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THE VICAR'S LETTER

20th March, 1971

My dear People,

This month begins with the commemoration of a peaceful demonstration. It was held in the city of Jerusalem on the day we now call Palm Sunday. In these days it is perfectly clear to us why the Lord Jesus took such trouble to conceal his plans. The ass on which he was to ride (symbol of non-violence) had been bespoken by private arrangement, and was only released by the agents on delivery of a password. We know so well how a peaceful 'demo', if advertised in advance, is manipulated by violent elements whose only aim is to disrupt order. (Thus 'civil rights' was taken over by IRA).

When Jesus strode into the Temple and drove out the capitalist racketeers, the Zealots were no doubt muscling up for a real showdown with the imperialist militarists. But nothing happened. The Man from Nazareth was a washout. That was what cooled the popular enthusiasm for Jesus; he disappointed them. He would not use violence; nor would he let himself be used.

The crowd that had assembled outside Government House on Good Friday were probably not there to agitate against Jesus. They were simply an antiestablishment mob who had been got there to demand the release of the terrorist Barabbas. When the governor tried to palm them off with Jesus instead of Barabbas, their fury was aroused. It was vented on Jesus himself, not because he was dangerous, but because he was irrelevant. It was easy to change the chant of BAR-ABB-AS! into CRU-CI-FY!

So our Lord suffered a violent death to appease the violent. Violence, opposed by violence, breeds more violence. The Zealot way only ended in the violent destruction of Jerusalem. But this particular Victim of violence drew all its poison into himself, and neutralised it there. So his Cross is life and health. The risen Christ bears the scars, the marks of violence, to show his Church that it is through the absorption of violence, not the reaction of bitterness, that the Kingdom of God triumphs in the lives of men.

A faithful churchman

The huge congregation, which could only just be accommodated, at the funeral of Maurice Harvey in Badsey Church, testified to the very wide range of his interests and the number of lives touched by his. In the fellowship of Badsey Church Council we had come to rely on him in so many ways. His practical and inventive gifts were always at the disposal of others, with conscientious loyalty. Even when one did not agree with him, there was never unpleasantness, because of his good humour, and the sense one always had that he was a dedicated fellow-worker for the Kingdom of God. He will be chiefly remembered as the much loved Headmaster of Badsey School, in which capacity he worked so conscientiously for many years. His success as a teacher was in no small measure due to his affection for children, especially the infants, whose confidence he quickly won, and who did not stand in awe of him. His family life was one of deep devotion to those nearest and dearest to him, while his public life was one of constant service to his fellow men. A regular worshipper at Badsey Church, his handling of its finances and work for the P.C.C. were signs of his deep Christian conviction. The last few years of his life he had not been a strong man and had been told by his doctor to take things easily. This was hard to understand when one saw him so happily busy in his beloved garden. A loyal friend to many people,

the village will be poorer by his passing. It can be truly said of Maurice Harvey that he lived respected, and died regretted, by all whose privilege it was to have known him.

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WICKHAMFORD ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING, 10th MARCH, 1971

At this meeting it was announced that Mrs. V. Johnson was retiring from the Hon. Treasurership; she was presented with a gift token by the Vicar on behalf of her fellow-members of the P.C.C. At a meeting of the P.C.C. held later, Mrs. B. Astley was elected as hon. treasurer in her place.

The audited accounts for 1970, which Mrs. Johnson presented, showed a balance of £38. Parochial expenses and commitments to the diocese and home and overseas missions had been met, as budgeted, but only just. The budget accepted by the meeting for 1971 showed an anticipated deficit of £100. It was agreed to hold a festival of flowers at the weekend July 17-18, with gardens open to the public as well as a floral display in the church. It was hoped that this would not only raise funds, but strengthen the loyalty of parishioners to their church.

The Vicar reported an increase in communicant numbers last year (564 as against 461 in 1969). The meeting agreed to some slight changes in the pattern of Sunday services. Beginning in May, there would be no Evensong on the 3rd Sunday. The afternoon service with Baptism on the 2nd Sunday would be an informal family service.

Miss A. Cox reported an income from the Freewill Offering Fund, with 28 members, of £444. 35 to 40 children attended Sunday School, which had contributed over £15 to missions and charities. Mrs. Parry, Hon. Sec., reported on P.C.C. proceedings, including the successful harvest supper; Mr. Dunkerley on the work of the Deanery Synod; Mr. Parry on the church fabric. Mrs. A. Sharp, Young Wives' Leader, described the varied programme of the past year. Average attendance at monthly meetings was 25. They had recently sent 42lb. of knitted squares and clothes to the Save the Children Fund.
