THE VICAR'S LETTER

18th August, 1971 My dear People,

I read recently of a special service at some church or other where they had printed hymn sheets. One of the hymns, "Guide me, O thou great Redeemer", had an unfortunate misprint: "Land my safe on Canaan's side". When the sheets were collected at the end of the service, it was found that on one of them, against this line, someone had pencilled, "You can't take it with you

Devalued Currency

We can't take any money with us to the other side of death. We shall not be able to exchange our sterling or dollars there into some celestial currency. Money is only a medium of exchange between mortal men - bits of paper or metal which serve as convenient tokens in our day-to-day transactions in this mundane life. Yet what a tremendous influence it has over our lives, as the present dollar crisis has shown! For in effect money is much more than a token. It is a means of power. It, is a god to be propitiated. Jesus observed its dominating grip over men - its potentiality as a rival to God. He gave it a proper name. "No one can serve two masters. You cannot serve God and Mammon".

So money needs putting in its proper place. We need to show it that it is not really a god; only bits of paper and metal which can be truly useful in the service of God. Flatter it and enthrone it, and it becomes Mammon, a nasty greedy monster that wants to eat you up.

Why then am I going on about it, and giving it an importance which it does not deserve? Is it because I am leading up to asking you to part with the stuff, and dispose of it to the Church?

Can it be that I am now about to drag in that wellworn word Stewardship?

You have hit it. I am. But not in the sense of the popular misconception: of old Mother Church going round with a begging-bowl.

Gift of Life

We talk about the Stewardship of Money, Time and Abilities. These are merely convenient tabulations. Christian Stewardship is not primarily concerned with any of these. It is concerned with Life. John Bailey reminded us of this in his article in the July number. We cannot be reminded often enough. So I cannot think of anything better to say about Christian Stewardship. I shall merely dot the i's and cross the t's. It is concerned with Life.

Christ said He had come that men might have life, and have it abundantly. Christian Stewardship is simply the way we try to accept, and respond to, God's gift to us of life in Christ.

Jesus was saddened by the way people miss this gift of life. "Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God"! It is like a dropped catch. People lose the real thing because their hands are full. They are trying to get their fingers round too many things at once, and to claim them as their belongings. But the great thing about the ball of life is that if you do catch it you immediately throw it back to the bowler, so that the game can go on. Jesus said: "Whoever tries to keep his life will lose it; whoever loses his life for my sake will gain it".

Life is not a static thing that you can preserve by locking it up in a safe or putting it in a glass case. It

is flowing all the time, out to us from the Source, and back again from us in thanksgiving and dedication. So Jesus cried aloud like an eastern water-seller: "If anyone is thirsty, let him come to me. Whoever believes in me, let him drink. As Scripture says, 'Streams of living water shall flow out from within him'".

Sharing

Those who had caught the gift of life from Christ knew that it could only be kept by losing it in the lives of others, i.e. by sharing it. We are told in the Acts of the Apostles of the early Church: "The whole body of believers was united in heart and soul. Not a man of them claimed any of his possessions as his own, but everything was held in common". So Christian Stewardship is not solely an individual effort that a man makes for the good of his own soul. It is an activity of the whole Christian fellowship - a sharing of the time, abilities and wealth that God has entrusted to us, so that the gift of life may flow freely and abundantly.

That is why, in both our parishes, we have planned freewill offering schemes, and why in Badsey parish this year we are having a renewal of our original Christian Stewardship Scheme launched ten years ago.

But let me emphasise again that Christian Stewardship is not primarily concerned with money. It certainly is not a fund-raising device. Even if the Church had all the funds it needed for its work, we should still need to practise Christian Stewardship. "A church that lives to itself dies by itself."

Free Flow

So we pray that the effort that has been planned for this autumn in Badsey will be more than a renewal of pledges to planned giving (important though that is). By God's grace it can be a renewal of our whole commitment to Christ, not only as individuals, but as a Christian community. That thankful dedication of all that we have and are, in union with the perfect Sacrifice of Christ, could be a freeing of blocked channels, the opening of the sluices, that the fullness of life might be ours.

"See, the streams of living waters, Springing from eternal love, Well supply thy sons and daughters, And all fear of want remove. Who can faint while such a river Ever flows their thirst to assuage; Grace, which like the Lord the Giver, Never fails from age to age?"
