THE VICAR'S LETTER

19th April, 1967

My dear People,

I am hopeful, now that the bank holiday weekend does not coincide with Whitsuntide, that we may at last see a better observance of the great festival of the Holy Spirit, the birthday of the Church. We are told in the Acts of the Apostles that on this day the first disciples were "all with one accord in one place". Of recent years one could be reasonably certain that on this day parishioners would be all with one accord dis-persed in different places. What should be the second best Sunday in the year for church attendance has been one of the worst of all, and at the end of the day I have felt depressed rather than elated.

Now that there is little real connection between holiday and holy day, one could wish that it were so arranged that Whitsun would never coincide with the public holiday, and that the same would apply to Easter as

Trinity Sunday Appeal

May 15 to 20 is also Ember Week, when we pray for the ordained ministry, for those in training, and for an increase in response to vocation. There is an idea around that the full-time ministry does not provide a worthwhile job in these days, and this has been fostered by ill-informed press articles like the one in the Weekend Telegraph so rightly castigated by our Bishop in his recent Visitation Charge as "arrogant nonsense". This article represented the parochial clergy as a set of underpaid, ineffectual, disappointed men. I can assure you that such frustrations as I mentioned in my April letter have nothing to do with our work with our people, and that most of us, to my knowledge, are extremely happy in our ministry. Nor would it be true to say these days that we are grossly underpaid. Furthermore, we have security of employment and a house with the job. I mention those things because some young men are deterred from offering themselves by the "weary sad complaints" that are often heard about our conditions.

On Trinity Sunday there will be the usual envelopes in church for your contributions towards the cost of training ordinands. Whatever is put in these envelopes counts as part of our parochial contribution to the Diocesan Quota, and is deducted from the total which the P.C.C. has to find from its funds.

This year I have again been asked by the Dean and Chapter to spend a week at the Abbey as chaplain to visitors, and shall be performing this duty from May 29 to June 3. As this is Bank Holiday week, I hope I may have the pleasure of meeting some of you there and showing you round. Her last years had been clouded by personal sorrow, illness and physical weakness, but there shone through it all an indomitable faith and courage.

Our oldest parishioner, Mrs. Johns was the last survivor in Badsey of the older generation of Mustoes. Her father, organist at Badsey Church, lived to be well over 100, and she used to relate memories of blowing the organ for him as a girl. With her sweet serenity, she was a refreshing survival of a less hectic age – always appreciative and grateful, and with a fine relish for life.

Jottings. At the time of writing Mrs. Mabel Jenkins is very ill. Mr. Tom Knight has been rather ill since just before Easter, but with his usual vitality is making steady progress. Mrs. Harry Stewart has again been ill with lung trouble, and confined to the house for a long period. Mr5 Frank Reeves has had bronchitis, affecting the heart, but is now much better. Mr. Maurice Harvey had similar trouble, but mercifully recovered quickly. Mr. Dick Hartwell is in hospital again, also little Marilyn Bennett, and Mrs. May Brotherton will shortly have to go into hospital at Cheltenham. Miss Ruby Jones is making good progress. Pray for these and all other sick people.

Report of A.P.C.M. April 4th. Only about 20 people were present, a 50% drop in the average attendance for the last few years. Why was this?

Mr. J. F. Ives and Mrs. N. Clark were elected church-wardens.

The Vicar announced with regret the inability of Mr. Harvey, the treasurer, through illness, to be at the meeting.

The P.C.C. accounts were presented by the Chairman on Mr. Harvey's behalf, showing a favourable balance (at the end of 1966) of £168 in the General Fund, and £674 in the Fabric Deposit Account. An analysis of expenditure showed that out of a total of £2,152, payments for parochial purposes were £1,394 (£545 for maintenance of buildings and ordinary current expenses, £816 for stipend and wages, £33 in grants to Sunday School and Youth Club), and expenditure outside the parish was £758 (Diocesan Quota £365, home missions & charities £142, Church overseas £251), just over one-third of the total. The Vicar was glad to think the P.C.C. was setting a good example of Christian stewardship in its administration of the parochial funds.

The reports of the Vicar, P.C.C. and committees and organisations, circulated before the meeting, were then presented. The parochial mission featured largely in the Vicar's report, and he stated that since the Mission the average attendance at Sunday evening services had been 83, the average age of the congregation being a good deal younger than in many churches (thanks to a large extent to the very successful youth club). The departure of Deaconess Caroline Wright in November, after a fruitful four years' ministry here, was recorded.

The revised Electoral Roll contains 392 names (but what does this signify, with a $2\frac{1}{2}\%$ attendance of electors at the meeting?)

For the first time since the Stewardship Scheme started, Mr. Ives reported, there had been no decline in the total amount of the contributions. The amount received in 1966 was £921. Membership is now 127. This year an effort is being made to broaden the scheme by emphasis on the use of time and talents.

It was decided not to have a fête this summer for missions and charities, but it was hoped that smaller efforts would be run, and the Vicar and Mrs. Braby offered the use of the Vicarage garden for social events of this nature on behalf of charities.

The Sick. We are all sorry that our P.C.C. Secretary, Mr. Charles Beacon, has been ill, and will have to go into hospital later in May for removal of the gall bladder. Mrs. George Camden is in Avonside Hospital. Mrs. Annie Sutton has been suffering much pain lately; Mr. Dolphin seems better. Mr. L. A. Jones has been ill, but is now on the mend, we hope. Miss Colley has returned home from hospital. It was good to see Robin Cox at church (with crutches) on Easter Day, also Jimmy Smith. Pray for these and other sick people.

Report A.P.C.M., 29th March. Opening the meeting the Vicar reported with regret the illness of the Hon. Secretary, Mr. Charles Beacon. Mrs. J. E. Parry had kindly agreed to act as secretary for the time being.

Before the election of churchwardens the Vicar stated that Mr. Edmund Cooke, after 16 years in office, did not wish to stand for re-election. His work for the church and parish had been unremitting, and they all owed him a deep debt of gratitude. A presentation would be made to Mr. Cooke after Evensong on Sunday, 30th April: Mr. J. E. Parry had agreed to receive contributions towards the present, not later than April 26.

The Vicar then nominated Mr. J. E. Parry as one church-warden, and Mr. H. J. Dunkerley was proposed by the meeting for the other. Both were then elected by the meeting.

The Chairman read the Parochial Church Council report on Mr. Beacon's behalf, and presented the revised electoral roll, containing 152 names.

Mr. I. E. Randall, Hon. Treasurer, presented the audited accounts for 1966 and budget for 1967. There was a favourable balance of £211 in the general fund and £283 in the fabric fund, as well as £101 in the organ fund. During the year £120 had been spent on church repairs, maintenance costs had been £154, and the Diocesan Quota £101. Besides special-collections for home missions and charities, £20 had been contributed from the general fund to overseas missions.

Mr. J. E. Parry reported on the church fabric. (This report appeared in an earlier number of the Review.)

Miss A. Cox reported on the planned giving scheme which (with tax refund on the covenants) had brought in £422.

Miss A. Cox reported on the Sunday School, which had sent donations of £8 to the U.S.P.G., £5 to the Aberfan Disaster Fund, and £3 to Christian Aid.

The Vicar reported that, though there was no significant decrease, church attendance had not been very good. Apart from a few really faithful people who cared a great deal, there seemed to be little sense of the Christian duty of regular worship and participation in the life of the Church.

In discussing plans for the year, the meeting decided to have an outdoor fête on behalf of the organ fund, on Saturday, 5th August, in the grounds of Field Farm.
