My dear People,

Is Harvest Thanksgiving taken as seriously as it was ten years ago?

I get the impression that it is not. This may be peculiar to our villages, or it may be a country-wide trend. I don't profess to know. What I do know is that in the last few years only a small proportion of growers and farmers have troubled to bring any of their produce to church as a token of their thanks to God the Giver, or to present themselves in church on the festival Sunday. Even ten years ago, when we first came here we remember a much bigger participation.

I think one reason for the falling off may be that the whole idea of harvest thanksgiving has been cheapened and commercialised by secular interests. In many places, organisations of all sorts have 'cashed in' on the idea, by holding so-called harvest festivals to raise money for their funds by the sale of goods. This is a very far cry from the dedication of the first-fruits of our labours to God, in humble and joyful thanksgiving, as an act of the whole community in the parish church.

It may be argued that life (even rural life) is so complex nowadays that there is no longer any such thing as a village community; that it is unrealistic to expect such a community (if it exists) to centre round the church, which tends to be regarded more and more as just one of the many organisations which compete for people's interest.

But, whichever way you look at it, the church building is there because it was built to the glory of God, and not to serve any sectional interest at all, even "the Church". It stands there as the one building in the place which exists solely to draw all men to God and to bring to all men the blessings of God.

The connection between God and our work and food is absolutely basic if life is to have any meaning. Without acknowledgement of God, the land worker becomes a slave to earth and earthiness. His spirit is sunk into the furrows, rotated in the machinery, and packaged in the market. It cannot soar.

At a harvest festival, religion has no obscurities for those who earn their living from the soil. That is why harvest festivals are the oldest of religious feasts, far older than Christianity itself. But the Son of God became man and toiled as a worker, to show us how to bring the whole earth to serve the purposes of love. In his Name and in the power of the Holy Spirit, we thank God for the good land He has given us, and dedicate our hands and minds and hearts to serve his utmost glory.

A great opportunity

Do you remember my special Christmas Appeal last year? You gave £56-10-0 to help Captain Barry Irons of the Church Army to set up a centre in Moseley for the rehabilitation of young drug addicts. The house was opened on 16th February this year, and a great work is being done there, by the grace of God, in absolutely shattering conditions of human degradation and misery.

Captain Irons is of course a very busy man, but in spite of the pressure of his work he has most kindly consented to come to Badsey and Wickhamford and tell us about it. He will visit us on **Sunday, 13th October** and preach at Evensong: Wickhamford 5-30, Badsey 6-45. This is an opportunity not to be missed, of hearing at first-hand about this work in Christ's Name to which we have contributed of our means and pledged the support of our prayers. I am told that Captain Irons is a forceful and inspiring speaker, and that the story he has to tell us is devastating, yet redeemed by Christian hope.

Family & Social Services

A work of Christian welfare very much closer at hand is the Family and Social Services. We have our own local association for Evesham, Bredon and Pershore Deaneries, and in the past have been able to support, very largely from our own local efforts, the salary and expenses of a trained welfare worker – first, Miss Walker and now, for the last two years, Miss Read. It is just this kind of service to the community, where personal and spiritual factors count for so much, which the Church can offer, and still does.

A visit to Barsham House, Malvern, the hostel for mothers and babies run by the Diocesan Association, is being arranged on October 24 for Evesham Deanery, and details will be announced later. On Wednesday, 16th October, the annual People's Offering Service will be held at St. Michael's, Broadway, at 7-30 p.m. Canon G. C. B. Davies of Worcester Cathedral will be the preacher. At this service the offerings of the parishes in Evesham Deanery, our own two included, are presented. I hope a number of people from Badsey and Wickhamford will go. Transport can be arranged, if you will let me know as soon as possible.

Clerical Roundabout

That same evening, Oct. 16, Canon W. A. Trippass, our Rural Dean, will be instituted to the parish of Bidford-on-Avon, in the Diocese of Coventry, and our prayers and good wishes go with him and Mrs. Trippass in their new sphere of work. We shall certainly miss them in Evesham Deanery; we have valued Canon Trippass' wise counsel and ever ready help. On Oct. 19th the Rev. W. J. Moxon comes from Bidford to be instituted as Vicar of Bengeworth, and he and Mrs. Moxon can be assured of a friendly welcome in this Deanery, where they are already known to many of us.

A devoted layman

The news, at the time of writing this, of the sudden death of Mr. Charles Raymer, at the age of 53, comes as a great shock to those of us who knew him and the big part he has played in the life of the Diocese and of Evesham Deanery. He was a most assiduous worker for the Church, and will be specially missed for his services to the Lay Readers' Association, as well as the Diocesan Conference, Board of Finance, Dilapidations Board, the Deanery Synod, and many other activities, in none of which did he spare himself. He had strong views on almost everything, which he would often propound at considerable length. But even those who disagreed with him could not help loving him, as the kind, warm-hearted Christian man that he was.

Public Baptism

The main subject for discussion (in groups) at the Evesham Ruridecanal Synod on Oct. 21 will be the new services of Baptism and Confirmation. The Bishop is expected to be present. The P.C.C.'s of both our parishes have studied the new form of Baptism service and approved its use in Badsey and Wickhamford during the experimental period of four years laid down by the Church Assembly. At the time of writing I have administered baptism of infants once in each church according to the new rite. It is a good deal shorter than the 1928 service which was commonly used, and certainly simpler and more intelligible in the wording and phraseology. The nature of the decision which is being made by the parents and sponsors in bringing the child to baptism is very clearly drawn out; so is the distinction between the actual Baptism in water in the Name of the Trinity, and the ceremonies which follow: the signing with the cross, and (optional, though much appreciated) the presentation of a lighted candle. The congregation have a definite part in these and in welcoming the new member of Christ into the family of the Church.

This highlights the importance of making Public Baptism the great festal occasion which it is meant to be in the life of the Christian community. Both our P.C.C.s are at present giving serious thought as to the best arrangements that can be made for this in our own parishes. Suggestions from parishioners will be welcome. All sorts of factors enter into the problem of finding the best time and how often. It may be that in this respect also we need to have a period of experiment.
