THE VICAR'S LETTER.

My dear People,

"The problem of communication" is one of the catch-phrases in Christian circles nowdays. It frequently appears as the title of an address or a subject for discussion groups at conventions and conferences. What is generally meant is the problem of "getting across" the Christian message in the world of today. However, that is not the subject of my letter this month. I want to write about a problem of communication of a more practical and parochial nature, but no less important for the work of the Church.

It has been found very often that I have not been told of sick cases (in both parishes) because it was assumed (even by the relatives) that someone else would have told me. That sort of thing easily happens when no one has any particular responsibility in the matter. I admit (to my great sorrow and shame) that there have been occasions when I have been told, and have forgotten. My only excuse is that sometimes after Sunday evensong, for instance, I get quite a number of different verbal messages and fail to keep them all in my head. My memory is a very poor one, and I would ask people informing me at church of sick cases, etc. to be so kind as to write down the name on a piece of paper and hand it to me. That doesn't mean you can't talk to me about it as well.

The important thing is that we should have some system whereby Deaconess and I may be kept fully informed about cases of illness, new-comers to the parish, and other matters of pastoral concern. Both P.C.C.s have given consideration to this question, and have decided to appoint "road stewards" (to borrow a name used in many other parishes). Some are Parochial Church Councillors, others are not. They would not wish to be thought of as V.I.P.s or a sort of corps d'elite. It is simply a matter of choosing someone in each street, or part of one, who can conveniently contact the Vicar or Deaconess, and so that people may know which neighbour to inform immediately about sickness, etc.

Afterwards we all danced in the School Hall until 10 p.m. a pleasant end to an interesting day.
