THE VICAR'S LETTER

19th May, 1968

My dear People.

"Endeavour to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace".

We now hear these words at every Holy Communion service. They are a reminder that the unity which the Holy Spirit inspires in his people, to carry out some common purpose, needs constant endeavour on their part to maintain, when it comes to working out how the purpose is to be executed.

First comes the vision: it lights up the imagination of thousands. The wind of the Spirit seems to throw down barriers of the mind and sweep away entanglements. The fire of his love kindles a warmth of brotherly regard, even affection, for all others whose hearts He has touched. Surely now the Church can act as one body and speak with one voice! Yes. But first it must be agreed what are the appropriate actions of the body, and the suitable words for the voice. And that is where the trouble begins.

God proposes, a committee interposes

Whenever human beings meet together in conference to work out a detailed plan of action, a constitution or an order of service, however godly and well-intentioned those people may be, they find it extremely hard to agree. It is easy to feel the Holy Spirit at work when an assembly is captured by some compulsive idea. But if you find yourself on a sub-committee working out a formula to recommend to another committee to report back to a joint commission for final consideration by two or three different independent bodies, it is not easy to recognise the Holy Spirit as having anything to do with it. His Name may have been invoked in a perfunctory opening prayer. After that He is pretty effectively sealed off by a sort of sticky fly-paper which keeps a lot of buzzing (though half-dead) catch-phrases glued to our little minds.

Hectic handouts

At the present time there is a mood of exasperation in the Church of England at the constant stream of new proposals, reports of commissions, schemes for this, that and the other. They seem to tumble over one another, claiming our consideration. Before we have arranged a meeting to study some report or other, passed down to the parishes, we are asked to answer some questions on another one which has just come out. (Why, for instance, when for some years we have been trying to find a common mind on terms of intercommunion – Stage 1—with the Methodists, does another report suddenly appear, trying to deal with inter-communion all round)? And the worst of it is that we know that if we do get really interested in some new proposal - even excited about it – it will be years before it has been through all the process of being mangled, minced and pulled about, till it comes out as a miserable, lifeless compromise.

Yet we ought not to be vexed that there is all this spate of new proposals. What happens to the proposals may be very frustrating, and often due to sheer human wilfulness and divisiveness. But that there is this ferment of new ideas in the Church is a healthy sign. It ought to exhilarate us. It means the Holy Spirit is at work. There is no doubt that the Church (and not only the Church of England) is going through a new period of reformation, even perhaps of revolution.

Swing Wings

The trouble, as I said, begins when people have to work out details. It is then that the vision seems to fade and the emotional force to be spent. Except of course among the extremists on both wings. They do not cancel each other out because they are both determined on

getting things settled in their way. The reasonable-minded people in the middle, usually the majority, may still be able to see the vision in its undistorted form, but lack the fire to push things through at the cost of offending the bigots.

But in a truly Christian assembly, minorities must not be ignored or suppressed. The Holy Spirit does not need the human machinery of the majority vote to do his work. The majority has not necessarily the mind of Christ. It is a diabolical idea that the voice of the people is automatically the voice of God. The single obstinate juryman, or the committee member who insists on writing a minority report, may be a cussed nuisance, but who is to say whether the Holy Spirit is speaking through him or the majority? Think of Elijah and the prophets of Baal.

As a kind of working rule we have to give weight to majority decisions, and the minorities must make the best of it. If they feel that a matter of great principle is at stake, they will be prepared to suffer for it. But good Christians do not want to make martyrs of their fellow committee-men if they can effect a compromise instead. Peace is better than war.

Compromise the price of comprehensiveness

If the Church of England is to retain her God-given comprehension, compromise must always be to some extent our lot. So must be that ambiguousness of statement which many zealots find so distasteful. It need not be assumed that the Holy Spirit is absent because a form of words has been deliberately choen which can be taken in more than one sense. Often this is the only way to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.

But one does sometimes wonder whether not only unity would be preserved, but also the vision and the fire, if whenever a christian conference met to draw up detailed schemes for implementing proposals, they would spend at least one whole day first in complete silence together, waiting on the Spirit. It would be time well spent.
