THE VICAR'S LETTER

19th September, 1966

My dear People.

October is a month to which many of you look forward, I know, as a time for some relaxation and gradual letting up after the long summer days of hard work on the ground. Although there is much to be done outdoors, as the evenings lengthen there is prospect of more recreation, social intercourse, and refreshing of mind and spirit. Harvest Thanksgiving marks a completion but also a beginning.

This October will be a time of expectancy and adven-

ture for us. First, in both parishes, our Harvest Festivals. We thank the Lord of the harvest for supplying our needs, and pray for a harvest of souls in his Kingdom.

Then, for a week, the Mission to Badsey and Aldington will be heralded by a team of Village Evangelists. As they go visiting from house to house, receive them joyfully, remembering what our Lord said to his disciples when He sent them out to prepare the villages of Galilee for his coming: "Whoever receives you receives me, and to receive me is to receive the One who sent me."

The Mission will start with the Commissioning Service by the Bishop on Sunday evening, 16th October, and will end with a great Service of Thanksgiving the following Sunday evening. During the week there will be the mission services and meetings. Let me make two suggestions about the evening mission services (and the children's services every afternoon). One is that the Missioner will be conducting these as a complete and consecutive course: to make the best of this opportunity, you will therefore want to arrange matters so that you can attend from Monday to Friday, if you can. The other is to call for a friend or neighbour and bring them with you: many people who would be shy of coming on their own will come in company, if invited. You will find more about the Mission under the

Badsey and Aldington Notes.

Immediately after the Mission, classes will start in Badsey and Wickhamford in preparation for the Confirmation, which is to be in Badsey Church on Sunday, 12th March. Those who have already given in their names will want, if they are really eager to be confirmed, to attend as many as possible of the Mission services. This is an essential part of the preparation course. I hope too that others, particularly adults not yet confirmed, will be moved as a result of the Mission to seek further instruction. An adult enquirers' course, leading to confirmation if desired, will start a week or two after the Mission. Some who are already confirmed may like to attend this as a refresher course. The junior candidates will be notified of the day and time of their respective classes very shortly. Regular attendance at church is an essential part of the preparation.

May this indeed be a fruitful autumn for us all. "Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of thy faithful

people and kindle in them the fire of thy love

May He make the dull embers glow, and fan them into flame.

Among those praying for us are the Anglican congregation at Ba, Fiji, our linked parish overseas. Here is an extract from the August number of "Go!", the News-sheet of the Anglican Church in Viti Levu North: "Many English parishes, in the spirit of mutual responsibility and interdependence, have been giving extra money to make possible the Church's work in our district. One of these parishes now asks our help. Badsey Parish, in Worcestershire, is to have a parish mission

in October. They ask for the support of our prayers, both private and public. What they hope to do is to draw more people into the fellowship of Christ. This is exactly our mission here. We will certainly be partners with Badsey parish, as they are with us, in our pravers'

You will see from the time-table that after the Mission service on Wednesday evening the 19th there will be a Parish Social in the Meeting House. There will be no tickets for this, and no charge. This is an adult social,

so no children under 14, please, unless confirmation candidates or brought by their parents.

House Meetings may be held on any morning or afternoon during the week (except at service times) and on Friday evening (after the Mission Service). The idea is for a hostess to invite a group of not more than 8 friends or neighbours quite informally to her home for a cup of tea or coffee, to meet the Missioner. We do hope that a number of people will arrange such meetings in their homes. If you are planning to have a house meeting, please tell Mrs. Braby, before the Mission, so these meetings may be co-ordinated as far as possible.

No collections are taken at services or meetings for expenses, but the Village Evangelists' custom in their Missions is to have a drain-pipe standing in the church at services, into which contributions may be dropped.
