THE VICAR'S LETTER

18th February, 1967

My dear People,

Mrs. Braby asks me to express her thanks for all the kind enquiries and good wishes she has received in hospital. At the time of writing she has just had the opera-tion on her foot and is her usual bright self, in spite of a good deal of pain.

After her return from hospital she will still be out of action for some time, and I am most grateful to all who have come to my assistance in various ways. We are indeed fortunate to have the temporary services of Mr. Edward Barnaby at the organ in Badsey church on Sundays, and Mrs. Marshall is kindly playing for the weekday services.

Confirmation

Ever since the Mission, the next important event to which we have been looking forward in both parishes, and to which much of my own time and thought has been geared, is the Confirmation (& 1st Communion) on Passion Sunday, 12th March, at 10-15 a.m. We have a large number of candidates this year, and I do ask you to pray for them (and with them) as they prepare to dedicate their lives to God, and to join the communicant life and fellowship of the Church. Be present at the service, if you can. In the absence of the Bishop of Worcester in the U.S.A., Confirmation will be administered, and Holy Communion celebrated, by Bishop C. A. Martin (formerly of Liverpool), who has already visited both our churches, and has been such a good and delightful friend to us.

With this act of consecration in which the whole people of God in this place takes part, we set forward to the drama of the Passion and Resurrection. May we all be strengthened to bear the Cross, and to share the

Risen Life.

Reform of Representative Church Government

ANY OLD SPECS?

If you have an old pair or two stored away in a drawer or hanging around the house, we can put them to good use. The confirmation candidates in both parishes, as part of their Christian service, are collecting as many as they can, to send to the Missionary Optical Service. The M.O.S. was started by a British ophthalmic optician in 1950, and sends 10,000 pairs of spectacles abroad each year. They are discarded specs which are washed, re-conditioned, and the lenses neutralised and marked, and made up into glasses which can be used by poor people in India and Africa who could not afford the services of an optician, even if there was one in their area.

Think how many people in this country are unable to read without glasses. In poor countries overseas, people's eyes are taxed still further by poor diets, tropical infections, and inadequate medical care. Every week one million more people in the world learn to read. But what is the use to many of them when their eyesight is so poor and failing and they haven't the aid

of man-made lenses?

Perhaps then you can help. Give any old pairs of glasses to one of the confirmation candidates, or send for one of them to collect them. If you don't know any of them, ask at the Vicarage. But please do not send the specs direct to the Vicarage. Let one of the young people have the pleasure of collecting them, doing you and others a service.

BLACKMINSTER NOW IN BADSEY ECCLESIASTICAL PARISH

By an Order of Her Majesty in Council, gazetted on 31st January, 1967, certain changes have been made in the boundaries of the ecclesiastical parishes of Badsey,

Offenham and Bengeworth.

Some years ago Blackminster (south of the railway line) became part of the civil parish of Badsey, but it remained in the ecclesiastical parish of Offenham. This anomaly has now been removed. Blackminster residents are nearer to Badsey than to Offenham - some of them do indeed attend Badsey Church. The Vicar intends very soon, with the aid of lay church members, to carry out a visitation of all the homes in Blackminster, and to welcome them into the life and fellowship of St. James's parish. The legal changes also mean that Blackminster residents may now be baptised and married in Badsey Church and have the right of burial in the Churchyard. Hicherto this was confined to those on the Electoral Roll of Badsey Church.

By the same Order in Council that part of Aldington parish (known as the Parks) which lies to the west of the B4510 road from Bengeworth to Offenham Cross has been transferred to the parish of Bengeworth. This district is a long way from Badsey Church and village, and its few residents, unless already connected with St. James's Church or having special business in Badsey, do not regard Badsey as in any way their centre. On the other hand, they are reasonably close to Bengeworth and St. Peter's Church. Anyone residing in this district who is on the Badsey Church Electoral Roll will, of course, continue to have the same rights as a Badsey

parishioner.

Fabric Report for 1966. Quite a number of repairs to the fabric of the church have been carried out during the year, all very essential and briefly as follows:—

The roof gutters and downpipes have all been thoroughly cleaned and/or replaced, and painted inside and out. The drainage channel has also been cleaned out all round the church and made good as found necessary.

The churchyard gate and lantern have been repainted, as also the lantern to the porch, including renewing the electric wiring which had perished.

The plaster in the vestry and under the choir gallery has been renewed where broken away and made good.

Extensive pointing to the exterior stonework has been done and various holes in the walls filled in with matching stone.

The church door has been treated with linseed oil and the ironwork picked out in black. The porch has been repaired where woodwork had rotted away.

The tower roof has received attention and the woodwork in the belfry and room beneath; the communion rail, chancel gates and pulpit have all received necessary repair work and been treated for woodworm.

The vestry has been decorated as also the church porch.

The accumulation of rubbish at the back of the church has all been removed and the trees and bushes on the north side have been cut back as required.

A plaque in memory of Mr. & Mrs. G. Lees-Milne has been erected and a new cover for the font, in memory of the Rev. W. B. Chapman, has been installed.

Finally, the churchyard path has been widened and paved with good quality precast slabs.
