THE VICAR'S LETTER

20th September, 1967

My dear People,

Further to my letter of last month, I am told that not all those calling themselves "flower people" or "hippies" are drug takers. If I implied this, I apologise. But it makes no difference to my main contention that the chief danger in such movements is the crying up of mindlessness and aimless licence. Wearing flowers and beads is harmless enough; it is only a temporary accompaniment of this general trend. It will soon pass, as all young people's crazes do, and be replaced by another. But the boosting of the primitive and barbarian will continue.

Thank God for it, many people say. 'It is a healthy revolt against the sordid materialism of the age'. Yes, it is a reaction against materialism, but I would not agree that it is a healthy one. Idealists who deny civilised values are far more dangerous to society than the worldly and avaricious. The go-getter and the 'wide boy' may be unpleasant types, but they don't as a rule talk a lot of mystical nonsense about their need of self-realisation, or try to loose the bonds of family and nation in the interest of 'free love' and anarchism.

Pop Prayer

Scientific materialism and the affluent society do indeed fail to satisfy the deeper longings of the human heart. In our western society most people have everything they want in a material sense, and yet there is a void which they know cannot be filled by the world or the flesh. It is not surprising that eastern mystical cults, with their emphasis on the need for spiritual release, have now a great vogue in this country. There is, for example, the Maharishi Mahesh Yogi, who recently found disciples among the Beatles and other pop singers. He does not claim to teach a religion - that is a highly unpopular word nowadays, and no wonder; for 'religion' literally means 'binding'. There is a basic egotism in the religionless sort of meditation which seeks self-fulfilment rather than the knowledge of God. Even when the claim is a merging of self in "the cosmic transcendence", it is fundamentally selfish. It is pure escapism and sensation-seeking, like drug-taking. Yoga or pot, either will help you to 'get away from it all'.

Meditation of this kind is certainly not what the

Meditation of this kind is certainly not what the Christian (or for that matter the Jew or the Moslem) means by prayer. Getting 'in tune with the Infinite' is not the same as praying to a personal God. The 'Cosmic Consciousness' makes no moral demands upon you. God does. You cannot contemplate the Father of Our Lord Jesus Christ for long without realising (1) that He loves you (2) that He wants to turn your whole life inside out. "Not my will but Thine" is the keynote of Chris-

tian prayer.

"Be still, and know that I am God"

The Church is failing to fill the void in the soul which material things cannot satisfy, and is losing out to atheistic mysticism. Why? Because church people do not spend enough time in silence before God. They give the impression of Christianity as a hustling, 'do-gooding' religion that lacks poise and reflectiveness. All the great masters of Christian prayer have taught the necessity of retreat, beginning with the Master Himself. Our beautiful Diocesan Retreat House at Cropthorne may have to close down because it is not used enough by the churchpeople of the diocese. What a disaster!

Why can't we in Badsey and Wickhamford have an annual weekend retreat? Do let me know if you are

interested.

NEW ORDER OF HOLY COMMUNION

By an unanimous vote of the P.C.C. it was decided to use the new Order of Holy Communion in Wickhamford Church, beginning on 1st October (Harvest Thanksgiving) at 9 a.m. The Bishop has given his permission.

Copies of the service will be provided at the church. This form of the service is to be used experimentally throughout the Church of England until 1971, after which it will probably be revised in the light of the experience and considered comments of communicants. An excellent explanatory booklet, called "Experiment in Worship", has been published at 2/- and copies may be bought at church or from the Vicar, who has been explaining the service to the congregation on some Sunday evenings in September.

It will be difficult for all of us, priest and people, to adapt ourselves to this new form at first. But, as the booklet says,trying out the new service does not mean "using it for a Sunday or two and finding that you either like it better than the old one or you don't. It means using the service over an extended period so that it is no longer a novelty but a familiar form through which unselfconscious, loving prayer and devotion can be freely expressed. It means asking what a Communion service should do, and whether the new service does it any better than the old".

Church Fete - 5th August, 1967
