimulus in all activities of Church life, particularly manifested in better attendance at worship. This is to be expected, for new life and energy are always released when people are making real sacrifices. Power flows from joyful acceptance of cross-bearing. The load is being more evenly shared than it was before. Church folk prevented from attending by sickness and other causes still have their share in the Church's offering through the fellowship of giving.

We all have cause to be grateful to the treasurer of the scheme, Mr. Patrick Jones, who puts in a great deal of hard work on it.

Now is the time for some stock taking. I said the financial load was being spread more eyecly. That is true, but it is still somewhat concentrated, and it is now a good deal heavier than it was a year ago. We have now our full-time paid assistant to the Vicar—the Deaconess. This was not within the realm of possibility before we had our membership campaign. But if we are to have enough to fulfil our commitments to the Diocese and the Church overseas in addition to Deaconess' stipend and our regular poorly, we need to extend and strengthen the membership scheme. For a parish to be feathering its own nest without regard to the needs of the Church as a whole could hardly be called Christian Stewardship, could it?

The Diocesan Quota will be further increased next year. The Diocesan Board of Finance is giving us generous aid (£200 grant**e**d towards Deaconess' stipend, £75 to Wickhamford Church repairs), and we must contribute our fair share towards the common purse of the Diocese.

I would therefore appeal to Badsey and Aldington folk who are members of the Church of England and have not yet joined the scheme to think seriously about coming in. Membership forms and addressed envelopes to the treasurer are available at the church, and I would ask all existing members to re-assess themselves (I think we all ought to do this every year). How much more could I, and ought I to give? Is my giving proportionate to what I have? After all, it's not my own, but what God has committed to me as his trustee. Rather a solemn thought, that.

A Course in Church Membership. There will be classes and meetings for enquirers, and adults who would like preparation for confirmation, on Monday evenings at 8 p.m., in the Badsey Parish Room, beginning on Nov. 12th. People already confirmed who would welcome the opportunity of a refresher course are also invited, and their participation would be a real source of strength.

Badsey people have a chance of extending their keen interest in the wider mission of the Church by coming to hear about the work and needs of the Church in South Africa, at a meeting organised by the Overseas Committee of the Parochial Church Council, on Tuesday, 27th Nov. at 7-30 p.m. at Badsey School. The speaker will be Dr. A. Ll. Spencer-Payne, Director of the South African Church Development Trust. He will be showing coloured photographs on the screen and giving first-hand news of the immense task with which the Christian Church is grappling, in one of the trouble spots of the world.

Our P.C.C. is now adopting a special overseas project for Badsey parish, to link our interest and support with the expanding schools programme of the diocese of Basutoland. Perhaps you say 'what does this mean and where is Basutoland anyway'? We shall be referring to the project again in future issues of this review, but meanwhile, come and learn something about it on November 27th, hear the most interesting talk which we are expecting from Dr. Spencer-Payne and enjoy his coloured photographs. Light refreshments will be on sale after the meeting, giving an opportunity for social contacts.
