THE VICAR'S LETTER.

My dear People,

I shall not waste much space on the main topic of the moment—the weather. By the time you get your Parish Review, conditions may be better or worse, or the same. Anything on the present situation (mid-January) will be out of date. One comment however might be relevant. A severe winter like this one (with attendant problems of transport, power supply and plumbing) brings to our notice how much we are dependent on the material comforts of our modern civilisation. Do we thank God often enough for these things? Romantic notions about "the good old days" and the joys of simple living are not only unrealistic but ungrateful. Next time you are tempted to curse your having been born in the 20th century, or to hold forth on "these dreadful times we live in", remember this winter of 1963 and imagine yourself going through it two or three hundred years ago. Think too of roads without snow-ploughs. vehicles without springs, and operations not only by candle-light but without anaesthetics. Never despise civilisation. The Bible begins in a garden and ends in a city. Praise the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits.

It is wonderful how quickly human beings adapt themselves to abnormal conditions, even in a 'soft' age. "Business as usual" is the slogan of such times, and I hope this will apply to our fairly numerous parochial activities which have been planned for the next two months. It is a recognised thing here that we keep off the summer months for big meetings and social events, so we trust people will do their best to participate in the gatherings arranged for them in February. This applies especially to the annual church meetings in both parishes, the one big occasion in the year when priest and people get together outside the church building to talk over our needs and aspirations.

The Bishop's Course

The Bishop of Worcester is most anxious that his pilgrimage to the villages of Evesham Rural Deanery last summer shall not be just a flash in the pan. He wants it to lead on to something deeper and more lasting. So he is coming himself to conduct a Lent course in these parishes. Each Wednesday evening in Lent he will come to one of the churches visited on the Pilgrimage, starting with Badsey on Ash Wednesday, Feb. 27th. There will be a short service conducted by the priest of the parish concerned, followed by an address by the Bishop. An important feature is that it is a course for the whole group of parishes. Just as the Bishop went on pilgrimage from one parish to another, as we ourselves will go from one parish to another. It will not be sufficient just to attend the service held in our own church. One aim the Bishop has is to draw the parishes into closer fellowship with one another. A very important service can be rendered by people with cars, in offering transport from our own parishes to the other churches. I shall be glad to have as soon as possible any offers for this. I would ask drivers not to make private arrangements to take particular individuals with them, but to offer their services for a car pool. All those needing transport would be at Badsey or Wickhamford church at a certain time, and would be taken in one of the cars to the church where the service was being held. No one need then hold back through shyness in asking for a lift.

A leaflet about the Bishop's Course is enclosed in this Parish Review.

Three Suggestions for Lenten Observance.

1. Make your observance as **positive** as possible, not negative. Not so much giving up things as enriching your spiritual life. More frequent Communion, more time for prayer, more Bible-reading, more sacrificial giving, more Christian service. Try and read one book of Christian devotion this Lent.

Where any pruning is necessary, it is in order to make room for these positive enrichments. More time given to prayer will have to be taken from something else which is less essential, more giving will mean less spending on things you can do without, more spiritual reading will mean less secular literature, listening in or viewing.

- 2. Draw up a **definite rule** about these positive aims. It is quite useless to have a general intention or vague resolution like: "I will read the Bible more often (go to church more regularly) (try to be kinder to people)". Unless you have drawn up something specific, you will find at the end of Lent that you just haven't done these things at all. Your rule must be concerned with fairly precise measurements of your time, possessions, etc. "By the grace of God I will (read the Bible each day from the B.R.F. notes at such and such a time of the day) (go to Holy Communion once every week) (add ten minutes to my daily prayer time) (give back to God such and such a sum more each week than I have been giving) (attend the whole of the Bishop's Course) (visit regularly that aged person who cannot get out-agree to call on a certain day each week)". These are only examples. You will know the sort of positive rule you can make in your case.
- 3. Having drawn up your rule, lay it before God as an offering of **love.** (If you like, you can hand it to me in a sealed envelope to lay on the altar at Holy Communion on Ash Wednesday or the Sunday before or after). The object of your Lenten discipline is not self-mastery but faithful discipleship. We look with awe and wonder at the Cross, and hear Him say, "This have I done for thee; what wilt thou do for Me?" If it is offered for love's sake, your Lenten rule becomes, not a means of self-satisfaction, but a means of grace. More and more your little offering of love becomes taken up and filled with the overflowing Love from

the heart of Christ, till you are able to say: "I am crucified with Christ: nevertheless, I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me...the Son of God, who loved me, and gave himself for me."

May the Blessed bless you.
