THE VICAR,S LETTER

My dear People,

You will be glad to see that the large amount of material this month does not allow me to spread myself as usual in my letter. (Nod of approval from the compositor).

I must however mention one seemingly distant event which needs careful preparation in the months ahead. I have just received the date on which the Bishop will next come to administer Confirmation: Wednesday, 7th April, 1965, at 7.30 p.m.

Deaconess and I would like to start receiving now the names of intending candidates for the preparation classes which will begin in the autumn. Needless to say, if anyone wishes to be confirmed has not been attending church regularly in the past, he or she must start doing so immediately.

Some of you may have seen the recent "Meeting Point" programme on Confirmation, in which the Bishop of Hereford and others took part. In the studio were a number of young people who been confirmed in recent years. One boy of 14 said he had been confirmed at his parents' wish although they did not attend church themselves and he had not done so before he started classes. He admitted he had only been to Communion once since his confirmation and had then lapsed completely. The experienced panel seemed generally agreed that the best age for confirmation is in the middle or late teens when a young person is able to make a responsible decision, but where a child has grown up in a church-going family an exception may be made for an earlier age. All thought that the laity had an important part to play, not only in the follow-up after confirmation, but even in the preparation itself.

Let us all think seriously about this, and pray not only for the preparation for our next confirmation, but for those who were confirmed last year. I shall be discussing the coming preparation period with the P.C.C.s.

We are most grateful for this handsome addition to the necessary furniture of St. James's Church. In the past, whenever the Bishop has visited us for a confirmation or some other occasion, or a dignitary has come to preach, we have had to borrow a domestic chair (from Seward House!) The memorial chair has been beautifully made by Messrs. J. W. Pyment & Sons, of Chipping Campden, who made the present church pews and restored the 18th century panel-ling which now adorns the walls. The inscription on the back of the chair reads: "A.M.D.G. May Sladden 1879-1959, Kathleen Sladden 1881-1953,

loved this church." They certainly did, and it is good to have in the hallowed building such a gracious memorial to their devotion.

Village Nursing Comforts Fund. The past members of Badsey Red Cross have formed the above Fund, with the object of purchasing further nursing aids for the use of residents in the three villages. Equipment in hand at present: -2 Dunlopillo mattresses, 2 3ft, 6in. bedsteads, 2 commodes (1 armchair), 1 wheelchair, 1 aircushion, 1 bed cradle, 1 flock mattress (single size). Anyone wishing to borrow any of this equipment can do so, free of charge.

We are hoping to get more nursing comforts, and hope the Fete on June 27th will help us to do so.

We began Saturday with Holy Communion, and after breakfast Mr. M. Meikle, lay delegate from Worcester Diocese at the Anglican Congress at Toronto, gave an enlightening talk about a new look at the Anglican Church in the ecumenical setting.

After a break the Rev. Donald, Superintendent of the Methodist Church, Worcester Circuit, spoke of the new efforts for unity taking place between the Churches today. We had the afternoon free to explore Cropthorne

and the surrounding countryside.

Evensong was followed by a talk about the choice of careers by Miss E. Yanovsky, after which we spent a social hour enjoying ourselves. Prayers were then said

and we retired to bed.

At 8.0 on Sunday morning we joined in Holy Communion. After morning prayer in the chapel Dr. P. C. Moore, Vicar of Pershore, answered the questions which had formed over the weekend's discussions.
