18th June, 1968 My dear People,

Don't you think all this talk about the importance of the secular and unimportance of the sacred is being rather overdone? I suspect it is because Christians (es-pially the clergy) have a sort of guilt complex about being a bit off-beat in the significant movements of the day. The City of God no longer seems to be the world's great terminus, but just one of those places by-passed by the motorway. "There is only one thing worse than being talked about", wrote Oscar Wilde, "and that is not being talked about". 'People don't seem to have any use for the Church', thinks the frustrated Christian. 'Never mind, let's justify our existence in some other way. We must have a theology of the Secular.'

### Conferences

An off-putting sub-title, I dare say, but please try to read further. Yes, conferences. From the 4th to 20th July the World Council of Churches will be holding its 4th General Assembly at Uppsala in Sweden, the Lambeth Conference of Anglican Bishops will meet in London from 25th July to 25th August, and the Mothers' Union comes together for a worldwide conference from 22nd to 26th July. All wrong, says the secularist Christian. Instead of having these church conferences about their own affairs, they ought to be joining with Marxists, Mahommedans, Humanists, Atheists, anyone of goodwill, in ameliorating some of the social and economic evils of the world. Those Christians again, says the cynic, applying themselves heartily to the business in which they excel: talking - while the world goes on its way regardless.

But Christians are not the only people who hold conferences. The word 'conference' means literally 'bringing together' (onion-tying is a 'conference' of onions, even if they don't talk). If a big commercial organisation has representatives all over the world engaged in market research or opening up new lines of business, the executives at the top cannot formulate a workable overall policy simply on the written reports of these men. They have to bring them together sometimes in conference. The T.U.C. has just been celebrating its centenary. Every political party or professional association or welfare society has its annual conference: a bringing together of people engaged in a common task or fired with a common ideal. The importance of these conferences lies not in what is said, but in the meeting of human personalities to 'confer', i.e. to bring together their varying ideas, experiences and 'knowhow, out of their separate isolation into the common pool. It is all summed up in the modern catchword 'Dialogue'.

# Something different

But a conference of Christians is something more than this. They are all with one accord in one place in order that they may receive the Holy Spirit. They come together not to build up a common mind, but to learn the mind of Christ. He has promised that where a number of people are gathered together in his name, He is in the midst of them.

So a Christian conference is first and foremost a partnership in prayer. The majority of people taking part are not even physically there. It meets not for the sake of making pronouncements on matters of the day (though that may well be one of the things the Spirit moves it to do); not for the sake of improving its image before the world (though that might happen unconsciously if it is really Spirit-possessed); not for the sake

of having a natter or meeting old friends or keeping things on the hum. It meets primarily to put itself at the disposal of the Holy Spirit. For that reason such con-ferences ought (as I was saying last month) to start with a whole day spent in silence together.

An agenda of course they must have. "For", as St. l'aul wrote to the Corinthian Church, "God is not the author of confusion, but of peace, as in all churches of the saints". The Christian conferences meeting this summer have to deal with several pressing problems. They will need all the more a general sense of direction and purpose from the Holy Christiff they are the confusion of the confusion o and purpose from the Holy Spirit if they are not to get bogged down in particular issues.

### Our part

And that is just where you and I come in with our prayers. Church conferences are co-operative enterprises in which every member of the Church is involved. We have not got to bother about the details of the agenda in our prayers, but just hold up the Church's representatives in the beams of light and love streaming from the Divine Presence.

They and we need above all a sense of the sacredness of our calling in Christ's Body. If that consecration is there, God can do anything with his Church. If God thought the world could save itself by simply being the world, it is strange that He should have sent his only-begotten Son into the world to redeem it, called a people to witness to that salvation, and filled them with the power of his Spirit.

Can it be that God really does want to use his Church for the purpose for which He created it?

We need to renew our hope and trust in God's promises for his Church, against which the gates of hell shall not prevail. "You are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a peculiar people; that you should show forth the praises of him who has called you out of darkness into his marvellous light".

### A prayer to use

Here is a prayer which has been issued by the Missionary and Ecumenical Council of the Church Assembly, and which many Church members will be using this summer:

O God, whose matchless power is ever new and ever young, who didst create all things by thy Word and art redeeming them through the incarnation, passion and resurrection of thy Son: Pour thy Spirit upon thy Church, that with renewed faith, vision and obedience we may joyfully testify to thy new creation in Christ, more selflessly serve thy new order amidst the old, and more hopefully await the new heavens and new earth of thy promise; through the same Jesus Christ our Lord and Saviour. Amen.
