My dear People,

With this month's magazine you will receive a free copy of the "Diocesan Messenger" in its new form, i.e. as a newspaper instead of a leaflet. After this month, however, it will cost 3d. a copy. We cannot afford to give it away with the Parish Review as we used to do when it was a leaflet. Accordingly we have enclosed in your copy of the Parish Review an order form, for you to state whether you would like to have the Diocesan Messenger regularly with your Parish Review, paying an additional 3/- a year. The magazine distributor will call again later this month to collect your annual subscription to the Parish Review and your order for the Diocesan Messenger, if you would like it. If you wish to order it, please do so not later than the middle of the month. The Bishop's monthly letter to his people will be in the new Diocesan Messenger. It is a pity that it will not perhaps go into so many homes as it did when we had it in leaflet form. It seems however that some parishes (not ours) have criticised the old Diocesan leadet, and so the Bishop is trying out the newspaper idea. I do hope that many of you will take the Diocesan Messenger in its new form, if only to read the Bishop's letter.

Anglican-Methodist Report

I wrote about this last month, and have since been expounding the main theological considerations from the pulpit during Advent. This is only by way of providing talking points for group study and discussion at a series of joint meetings for people of both parishes on weekday evenings in Lent, some to be held in Badsey, some in Wickhamford. So as to help people who have regular engagements on a particular weekday evening, we shall hold these weekly meetings on different days of the week (sometimes a Tuesday, sometimes a Wednesday, sometimes a Thursday). The last two meetings will be held jointly with Methodists. A full programme will be given in the February number of the Review. Later in the year the Bishop will be sending to each P.C.C. a series of questions on the proposals contained in the Report. We should be able to give careful and considered replies to these questions if we have conscientiously attended the meetings and thought and prayed together about this important matter.

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

This will be observed by Christians of all communions from Jan. 18 to 25 as usual. Look out for Evesham's special plans in the local press. The main item will be a big public meeting on Wednesday, Jan. 22, in the Public Hall. The chief speakers will be an Anglican, a Roman Catholic, and a Baptist.

The Chairman will be the Headmaster of Evesham County Secondary School.

May 1964 bring ever closer and deeper unity between Christians, not only in the world at large, but in our Church of England, between our two parishes, and within the Christian fellowship of each congregation.

Nativity Play. This will be presented in church at Evensong on Sunday, 5th January, 6-45 p.m., by children of the Church. We have asked the producer, Mrs. Harding, to contribute a short note about it. She writes:—

"The play is an improvisation by the children of the Christmas Story. We hope that the underlying themes of the work - worship and service - will lead us all to think more deeply of the true meaning of the Birth of Christ.

The basis of the improvisation has been the teaching of Christ as summarised in His two Commandments.

In their work, the children are attempting to re-create the wonder and joy of those privileged to receive the first news of the Birth of Christ. Together with the first wondering and worshipping Jews and Gentiles, they show us also the questionings of our own twentieth century society."

It is clear from Mrs. Harding's description that the children will not just be repeating somebody else's ideas from a written script, but excercising their imagination and quite informally presenting this great theme in their own way. All of us have valuable things to learn from children's expression of their own understanding of spiritual truths.

Friends' Meeting House. Ever since services and meetings ceased to be held at the Meeting House, Chapel Street, the Society of Friends have been anxious that the building should continue to be used for Christian-church work, but no other religious body seemed at first willing to take over the premises In recent months the P.C.C. have been negotiating with the Society of Friends for a tenancy of the building, and we are glad to report now that the Friends have agreed to our having its use for church purposes at a very moderate rent, the P.C.C. being responsible for its upkeep, and to sub-let to the Salvation Army, Evesham Corps, who have also applied for a limited use of the building. The agreement is to run in the first instance for one year from 1st January, with the option of a five-year lease from Jan. 1965 if we want to continue.

The arrangement should be of real benefit to the parish. The Church has always needed a building near the parish church for meetings and other activities such as the Sunday School and Youth Fellowship; it will be possible to cater on the spot for meetings and social gatherings after church services, Quiet Afternoons, etc. On the other hand the services and meetings of the Salvation Army will meet the needs of many Christians of the Free Church tradition, who have at present present no place of worship in Badsey.
