THE VICAR'S LETTER.

My dear People,

Many thanks for all the kind messages and enquries during and after my recent indisposition (I won't dignify it with the name of illness). One of the things that helped me to get well was that through other people's kindness I was relieved of worry. Services and other duties were taken off my hands by Deaconess and neighbouring clergy, and these and all sorts of other arrangements were made smoothly and efficiently by an all-ready full-handed vicar's wife. Furthermore, my pride had some of the stuffing knocked out of it by learning I was not indispensable. A very salutary experience!

Christmas in 1962. "So you see, we shan't have a Christmas this year". Reported remark by the wife of a Ford's worker who had been on strike for a week or two in early November. No comment needed.

What does the word "Christmas" signify to most people in this Christian country in the year of Our Lord 1962? That quotation above gives us the clue. If you can't have all the usual extras and a few additional ones for luck, it is not Christmas.

The Son of Man who was born in a stable, in later years had nowhere to lay his head, and died naked on a cross, once said, "How hard it is for a rich man to enter the Kingdom of God!" One might translate this in contemporary terms: "How hard it is for the Affluent Society to get what is really worth having!"

Preparations. I wonder what the Lord Christ thinks of some of the preparations we make for His Birthday. I am sure that He who was a sociable Guest at rich men's dinner tables would not frown at our feasting and merrymaking on this joyful occasion. But if the carnival stuff is overdone, no one will hear the Chief Guest when He stands at the door and knocks, and He will be left out in the cold.

We are given the season of Advent to prepare for the Feast of Christ's Nativity, in thankfulness to God for His first coming in human flesh. We prepare for His second Coming in judgment on the clouds of heaven. We prepare for His lowly entrance into our hearts in the Christmas Communion. Whatever other things you have to prepare before Christmas, do not forget these.

If you are coming to the Midnight Eucharist on Christmas Eve, you will want to prepare by spending the evening quietly and avoiding drinks and smokes. If you cannot do that, it is much better to come to your Communion on Christmas morning, after a night's sleep.

The Family Feast. One of the saddest tendencies in recent years has been the falling off in family worship on Christmas morning itself. The midnight Eucharist has a lot to do with this, but the chief culprit is the Lord Turkey, who must be given full

attention even if the Lord Christ is forgotten. To produce the Prince of Puddings matters more than to honour the Prince of Peace. There is no harm in getting a good Christmas dinner, but for any Christian family to say they just cannot get the dinner and get to church argues not only muddled priorities but sheer bad management. Many busy housewives who do manage both, and very ably too, give the lie to this.

Where there are children, and they are not taken by their parents to church on Christmas Day, they are being deprived of attending Christ's own Birthday party. What can the rest of the day mean to them without this?

We look forward to seeing many parents and children at the short Family Service at Badsey at 11-0., and at the Family Communion at Wickhamford at 9-15. At the latter parents are welcome to bring young unconfirmed children up to the altar rails with them to be blessed, so that the whole family may be together.

Mrs. Braby, Jonathan and Mary join me in wishing you all a very happy Christmas.

May the Child of Bethlehem bless your homes.

There is plenty of holly berry this year, so there is no need to spoil a good holly wreath by sticking shain flowers in it.

"I was a Stranger and ye took Me in"

In our Bishop's letter in the September 'Messenger he drew attention to the Women Workers of the Church and the help they offer. As your Moral Welfare Worker I would like to bring to your notice two special needs.

A girl will come to the office and say—"I am going to have a baby and am not married, could you get me away to another district before anyone need know, please?".

Where are the Christion homes who are willing to take a girl in such need—maybe for a few days but perhaps for a few weeks—while other arrangements can be made? They may have been foolish, wayward and naughty, but don't condemn them; help them to see a Christian life lived; pray for them; give them companionship in their loneliness and fear, often isolation too, before they can return to their own homes again.

Very few are "bad" girls (the "bad" girls don't get into 'trouble'). Usually they can pay their way and you need not be put to great expense. BUT you will be well rewarded in mind, and you may be the means of drawing someone into the Christian family.

Another way of helping is by taking a young baby into your home, while the mother makes plans for the future. It may be persuading her own parents to have the child in their home, finding a suitable lodging or a permanent fostermother, or it may be legal adoption. Such help can also show a Christian spirit.

If only we had a rota of Christian homes to whom we could turn when the need arises. I would be very grateful to anyone who would seriously think about these two needs. I have only two families, one Methodist, one Roman Catholic, who help in this way—where are the Anglicans?

Parents' Meeting, Royal Albert Hall

Mr. and Mrs. J. Ives of Badsey represented Evesham Deanery and we give their report of the meeting :— $\,$

The meeting was held in conjunction with Christian Family Year on October 24th under the chairmanship of the Central President of the Mothers' Union.

After prayers let by the Bishop of Croydon the first speaker was the first Secretary of State, the Rt. Hon. R. A. Butler, who took as his theme "The Family and the Nation".

Mr. Butler laid great emphasis on the importance the Government attached to the family as a social unit, citing family allowances, tax relief and solid benefits as instances of this

As Minister of Education he said he had realised the need of stability, security and firm discipline in the home and also that standards taught in the home should be compatible with those learned at school.

Most delinquent and unhappy children came from disturbed or broken homes. A unit he set up to investigate this matter when he was Minister of Education proved this.

Unless helped, he said these children would in time become parents ill-equipped to bring up children or indeed to cope with their own problems. Here he forecast legislation he was preparing which would give Local Authorities increased powers to deal with problem families and help them. Mr. Butler went on to thank the Mothers' Union for its example set simply by its existence and then sought to enlist their aid in a great task.

There were in London alone, he said, 60,00 children in the care of Local Authorities, and the Mothers' Union could find a further outlet for service by fostering children, by having them in their homes as visitors or by simply making them welcome in Church and family activities.
