Mrs. Taylor was one of the old Badsey 'characters', and will be very much missed. Beneath a sometimes downright manner there was a warm, affectionate and generous nature. She faced her sufferings and infirmities with an indomitable cheerfulness. She was very sociable, a keen chapel-goer, and member of the Women's Institute and British Legion Women's Section.

Feb. 6 Alfred William Ballard, aged 80.

Bill Ballard was another much loved Badsey character, warm-hearted and sociable (in spite of his deafness). The end came suddenly and apparently painlessly. The previous evening he had been at the British Legion annual dinner, enjoying himself, and seemingly quite normal. He was an expert and extremely industrious market

gardener. His illness of two years ago had been rather a trial to a man so active, but it was not long before he was cycling again to his bit of ground every day. He was well-known in both parishes, and liked to attend Wickhamford Church sometimes.

The Ballards are an old Badsey family (Bill's greatgrandfather, William, born in Badsey in 1791, was parish clerk). It is good that the name is perpetuated in 'Ballards Park', through Bill's generosity to the Cricket Club. And the electric lighting in Badsey Church was his memorial gift for Ron, killed in action.

Feb 16 (cremation) Annie Lardner, aged 72.

She also is missed by many friends in Badsey. It is difficult to realise that she and her husband only came here 8 or 9 years ago, so accepted have they become in the village community, and so active in its social life. Mrs. Lardner was always very thoughtful for the welfare of others. In times of illness she spoke little about herself, but was very much concerned about the needs of those around her. Her serene and warming smile will not easily be forgotten.

To the dear ones and families of these Christian souls we extend our prayerful sympathy in their bereavement.

Jottings. Mrs. Daphne Bell has had a successful operation and is now away for convalescence. Mrs. Lord became very ill on the day she was to go to hospital for a minor adjustment, and had to have a kidney removed. We are glad to say she is now returned from hospital, and doing well. Mr. Paul Brown had to go to hospital for an emergency appendicectomy. His mother-in-law Mrs. Joyce Owens had an unlucky fall down the stairs, breaking her ankle, and this is taking a long time to mend, because of the formation of fluid. Mrs. Elsie Jelfs is still in Evesham Hospital, though a good deal better. Mr. Fred Dore Senr., has returned from hospital after a successful major operation. Miss Susan Lake had a nasty motor accident, with injuries to her mouth, so that at the time of writing she is still unable to take solid food. Miss Annette Hewlett has been in hospital again for examination. She faces her troubles with great pluck.

REPORT OF ANNUAL VESTRY & ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING, FEB. 17

As all 380 electors had received a letter and nomination forms (in view of the importance of this year's meeting, with the inauguration of Synodical Government), it had been decided to hold the meeting in the Meeting House, and not in the Parish Room, as last year. In the event only 34 people attended, 3 fewer than last vear.

Mrs. Anne Clark and Mr. Don Hartwell were elected churchwardens.

Mr. M. Harvey presented the audited accounts for 1969. The General Fund showed a balance of £46. Income showed a drop in Stewardship contributions, but an increase in collections, because during the year the Vicar and Churchwardens had decided not to take the 8 a.m. Holy Communion collections for the Altar Fund for the time being. Diocesan Quota had risen from £392 in 1968 to £549 in 1969, but would not be any higher in 1970. Donations and grants to missions and charities totalled £352, leaving £800 spent on parochial needs.

Reports from the Vicar, the P.C.C. and its committees, Stewardship, the Parish Review, the Mothers' Union, had been duplicated and circulated at the meet-Total communicant numbers (2850) had been slightly above the average for the last 8 years. The major festivals (especially Christmas with so much illness this year) showed a decrease. There was likely to be an acute shortage of Sunday School teachers later this year. Some parents of children at Sunday School might like to volunteer for this work, for which training is provided. "100 Hymns for Today", a newly published supplement to Hymns A. & M., was introduced for the church services, in November.

During the year the Diocesan Dilapidations Board obtained planning permission for the demolition of the present vicarage and the development of the site, with a view to selling the land, and the building of a new, smaller vicarage house in the paddock to the north. The Church Commissioners have now approved designs for the new vicarage by Mr. T. R. Bateman A.R.I.B.A.

The revised Electoral Roll contains 379 names.

The P.C.C. have had under consideration the future of the two cottages owned by the Church. Some modernisation is needed if the cottages are to continue to be let for any length of time. But a preferred alternative is to demolish both cottages eventually and build a small church hall on the site. Outline planning consent has been obtained for this.

During the year a good deal of work had been done on the belfry. To keep pigeons out and to discourage them from nesting, anodised aluminium wire had been fitted between the louvres and tracery in the bellchamber windows.

For the Stewardship Fund Mr. J. F. Ives reported a steady drop in contributions from £955 in 1963 to £705 in 1969. Last year showed the biggest decrease, £126. This posed serious questions, which the meeting discussed. It was agreed that the P.C.C. would have to face the question of a renewal campaign in the parish.

Mrs. Sears reported the Parish Review sales, including Wickhamford, as being about 470 at the end of the year.

In the Pastoral Committee report, Mrs. Bell (absent through illness) stresed the need for more volunteers to visit the house-bound and sick, and collect prescriptions. A list was passed round at the meeting, and several put down their names, but we could do with still more.

Before the elections, the Vicar explained some of the provisions in the Synodical Government Measure. The meeting had first to elect the representatives from the parish to the more important body, the Deanery Synod, and they would serve for 3 years, being also ex-officio members of the Parochial Church Council. Afterwards they had to choose other persons to serve on the P.C.C. only, for one year.

Various matters were raised in the discussion which followed. It was suggested that the social life of the church needed strengthening, and it was generally agreed that more socials ought to be arranged. But some felt that the usual type of social we have had, with about 100 people, and an organised programme of games and entertainment, was somewhat hectic. For getting to know people better, something more informal, and on a smaller scale, seemed to be needed. The hope was expressed that joint services might be arranged with Wickhamford, in each other's churches in turn.
