Mr. D. N. Jepson is our organiser for the Fête. He writes as follows: "To make the date and make it worthwhile will need the energy, effort, ideas and goodwill of everyone possible. The Fête will be held in the Vicarage garden, which for many years has lent its own special atmosphere. Every offer of assistance for stalls and sideshows will be gratefully received".

Report of Annual Vestry & Parochial Church Meeting, February 18th

The meeting was generally agreed to have been the best for some years. It was held this year in the Parish Room, and the 37 who attended were able to feel a greater sense of 'togtherness' than in the wide open spaces of the Meeting House.

Before the election of churchwardens, the Vicar said that Mr. Jim Ives had signified his wish to retire from the churchwardenship, though certainly not from active participation in the church life. Though personally sorry to lose a good churchwarden, the Vicar said he thought Mr. Ives was right in his main reason for relinquishing the office, i.e. to allow others the opportunity and experience of serving the Church in this way. Mr. Ives, he said, had been capable and extremely conscientious as churchwarden. He was also, as they all knew, modest and self-effacing. The meeting showed its appreciation of Mr. Ives with hearty applause.

The Vicar then nominated Mrs. Anne Clark for one of the wardens, and Mr. Don. Hartwell was proposed and seconded from the meeting for the other. Both were unanimously elected.

Mr. Harvey presented the audited P.C.C. accounts for 1968. These showed that out of total receipts of £1,529, £1,017 was contributed through Christian Stewardship and Income Tax refund. Out of an expenditure of £1,516 £818 was spent on the needs of our own parish, and £698 on causes outside our own community (£392 to Diocesan Quota, £214 to the Church Overseas, £92 to Home Missions & Charities). This meant that out of every £1 spent by the P.C.C., 10/9½ was for ourselves, and $9/2\frac{1}{2}$ for others. It seemed that the P.C.C. was setting a good example of Christian Stewardship.

Reports of the Vicar, the P.C.C. and its committees, Stewardship, the Parish Review, and the Mothers' Union had been cyclostyled and circulated at the meeting. The Electoral Roll, after deletions and additions, contains 389 names as against 393 last year. Questions were asked about the Sunday School, and the Vicar stated that the present 'family grouping' in the senior section was experimental and not necessarily permanent. Comments made by parents at the meeting were extremely helpful. Mrs. Ives pointed out that it was the shortage of teachers for the older children which made much of this experimentation necessary.

In his report on the Stewardship Scheme, Mr. Ives stated: "The end of 1968 concluded the first seven years of the scheme, and this also terminated the original covenants. We now have covenants amounting to £314-10-0 as against £457-3-0 last year. It would appear that, unless more church members become contributors, we can expect a substantial drop in contributions in 1969, together with a decrease of £100 or more in income tax repaid on the reduced amount in covenants. Those not already doing so are urgently requested to consider making a covenant with the Church'

In her Pastoral Committee report, Mrs. Bell appealed for more regular visitors for the sick and aged. Mrs. Betteridge reported a membership of 55 in the Mothers'

He particularly wanted the planning of the monthly 'people's service' to be a corporate matter. The proposal was enthusiastically received by the meeting, and it was generally agreed that the committee should be widely representative of different age groups. The following were chosen at the meeting to serve on the committee: Mrs. Chaplin, Miss Heather Davies, Mr. Jepson, Mrs. P. Osborne, Mr. C. Stewart, Mr. Christopher Tucker.

After business, a colour filmstrip with commentary on the Lambeth Conference of 1968 was shown.

> REPORT OF ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING, FEB. 26

Mr. J. E. Parry and Mr. H. J. Dunkerley were re-

elected churchwardens.

Mrs. Parry Hon. Sec. to the P.C.C., reported that the revised Electoral Roll contained 150 names. Besides business meetings, the P.C.C. had discussed the new Baptism service and the Anglican-Methodist Unity

Scheme.

Mrs. V. Johnson, Hon. Treasurer, presented the audited accounts for 1968. Planned Giving, and the income tax refund on covenants, had brought in £425-10-0, and ordinary church collections £127. Of the outgoings £353 had been on church expenses, and £186 to Diocesan Quota, missions and charities. Miss Cox reported that there were 31 members in the planned giving scheme. The Sunday School had given £15-9-0 to good causes. Mr. Parry said that fortunately there had been little expenditure on the church fabric necessary during the year. The new organ had proved satisfactory, but had been affected slightly by the damp atmosphere, particularly since the summer floods. This was rectified now that an internal heater had been installed.

The Vicar reported a not very good year for church attendance. There was now a monthly Sunday for Baptism, administered at 3 o'clock Evensong on the 2nd tism, administered at 3 o'clock Evensong on the 2nd Sunday, as christenings had increased from 2 in 1958, his first year in the parish, to 15 in 1968. They were indebted to Mrs. T. H. Collett for her work as organist in spite of occasional illness, and were also grateful for assistance from Mrs. Braby, Miss R. Astley, Mr. D. Steele, and now Mr. B. Martin. Mr. A. Sutton, owing to bad health, had been obliged to give up his work of caring for the churchyard, and his place had been taken by Mr. R. Cox.

Appreciation was expressed of the great work for the parish that had been done by Mr. and Mrs. E. Cooke, who through increasing infirmity had now felt it necessary to resign from the Parochial Church Council after many years of faithful service. Mrs. Parry had now taken Mrs. Cooke's place as secretary of the Sanctuary
