THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

One of the things most of us admire about the Roman Catholic Church is the well observed discipline of its members with regard to public worship and the devotional life. Sometimes we in the Church of England feel we might be better for a more imposed discipline in this respect. We are thankful for our traditional freedom, but we know that freedom only makes for weakness and ineffectiveness unless there is an accepted inward discipline arising from a strong corporate sense. It is really a much harder path that we have chosen, for it is easier to keep membership rules when they are clearly defined and you know that the alternative to keeping them is forfeiture of membership.

Take for instance the observance of Holy Days which do not fall on a Sunday. Roman Catholics make great personal sacrifices to go to Mass on those days, some of which are called Days of Obligation. In this simple obedience the Church acts corporately to honour God and to witness to his sovereignty over all life. With us Anglicans it is too often regarded as a matter of individual preference or inclination ("I rather like that sort of thing", "I don't hold with it", or "I haven't time for that"). It is the same with the observance of days of. fasting or abstinence, although they are enjoined in the Book of Common Prayer, which sensibly leaves fas-ting and abstinence undefined but expects us to impose some sort of special discipline on ourselves on those days.

The Prayer Book likewise has a "Table of all the Feasts that are to be observed in the Church of England throughout the Year". It leaves no doubt as to how those feasts are to be observed, by providing a special collect, epistle and gospel for the Holy Communion on each of those days. Our Church does not say, "You are obliged to go to Holy Communion on those days", but it expects us to make every effort within our power to do so.

It is not possible on every holy day to arrange celebrations of Holy Communion in both our parishes, though we always do for the more important ones (e.g. All Saints Day this month). It is not possible to arrange a time which will suit absolutely everyone. I shall always be glad to consider requests for additional services on such days if those who request them really intend to make use of them. But the danger of a multiplication of services to suit individual cases (and this applies to Sundays as well) is that we lose the corporateness of the family of God being together at one time.

In fact, isn't this our real failing in the Church of England? We think of our own individual souls all the time instead of the Church. "How often do I need to make my communion for the good of my soul?"?, "Ought I to go if I don't feel in the mood for it?" We look at it in this subjective way instead of as members of the Body of Christ. How could our own bodies function if the limbs each moved according to their own whims and supposed needs?

The Church Calendar is given us not just as "something rather interesting if one likes to know about the old saints and all that sort of thing". It is the fixture list for our team, and our Captain expects us not to let the side down by absenteeism. Nor would we wish to disappoint the great unseen cloud of witnesses who have fought the good fight and are there to cheer and en-

There are some parishes in England (not necessarily large ones) where the goodly number of communicants on holy days in the week is a stirring sight. Would that might be so here! When I first came to Badsey, there was a staunch group of dependable communicants who never missed the holy days (or Wednesdays when there was no holy day in the week). Most of them have now been called to higher service or are prevented by infirmity or age from attending church. Not many have filled the depleted ranks. I am sure that many could, if they would put the Church first and their own indi-

vidual tastes and preferences last.

Here is a prayer we might use at this season: "We beseech thee, Father Almighty, to make us followers of thy saints and servants in their faithful obedience to Christ's commands, and of Christ in his perfect obedience to thee; through the same Jesus Christ our Lord". Your sincere friend and Vicar,

The Pigeons. There was once a famous yeoman family of this name in Badsey, but it is the feathered kind which have obtruded themselves on the P.C.C. agenda with monthly regularity, as well as on the church tower, these several years past. It is not possible to integrate these immigrants into our community, and the real danger is that their droppings will have a steadily corrosive effect on the masonry.

That this is no new problem in Badsey is shown by the churchwardens' presentment at the bishop's visita-tion in 1684, when they certified that they had "repayred ye Church that no pigeons can come in" (Giles Pigeon had been churchwarden just before this, but presumably no pun was intended). At the same time they bought a new prayer book for the clerk. The churchwardens of S. Littleton in 1554 found a much more useful connection between pigeons and prayer books. During the Reformation the parishes had to keep getting new sets of books to keep up with the bewildering changes in religious policy. Under Edward VI they had already had to fork out for two successive editions of the Book of Common Prayer, after being ordered to take all copies of the Latin service books to Worcester to be publicly burnt. Now Queen Mary made them burn the prayer books and ordered them to get new books of the Latin services. This was an expensive item, but if the priest did not comply, he was one who would have to answer to the Council. The vicar of S. Littleton purchased the books required, but it seems the churchwardens had no money to refund him. So instead of cash payment they let him have "all the pfett of the pyggns that use the stepull of owr churche". "Pfett" I take to be an abbreviation for "profit".

Can anybody suggest a way of either expelling these squatters or making them yield a profit? Our forefathers had no scruples about methods: we live in a more humane and fastidious age. Neither shooting nor poisoning find favour. A substance can be applied to the surface on which they are accustomed to perch, making it like the Cresta Run after a hard frost, or the proverbial banana skin. This might provide profitable entertainment, but only at considerable financial outlay. Three sides of the tower can easily be reached with ladders: the fourth has the nave roof abutting on it. This side can therefore only be reached with scaffolding.
