THE VICAR'S LETTER

19th February, 1966

My dear People.

I haven't got the reference to hand, but I remember a passage in one of the Sherlock Holmes books where Dr. Watson is shocked to discover that his brilliant friend has no knowledge whatever of the solar system. Holmes replies that he has no need of it: he does not waste time storing his mind with facts which have no relation to his particular job, the study and detection of human behaviour.

How out of tune with the 20th century, in which Quizmanship is regarded as the skill of skills! In spite of the increasing specialisation in all branches of learning and expertise, everyone is expected to make himself a walking encyclopaedia. We have a restless craving for a smattering of information on every-thing under the sun (and beyond the sun), though not, in this materialistic age, for the things of the Spirit.

Scraps

The trouble is that none of us gets time to classify and digest the multitude of unsorted scraps with which our minds are fed during all our waking hours. More and bigger newspapers, special supplements, pictorial magazines, reviews, circulars, hand-outs, pour from the presses. (It is alarming to think how rapidly the stock of the world's timber is being depleted to produce so much paper. One single issue of the New York Times, I read somewhere, consumes 150 acres of trees. All this vast amount of ephemeral reading matter and who am I to talk, the editor of a parish magazine?) One TV programme is immediately succeeded by another, and before our minds can assimilate what has been received by our senses, we must switch them over to something different. We simply have no time for reflection, or for solid reading of a worthwhile book. It is all the time scraps, scraps, scraps, and flittering impressions. With such dissipation of mind, it is no wonder that when we try to pray we are plagued by wandering thoughts.

Tyranny of Triviality

All this suggests some new and rather exciting forms of Lenten abstinence, appropriate to the 20th century. To be free to serve God, we need to break loose from the tyranny of triviality. I am not saying that we can do without entertainment, or indeed, occasional frivolity. Do not let us take ourselves too seriously, but let us take God seriously. I do mean that we can do without a great deal of the news items, flashes, articles, programmes (even the educational ones), adverts, commercials, comics, that demand entrance to our minds in a never-ending queue (not to mention the ones that jump the queue). If we could practise a little selection and discrimination in these things, we might not only develop minds a little less like cotton wool or blotting paper; we might find a space or two for God to get a hearing, and to remind us of the things that really matter.

Singlemindedness

After all, you don't have to be an egghead to be able to practise contemplative prayer. A priest noticed an old countryman who used to spend hours in church just gazing at a picture of Our Lord. One day he asked the old man what he was thinking about all the time. "I don't have to think", was the reply. "He just looks at me, and I just looks at Him. That's all".

Prayer is as simple as that. But 'simple' is not the same as 'easy'. What years of training and discipline it takes to reach the simplicity of the saints!

There's no harm in making a start this Lent. We might well begin by throwing out some of the junk

in the top storey - or at least by refraining from accumulating any more of it there.

Sunday Services (beginning in April). In the light of the experience gained from last year's trial arrangements, it has been decided to keep the general pattern the same, with the following modifications:

Every Sunday morning the children will assemble for Sunday School at 10-0. They will have Sunday School classes except on the 2nd Sunday, and on the 5th when it occurs. On these Sundays they will be brought by their teachers from Sunday School to the church service at 10-15, unless they are coming with their parents, in which case they will not attend Sunday School first.

On the 2nd Sunday there will be the Family Eucharist at 10-15, and on the 5th Sunday the kind of Family Service which has at present been on the 4th Sunday.

These new arrangements will not come into operation till April. This month please note the Mothering Sunday service on the 3rd Sunday at 10-0., instead of the Family Service on the 4th Sunday.

Parish Mission? The meeting of the P.C.C. on Tues., 1st March, at 7-15 p.m. in the Parish Room will be addressed by the Rev. Raymond Walters, Vicar of St. George's, Redditch, who will tell us about the sort of mission which is conducted by the Village Evangelists. This will be an open meeting, and it is hoped that others besides P.C.C. members will come, as this is a matter of great importance to us all. We need to ask whether God is calling us to have a mission in Badsey, and this meeting may help us to answer the question.

Annual Parochial Church Meeting, Feb. 15
For the 2nd year in succession, the Vicar had to announce sadly that he had to accept the resignation

of a churchwarden of long service to the parish: Mr. G. H. Stewart, who had been warden for nine years. He was very much a man of the people and a born leader of men. More important, he was a man whose heart God had touched. There was hardly a soul in the parish who had not benefited, either as an individual or as a member of the community, from Harry Stewart's generosity and compassion. The source of his dedicated service to God and his fellow-men was his devotion as a weekly communicant and man of prayer. Mr. Austen Jones spoke appreciatively of Mr. Stewart's helpfulness and friendship as a colleague. They all regretted, he said, his ill-health of recent years, and hoped the release from this office would help him to recuperate. Mr. Jones then made a presentation to Mr. Stewart, on behalf of the parishioners, of two books and a leather pocket-case.

Election of churchwardens then followed, Mr. J. F. Ives and Mrs. N. Clark being chosen. The chairman remarked that this meeting had made history. There had not been a churchwarden from Aldington in the present century, and only once before had there been a woman churchwarden in this parish, in the 17th century. That had been a Mrs. Pigeon, a name not popular with the P.C.C. at the present time.

Mr. H. L. Hatcher presented the revised Electoral Roll, with 378 names, 4 more than last year. Mr. M. H. Harvey presented the accounts for 1965 and budget for 1966. In a total turnover of £2,398, nearly one third (£823) had been expended extra-parochially.

Printed reports were circulated at the meeting. It is hoped to give some extracts in the next issue.
