My dear People,

Deaconess Caroline Wright will be leaving us on 23rd November to take up her new appointment in the parish of Wolverley, near Kidderminster. We wish her all happiness and success in her work there, and pray that it may be amply blessed as her ministry has been here. On Sunday evening, 20th November, friends from both parishes will foregather in the Meeting House, Badsey, at 7-45 p.m., to say goodbye to her, and to give her a token of our gratitude and affection. Any who have not yet contributed to the presentation fund, and would like to do so, are asked to give or send their donations to Mr. J. F. Ives, 45, Brewers Lane, Badsey, or to Mr. J. E. Parry, Wickham House, Wickhamford, not later than 16th November.

I have no plans at present for obtaining further full-time assistance after Deaconess Caroline goes. I feel sure however that layfolk in both parishes will rally round and not let any of the work which Deaconess has taken over or initiated go by the board for lack of helpers. I am glad to say that some people have already come forward with their services in certain directions, for one of the things Deaconess Caroline has done is to draw other people in to assist in the work of the Church.

The Mission

As I write, the Badsev and Aldington Parochial Mission is not over, so it is not possible at this stage to report, let alone assess results. Probably results cannot be assessed anyway, at least for a long time. You can't evaluate a mission entirely by the statistics of people who attend the services or sign resolution cards. The few who made the effort to attend regularly the whole week will naturally have been the greatest gainers. There was a far larger number who came once or twice, and these, though receiving instruction on only a few aspects of the Christian faith and life, will doubtless have been helped in some degree to become more devout Christians than they were before. Then there is the even greater number of people who did not attend the mission services at all. Even among these there will be many whose attitude towards God and his Church has been affected for good by the influence of the Mission on the parish as a whole.

Prayer and Visiting

There is no doubt whatever that the Mission has brought about a quickening of the spiritual pulse of the parish and a greater awareness of the need of God in people's lives. This was happening before the Mission Week began. The prayers being faithfully offered, both inside and outside the parish, could not fail in having their effect. Just before the Mission there was the impact of the three Village Evangelists, who visited so assiduously and made personal contact with so many of the parishioners. They were able to infect a number of people with their own faith and joy in the Lord. To Mrs. Hawley and Mr. & Mrs. Gillson we owe a deep debt of gratitude. They have made many firm friends in Badsey and Aldington and we hope we shall be able to see them again.

The Missioner

Above all, we have been richly blessed in having Father Walters as our priest missioner. A busy parish priest with a large town parish to care for single-handed, he has nevertheless given us unstintingly of his time and energy. Sometimes during the week he has had to rush off to his own parish to take a service or funeral, but he was always back again in no time to visit some parishioner here or attend a house meeting, for he has been very active in all sorts of ways besides conducting the many services. He has taught us the

faith in clear and forceful terms, with a wealth of telling illustrations and stories. He has also been very popular with the children, whom he has been teaching about prayer as an exciting and rewarding adventure. His service of healing on St. Luke's Day, in which he administered laying on of hands and anointing to quite a number in the congregation, was much appreciated. We realise that his part in the Mission must have entailed many hours of preparation, most of them on his knees

Hospitality

Our very warm thanks are due to those who, on behalf of us all, gave hospitality to the missioners, and to Mrs. A. C. Sears, who organised the rota of hospitality so efficiently and charmingly. There are also those hostesses who opened their homes to friends and neighbours in house meetings. Mrs. Bell and her helpers are to be congratulated on the arrangements for the thoroughly enjoyable parish party on the Wednesday evening.

"As o'er each continent and island..."

Nearly fifty religious communities, cathedrals, parish churches and other congregations were praying for us, and Mrs. Clark arranged an excellent display of pictures of these churches on a big trellis board in the church. These ranged from Canterbury Cathedral, mother church of the Anglican Communion, to a Baptist congregation in S. America. Several churches in Canada, U.S.A., India, Africa, Europe, Australia, not to mention the South Seas, were among those praying for Badsey Parochial Mission. During the week we have been praying for each of these churches by name, at the daily celebrations of Holy Communion.

Follow-up

What have all these people, including ourselves, been praying for? Surely not merely that we should have a wonderful week. The Mission is not an end in itself. Its aim is to inspire and strengthen us to a fuller commitment to Christ. The fruit of the Mission is therefore to be looked for in the next few weeks and months. It is hoped that many will dedicate themselves to a deeper and stronger discipleship in the final service of the Mission, backing up their resolve with practical decisions as to the re-ordering of their lives by God's grace.

For some this will mean a more regular participation in the worship of the Church, or a more frequent receiving of Holy Communion. For others it will mean a deeper penitence and perhaps receiving sacramental absolution; for some a greater perseverence in the art of prayer, or the regular devotional reading of the Bible. For others it will mean attending classes with a view to Confirmation. Some will consider whether they ought to join the Church Membership Scheme and to contribute a more justly proportioned share to the common purse of the Church. Others may find God is calling them to teaching children the faith, to Youth leadership, to visiting the sick and aged, to Christian work.

Do not let your resolutions go cold on you without having done anything about it. Strike while the iron is hot. Do something now, "while it is called To-day".
