THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

I am writing this on Easter Monday, so my thoughts are still full of the joyful Easter services and the beauti-

ful floral decorations in both churches.

One highlight in my mental picture of yesterday is the Easter Communion in Wickhamford Church—the church crammed full (of parishioners not visitors) as it has not been at Easter for several years. Including the sick there will have been 72 communicants. Communicants at Badsey will have been round 160, about average, but a good many families are away.

I want to express my gratitude for the generous

Easter Offerings in both parishes.

My thoughts also fly back often to our Bishop's visit for the wonderful Confirmation and Holy Communion service in Badsey Church on 7th April, the crowded church, the 150 communicants, the friendly social gathering afterwards (with such excellent catering by members of both P.C.C.'s). Several visitors have remarked on the pleasant family atmosphere.

On Palm Sunday morning a few days later Badsey Church was crowded again for the Family Eucharist at 10 a.m. with 63 communicants (a good start for this new arrangement). It is about the experiments in the Sunday morning services in both parishes that I now want to

write.

Wind of Change

Badsey and Wickhamford have been rather a backwater as far as the liturgical movement is concerned. The fact that the pattern of our Sunday morning worship has not changed in the last seven years must be laid at the door of a conservative-minded vicar who has failed to give a lead in a new direction. I have been inclined to make too much of the difficulties of fitting in services for two parishes. After one has been in a place for a while one tends to get into a fixed groove: it is too much trouble to alter arrangements which have worked well in the past, until one suddenly realises they are not now working at all!

New Pattern of Worship

Now at last we are going to have a morning Parish Communion in each church, although it will be only once a month at present. One request at the "No Small Change" meetings was that there should be a greater participation of the laity in the services. It is absolutely right that this should be. Those who were present at the Family Communion at Badsey on Palm Sunday saw a whole family (except one son who was in the choir) bringing up the elements from the back of the church at the Offertory (bread, wine, water and alms). We hope to repeat this in the future, with different families taking turns. The offering of the bread and wine (and money) at the Offertory signifies the dedication of our work and its rewards to God. God accepts man's offering and uses it to fill with his own life and power (in the Consecration) and returns it to us to be shared (in the Communion).

We hope too to arrange for a layman to read the Epistle. The Gospel will be read from the chancel step instead of within the sanctuary. (Don't be surprised if sometimes at Evensong you hear a lay man or woman taking the Occasional Prayers, from the nave).

In Wickhamford we have now for nearly two years been bringing the altar down into the chancel at major festivals, and turned it table-wise as in Elizabethan times so that the manual actions can be seen at the Consecration and the communicants can kneel round the Lord's Table. The Epistle, Gospel, Absolution, Sursum Corda, etc. have been spoken at the chancel step. We shall extend these arrangements to the monthly Parish Communion on the 3rd Sunday as well as the Festivals. Admittedly the arrangements for receiving Communion are somewhat makeshift at present, and we hope to devise something a little more convenient.

Children at the Eucharist

Now a word about the presence of children at these services. It is most important that children should grow up in the family worship of the whole Church, and especially in the Lord's own Service which He ordained. If children's worship is always kept apart from adult worship, with separate children's services all the time, when they are older they tend to think of it as something they have grown out of—but do not want to participate in adult services because they are unfamiliar to them. We are coming to see these days that segregation for worship in age groups is as far as possible to be avoided as any other kind of apartheid.

There is also the fact that the Holy Communion is a service in which actions are performed and things done. This holds children's attention and interest much better than the kind of service where there is only speaking and listening.

But above all the Parish Eucharist provides the opportunity for whole families to worship together at the Family Feast. Parents will be relieved of the care of the younger children after the Creed (unless they want to keep them with them). Deaconess will take them out to the Meeting House or Memorial Hall (as the case may be) and look after them until the parents are ready to collect them after the serivce. I must apologise for wording the notice in an ambiguous way at the Badsey Family Eucharist last month, giving the impression that only the young children without parents present were to go out. I can assure parents that it is intended that they shall be relieved of the young children unless they expressly wish to keep them with them.

Holy Thursday (May 27)

Finally, may I remind you all of the importance of observing Ascension Day, that great feast which because it falls on a working day is apt to be neglected. There are early celebrations of Holy Communion at both churches.

SUNDAY SCHOOL TEACHING

Our Sunday School Teachers undertake an important piece of work on behalf of us all. Their aim is always to bring the children of their class to a knowledge of our Lord and so help them to respond to His love and full service. Every teacher hopes that the children will one day become full worshipping members of the Church and teachers know that their example is vitally important. Even when children come to Church with their families, it is of the utmost importance to them to see their own Sunday School teacher there.

During the two training weekends held at Badsey, our young student teachers had the opportunity of discussing the many implications of Sunday Teaching, as well as learning something of various teaching techniques, class management, the using of visual aids and the different characteristics of the three main age groups and the children's needs.

This simple teaching course is part of the Diocesan Student Teacher Scheme. Penelope Betteridge, Mary Braby, Heather Davies and Isabelle Gresty have completed the course on the Creed and all four gained a first class grade on their examination papers. Most of the teachers have been very busy making teaching equipment which will be shown at the Diocesan Festival in May.

The Diocesan Children's Council hope that young people wishing to teach in Sunday School will join in this training scheme. Teaching involves a great deal of

preparation and we are very glad that we have some young people who are willing to undertake this work and to give of their time to prepare for their task. Diocesan Sunday School Teacher's Festival: May 15th. C.P.W., Dss.
