My dear People,

As we go to press the whole nation is in a state of subdued suspense while the greatest Englishman of our time lies dying. As Winston Churchill united us in the days of his vigour and strength, so now he consolidates us in his hour of weakness. In these days political strife is muted, and there is once more a sense of solemnity and high purpose as in 1940, and again at the Coronation in 1953. No doubt the mood will quickly pass, but please God it may inspire some lasting resolve to live more worthily of our nation's heritage and calling. So much that is petty, trivial, and downright wicked in our present way of life is seen for what it is, when we contemplate the last struggle of the hero who embodies the greatness of our finest hour. In spite of faults of character and quirks of temperament, there is a strange magnetism about this man whom God raised up to be our deliverer. May God's holy Name be praised that He sent us such a leader, and may He have mercy on us all.

"No Small Change"

That is the title of the Anglican Study Course which 60 per cent. of the parishes in this country (our own included) have undertaken to do in Lent. The title is capable of more than one meaning, as we shall see when we get going on the course.

Our arrangements are not yet complete, as the material and detailed information on the course has been slow to arrive (I have not yet received it at the time of writing). I can however tell you this. The leadership of the course is to be by lay people. In informal groups those taking part will try to find the answers to certain questions about the parish in relation to itself, its neighbours, the world, and God's people. There will be certain visual and audial aids supplied - filmstrips and recorded commentaries - but much of the material will be collected by the groups as they go along. It is really going to be quite an exciting business.

Unfortunately I am not able yet to announce on which evenings in Lent the course will be held, but we shall try to arrange it to suit as many people as possible.

Christian Unity

I have just returned this evening from the Christian Unity Rally in Evesham. The subject was Worship. Here are a few quotations from the visiting speakers which give food for thought.

Canon R. L. Hussey (Anglican): "The chief end of man is not to glorify God and enjoy Him for ever, but to glorify God and give **Him** joy for ever".

"Our private worship is a rehearsal in which we practise on our separate instruments in order to play our part worthily in the full orchestra. When we criticise the services at church, we should ask whether we have done our homework properly".

The Rev. W. H. Bridge (Methodist): "There is not enough of the victory and joy of the Resurrection in our worship".

Fr. Crichton, of Pershore (R.C.): "It is the unconscious acceptance by Christians of disunity which is scandalous".

"So long as we cannot go to the people of this country as a united body to proclaim the Gospel, so long will the message of Christ go unheard."

Only a few of the stimulating things that were said at a truly inspiring meeting.
