THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

There must be very few places in the world which commemorate a hero as their very own, through the accident of his having met his death there in battle. James Wolfe is surely more honoured in Westerham than in Quebec, and Horatio Nelson at Burnham Thorpe than on Cape Trafalgar. Yet Simon de Montfort, a French immigrant who probably never spoke a word of English in his life, will always be linked with the place where he chose to spend the night, only to find next morning like many a modern motorist, that Evesham is bottlenecked. On this occasion the bottle was completely stoppered. Simon chose to die fighting rather than yield to his enemies.

Avon-bound Evesham had caught the great Earl in its trap, like a bee in a snapdragon, and, as if to make amends, has ever since honoured him as a local saint. His barbarously mutilated remains were reverently buried in the Abbey Church, and when the times became more propitious his shrine was visited by thousands of pilgrims.

Earl Simon embodied the principle, newly rediscovered in those tyrannous times, that government exists for the sake of the governed. It is for this that we chiefly honour him today. He had been inspired and influenced by the ideals of a Christian commonwealth which were being put forward by certain Church leaders and thinkers and Franciscan friars in the England of that day. Such an idea (that government exists not for the governors but for the governed), a commonplace to us today, seemed utterly subversive at the time. Though this liberalising movement was Christian in origin and support, the more old-fashioned kind of churchmen, particularly those who had been used to unconditioned authority, found it hard to accept. Thwarted at every turn by the conventionally pious put perfidious king, betrayed in the end by self-seeking colleagues, Simon failed to keep a grip on his patience or the situation. Like most great leaders, he was a difficult man to work with; like most great reformers, his confidence in the rightness of his cause blinded him to the obstacles in the way. He was not always a good judge of character, failed to make allowance for the weaknesses of lesser men, and underestimated the power of evil in the human heart.

The Battle of Evesham seemed to signify the utter defeat, not only of Simon, but of all that he had stood for. Yet Simon had blazed a trail which was to be followed by the victor of Evesham himself, the prince afterwards known as King Edward I, who had been Earl Simon's pupil and admirer (though he would never admit it in later years). Evesham therefore is a symbol of representative

government—where the martyr's blood was shed which was to be the seed of parliamentary democracy.

Evesham sent two burgesses to the Model Parliament of Edward I, and one of these two had as his surety a certain Robert de Badsey. So perhaps we can say that from the start Badsey had a finger in the parliamentary pie. I am sure, at any rate, that the people of Baddesei, Aldintone and Wykewane will want to take part in the Simon de Montfort celebrations of 1965. We are all invited to join in the united service of commemoration in the Abbey Park on Sunday afternoon, 18th July, at which the Archbishop of Canterbury will preach. Here we shall offer profound thanksgiving to Almighty God for our Christian tradition in English government, and for the heroes and martyrs to whom, under God, we owe so much of the freedom in which we live.
