THE VICAR'S LETTER

20th May, 1971

My dear People,

"Sexploitation" is one of the newly minted words of our time, and how descriptive it is! Sex has become a major industry, in which our country is competing on quite favourable terms with the most permissive of its neighbours. London is the 'abortion capital of Europe', the Birmingham film "Growing Up" is selling well in Holland, yesterday a question was asked in Parliament about planning permissions for 'Sex Supermarkets'.

Pornography versus Romance

Commercial exploitation trivialises sex. Pornography is evil not only because it inflames lust, but because it treats human bodies as commodities or things. A human body cannot be considered apart from the personality of which it is the organ. This is just what pornography tries to do. Anybody's body (provided it is not old or ugly) will do for a lewd picture. But God made men and women for love, not for lust. And love is a relationship of personalities - body, mind and spirit.

But the greatest danger to a responsible attitude to sex does not lie in pornography. There are signs that a reaction in public taste is setting in. (I refuse to use this silly word "backlash"). I read the other day that cinemas in the United States are beginning to find that sexy films are no longer good box office. People are hankering for romance again, and pornography is the enemy of romance.

Sex Instruction versus Sexual Education

No, the commercial exploiters of sex are not the only menace. Probably more dangerous are the educational pundits who are plugging the sort of sex instruction in schools which is mere biological mechanics. If young people are going to grow up regarding sex as just an animal function, divorced from the love and tenderness and personal consecration of the marriage partnership, it will end in the de-humanising of humanity.

These people are perfectly sincere. They are not exploiters of sex for financial gain. They honestly believe that people should be educated to fulfil themselves by giving expression to their desires without any kind of restraint built-in by external moral standards. If these people have their way, children in this country are no longer to learn at the feet of Christ, but of Freud. Christ tells his followers to learn of him by taking upon them the yoke of his discipline, and so to find rest to their souls. Freud teaches his pupils that repression of the Ego is what is to be most avoided. There is a sense in which much of Freud's teaching can be reconciled with the way of Christ. But there are modern educators who deliberately stress the elements of Freudian psychology which are in conflict with the Christian ethic.

The general effect of these educational ideas is to encourage the young, as soon as they have reached puberty, to have 'instant sex'. No time for the pleasures of ordinary friendships, with either sex; for the joyous adventure of courtship; for the gradual flowering of personal intimacy and understanding of each other, alongside the maturing of outook which can prepare them for commitment to one another in marriage. The encouragement of 'instant sex' is surely the greatest dis-service of all to the enjoyment of youth and to the sheer delight of love between men and women that God has designed us for. If their bodies are already all too familiar to each other (or even to other parties as well), while their souls are still an unknown quantity, what is there to look forward to in the honeymoon and the years that lie ahead?

The new barbarianism

The fact is that this bestial attitude to sex is all part and parcel of the 'pop' cult of the primitive - the general revolt against civilised standards in human art and behaviour. Sexual promiscuity and vandalism are both by-products of this. The inevitable conclusion of exalting savagery is to downgrade man himself, and put him on the level of the beasts. Some popular books have come out with the idea that man is no more than a naked ape. All that the poets and artists and lovers of hundreds of years of human civilisation have expressed, of the wonder and mystery of man whom God has made in his own likeness - all this counts for nothing in the new Dark Age that seems to lie before us.

The glory of the New Man

Yet I am full of hope, because I am writing this on Ascension Day. Christ has taken our humanity into God. However low we sink sometimes towards bestiality, we have in the Lord Jesus the vision of what man is designed to be, and what he can be when his individual will is surrendered to God's will and his desires consecrated to God's glory. If anyone is in Christ, he becomes a new creature. He is dead to all the cravings which degrade his true nature and drag him down to sub-human levels. In Christ we are raised up to the heights of human fulfilment.

All the more urgency for us to dedicate ourselves each day to the extension of his Kingdom, by all that we do or say or think. The future of mankind depends upon it.

LAW AND ORDER - OLD STYLE 6

We have seen how the Parish Constable had to enforce the law about the upkeep of highways and bridges in the parish by the inhabitants. Our last entry was about Blackminster Bridge in 1700. Our next quo-

tation is from a later period. The Vestry Minutes of 1841 record: "It was determined that a Notice should be sent to the Proprietors & occupier of the Silk Mill to inform them that unless the Bridges constructed by them when they turned that road into a pond are forth-with put into good and safe repair that they will be indicted by the Parish".

At the same meeting "it was resolved unanimously

At the same meeting "it was resolved unanimously that all Cattle found trespassing on the highways in the said Parish shall be impounded by the Parish Surveyor according to the act of Parliament".

This reminds us that the waywarden and constable were concerned with animal as well as human vagrants on the roads. One of the constable's duties was to maintain the village pound, a small enclosure for the 'impounding' of stray beasts. Apparently Badsey pound was in constant need of repair. Almost every year in the early 1700's the constable had to spend sums ranging from 2d. to 6s. on "mending ye pound gate".

In 1702 there were more extensive repairs: "for posts and rails and thimbles for the pound 2-4

for 3 - load of ston and fecking (fetching) them paid for laying them up on the pound wall 1-10".

Looking after the village green was also the con-

stable's concern.
1709 "For a head of a Gate at ye Green 0-6".

Two years later: "for 5 poles and 4 poast and nailes for the gates at the green (To be continued)

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
