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### THE VICAR'S LETTER

20th January, 1970

My dear People, "What are you doing about Lent?".

The conventional answer to this would be: Giving up smoking... sweets... late nights... reading some helpful books... praying a bit more... putting some money in a self-denial box'

In other words, most of us tend to think of Lent as

a time for self-discipline and soul-cultivation.

No harm in this. But it isn't the purpose for which the season of Lent was first instituted by the Church. The trainer of a football team would not sleep peacefully before the great match, if all he had done was to get each player to do P.T. excercises on his own, and go for a run every day before breakfast. True: he would want them to be in good trim as individuals. But much more important in their training would be coaching as a team - the trial games, practice in footwork, passing, co-operation between forwards and defence, etc.

It is the same with the Church's training period: Lent. It is meant primarily for practice in team-work.

The old idea of Lent was an annual spring-cleaning

of the soul. As one of my brother clergy put it recently: "You took your soul off the shelf, looked it over, dus-

ted it, and put it back again till next Lent"

Surely Lent is an opportunity for corporate training -the Church learning what it means to "be the Church". Not by huddling together to keep ourselves warm in a bleak world - but coming together to receive the wind and fire to transform the world.

At a time when local congregations - let's face it are getting smaller, we need to do things together on a wider basis than the parish. So we have designed a number of corporate activities in Evesham Deanery

this Lent.

Ash Wednesday, Feb. 11. A Deanery Eucharist in All Saints, Evesham, at 8 p.m. Said service with hymns. Celebrant: the Rural Dean. Preacher: Bishop Martin. Coffee will be served after the service, so would those intending to come please let me know not later than Sunday, the 8th. Also if you need transport, or can offer it.

2. On subsequent Wednesdays in Lent, at 8 p.m. An evening service in different village churches in turn. The Rev. A. E. Russell, formerly Dean of Belize, British Honduras, and now Chaplain-General of the Community of the Holy Name, will conduct a course on "Thought and Action". See separate parochial notes of "Church Services" for dates and churches. The provision of transport is important here. Please let me know if (a) you need transport; (b) you can offer a lift. #### ANNUAL CHURCH MEETING

## Tuesday, 17th February, in the Meeting House, at 7-15 p.m.

This meeting is of special importance this year, inaugurating Synodical Government, the aim of which is to give a new opportunity for partnership in the life of our Church.

First, the new system is intended to be more complete, straightforward and effective, so that churchpeople at every level may feel that they are in touch with the Church as a whole and can play their part in decision making. Secondly, the laity are now to have their place in every aspect of church government, including the doctrine and services of the Church.

Everyone who is on the Church Electoral Roll will be receiving a letter inviting them to nominate representatives and to come and vote at the meeting.

The first business is the election of churchwardens. Then, after the outgoing Parochial Church Council has reported on its work for the past year and rendered its accounts, the election of representatives takes place: to the Deanery Synod, for three years (these are ex officio members of the P.C.C.), and to the P.C.C. for one year.

After the elections, there is general discussion on Church affairs, and anyone may raise any question of parochial or general church interest. Let us have your ideas.

A victim, alas! of the 'flu epidemic. Double pneumonia developed, and could not be alleviated because of her chronic condition of Parkinson's disease. Her remarkable courage in facing this disability for the past 8 years was an inspiration to all who knew her. Generous and sweet-natured, she was sustained by a strong Christian faith and cheerful patience. Our prayerful sympathy with Mr. Jack Barnard and all the family.

Jan. 21 Mark Edgar Mitchell, aged 69.

Until his retirement last year through bad health, Edgar Mitchell had been our faithful Parish Clerk and Sexton for 21 years, having succeeded the late George Moisey. He was also gardener and groundsman at Blackminster School. In recent years he had not been able to do grave-digging or other strenuous work, but he was assiduous in his custodianship of the church and churchyard, and always took a keen interest in everything pertaining to them. In fact, he simply loved the church, and in times of illness, when he was officially off work, it was hard to keep him away. The Vicar, in particular, will miss him greatly - first as a loyal friend, but also as a mine of information about the graves, the people buried there, and the old traditions of the parish. Indeed, we have all missed him at the church in the last few months, when he has been an invalid, for he was not only conscientious in his duties as a servant of the Church, but a devout communicant and zealous churchman. He took some getting to know on first acquaintance, but as intimacy grew one recognised a depth of sincere faith which could be really heart-warming.

Our condolences and prayers for Mrs. Mitchell and all the family.

Mr. J. Nisbett, of Aldington, who had been in hospital for several months since he was laid low by a stroke, passed to his rest on Dec. 23, aged 61. He was cremated. Mrs. Nisbett and family are assured of our prayers.

Another victim of influenza was Miss Nancy Ankers, who died after a very acute attack on 27th December. Nancy was a shy and rather lonely person who was

not easy to know. She nevertheless had a small circle of friends who appreciated her goodness of character and capacity for affection. Any person entitled to attend the meeting may raise any question of parochial or general church interest. You are entitled to enrol if you are a

baptised member of the Church of England of 17 years or upwards. By enrolling you become a voting member of the Church and so help to ensure that all the Councils of the Church - from P.C.C. to General Synod - are fully representative of its members.

A copy of the Electoral Roll will be on view in the Church so that you can check if you are already on it or not. Enrolment forms are available at the church or from the Hon. Sec., Mrs. Parry. They should be returned to her or the Vicar not later than March 15th.
