THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

I do not often intrude a personal note, but this month I ask you to join me in thanksgiving for twenty-five years in the priesthood. I was ordained priest on 17th December, 1939, in St. Paul's Cathedral by Dr. Geoffrey Fisher, who had just become Bishop of London; I had been made deacon by his predecessor, Dr. A. F. Winnington Ingram, on 18th December, 1938. I hope some of you will be able to join me in the celebration of Holy Communion on 16th December, the Ember Wednesday, in special thanksgiving (or, if unable to come then, on Sunday morning 20th December: Badsey 8 a.m., Wickhamford 10 a.m).

My call to the ministry came quite clearly after a few years of indifference (and intellectual distaste) towards the Christian religion. Many of us pass through this sort of phase in youth, but if there has been a steady course set by Christian parents, as there was in my case, the compass needle stops wobbling and comes to rest on the magnetic pole.

Happiness is an elusive thing that can never be found by seeking it as a goal in itself: it comes as a byproduct of giving oneself unselfconsciously to some absorbing task, cause or person. I can enthusiastically recommend the life of a Christian priest for the deep happiness it brings, day by day, in spite of all the frustrations and failures. Dr. Johnson said: "Sir, the life of a parson, of a conscientious clergyman, is not easy. No, Sir, I do not envy a clergyman's life as an easy life, nor do I envy the clergyman who makes it an easy life." Maybe it is not so easy to take it easy nowadays as it was in Dr. Johnson's day, and the temptations of a parson today are of a rather different order. But enviable or unenviable, it is immensely rewarding (in the non-pecuniary sense). That is, as I said, a by-product, not the object. The happiness has come through God's love manifested in many dear souls whom I have been privileged to serve, and from whom I have learnt so much. Thanks be to God.

Visit of the Dean

I want to draw your attention to two special events arranged for this month. On Tuesday, 1st December, we are privileged to have a visit from the Very Rev. R. L. P. Milburn, M.A., Dean of our Cathedral Church. The Meeting is to be in the Parish Room, at 7-15 p.m. The invitation to the Dean was from Badsey P.C.C. but it was felt that members of Wickhamford P.C.C., and others interested from both parishes, would like to have the opportunity of hearing him, so this will be an open meeting, The Dean's subject will be "Church Life in the Victorian Age", on which he is an acknowledged authority.

Nativity Play

The other booking which I feel sure will be appreciated is of the Globe Players of Stratford to perform their annual Nativity Play in Badsey Church on Thursday, 17th December, at 8 p.m. Each year they go to different parish churches, and had been booked for Bretforton that evening. Unfortunately for Bretforton people, their church cannot be used, as an emergency restoration of the roof is under way, for which they have to raise £6,000. Their misfortune is our advantage, as the Globe Players will now come to Badsey instead. We have therefore invited Bretforton parishioners to join Badsey and Wickhamford people in Badsey Church that evening. The only charge made by the Globe Players is £3-5-0, for hire of costumes from the Royal Shakespeare Theatre. Admission to the performance in church will be free, but there will be a collection, and I very much hope there will be a balance after the expenses have been paid, which we can hand over to Bretforton Church for their Roof Fund. Information

about the Nativity Play and the Globe Players is given after this letter.

THE NATIVITY PLAY performed by THE GLOBE PLAYERS

The Play.

The Nativity Play performed by the Globe Players of Stratford-upon-Avon comes from the mediaeval Coventry mystery cycle fostered by the ancient Guild of the Shearmen and Tailors and probably dates from the 13th Century. Originally it was played as part of a mobile pageant, each episode of which was staged on a horse-drawn cart and repeated at various stopping points in the city.

The Play tells the story of the Nativity in homely, not to say earthy, language appealing then, as it still does, to the practical Christianity of the audience. The simplicity and overwhelming beauty of the lines have a power to move the cast and audiences alike.

In production the Play is kept as simple as possible, partly due to the necessity for suiting the production to the limits imposed by the varying architecture of the different Churches in which it is played, but also in order to preserve the direct simplicity of the Play itself

order to preserve the direct simplicity of the Play itself. The production is dressed in mediaeval costume, hired from the Wardrobe of the Royal Shakespeare Theatre, and a number of the carols sung as part of the performance date from the same period.

The Globe Players

This amateur company was formed in 1950 by Captain Henry Clarke, at that time the House Manager of the Shakespeare Memorial Theatre and although several productions of Nativity Plays were presented between that time and 1958 the first tour of this particular play took place in the latter year, since when it has been an annual event. For some years it has been the practice to give the performances on eight consecutive evenings at different Churches and at the conclusion of this year's production the play will have been performed 47 times at a total of 33 Churches.

Artificial Flowers. This subject has to be mentioned annually, in the hope that hurt feelings may be saved, if the position is made clear before any harm is done. Artificial flowers (except the traditional Flanders Poppies which have a recognised symbolism) are not allowed in Badsey and Wickhamford Churchyards. At this time of the year, when fresh flowers are expensive and may be spoilt by frost, it is a happy tradition to place evergreens, berries or everlasting flowers on graves. It spoils a good holly wreath, for instance, to stick bogus flowers into it. The significance of real flowers or evergreens is that they symbolise the Christian hope in the Resurrection, wheras sham flowers not only suggest despair, but look subtopian and out of place in a setting of green grass and brown earth.

The care and proper ordering of the churchyard are the responsibility of the incumbent and the P.C.C., the churchyard itself being the freehold property of the incumbent. It is therefore quite as much their right and duty to regulate what shall be placed in the churchyard as what shall be placed in the church.

With rapidly failing eyesight and other infirmities, the "burden of the flesh" had been very heavy for Mrs. Griffin since her husband's death, yet she remained cheerful and patient to the end, appreciating all the care of her family for her but trying to carry on in her own home as long as she could. There she received the Holy Sacrament two or three weeks before her death. We thank God for her release from all the limitations of this life, though she will be much missed.

It is many years since Mrs. Minnie Bell lived in Badsey, but she was affectionately remembered here and quite a number of old Badsey friends attended her funeral.

Mrs. Harwood's health and vigour so remarkable up to her 90th birthday in April, seemed to have suddenly collapsed after that, and she had spent the last few months in hospital, the shadow of her former self. Perhaps the effort of keeping so alert in body and mind had been more costing than any of us realised. She had been totally blind for a good many years, yet always seemed patient and unruffled. She was a delightful person to talk to, with her wonderful memory for past days and people. As a girl she belonged to the church choir, which processed on alternate Sundays to Wickhamford to sing the morning service there. She must have joined at an early age, for she could remember singing from the west gallery in Badsey Church before its removal in 1885. She was a devout communicant, and for some years had been receiving the ministrations of the Church at home.

May the souls of the faithful, through the mercy of God, rest in peace.
