### THE VICAR'S LETTER

15th December, 1971

My dear People,

For most people a new year brings hopes of new beginnings. We know that the world goes on in exactly the same way on 1st January as on 31st December. Popes and premiers give New Year messages, but they do not expect the results to be so immediate as when they press a switch to open a dam or launch a ship. Outwardly the world continues the same - violence, lust, oppression, crime still claiming their daily victims. So they did the day after Christ was born, no less than the day before.

Outwardly the world goes on as before. But the thoughtful commemoration of an anniversary can bring about an inward revolution in a person's life which may in time alter the course of the world's history.

The turn of the year comes during the twelve-day festival of Christ's Nativity. Christmas will have meant very little to us unless the Birth of Christ takes place anew in our lives. "You must be born again" was the startling thing Jesus said to a middle-aged enquirer. I don't expect any of us enjoyed being born. No doubt it would have been nicer to stay in the warm, dark, comfy womb. But we had no choice in the matter. We had to come out into the light.

It is different with spiritual re-birth. We can choose to remain where we are - an undeveloped embryo, cosily secure but in the dark. A new birth means also a death - an end to accepted ideas, easy ways, lazy habits of mind or body. No one who has come to find the new-born King can be at ease in the old kingdom where Self has reigned.

#### Without delay

The Wise Men reached their goal because they obeyed immediately the divine impulse to follow the guiding star.

"True love can brook no dull delay: Through toils and dangers lie their way; And yet their homes, their friends, their all, They leave at once, at God's high call."

So too with the Shepherds: "Let us go even now unto Bethlehem ... And they came with haste." Towards the end of the month we celebrate the Conversion of St. Paul, a reminder that we all need spiritual conversion. "Get up", he was told, "and go into the city, and you will be told what you have to do." "Whereupon", as he told King Agrippa many years later, "I was not disobedient to the heavenly vision."

Another thought comes from the Feast of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple. The old man Simeon had longed to see the promised Christ before he died. One day he felt an inward urge from God to go into the Temple to pray. He obeyed at once, and there was the Desire of all nations waiting for him. Suppose he had put off his visit to the Temple, just by a few minutes. Christ would have come, but Simeon would have missed his chance.

#### Today

Looking back on your own life, do you not regret the many opportunities lost through not responding at once to some inward urge which you knew to be holy? Somethling that struck home once when you were hearing one of the lessons read in church, perhaps. You knew God was speaking to you. When you got home, you let other voices crowd in, other interests, concerns and pleasures, and God was not allowed to resume his conversation with you. The thing to have done was to make a definite appointment for renewing the encounter: a resolution to set aside a particular time, before that day had become yesterday.

"Today, if ye will hear his voice, harden not your earts." We just do not know what we have missed in

the past through our sloth. If you are making New Year resolutions, ask yourself this. Is there something which God has been urging and prodding me to do, but which I have put off? If I put it off any longer, can I be sure that I shall have the urge again? What does my commitment to Christ mean, if I am not prepared to listen to Him or do what He asks in the immediate matters of today?

These New Year resolutions must be decisions for today, not vague aspirations towards doing something in the course of the twelvemonth.

Happy New Year then! "Happy", says our Lord, "is that servant who is found at his task when his master

#### ELECTORAL ROLL

In 1972 a completely new Church Electoral Roll has to be drawn up for every parish in the country. No names from the old Roll will be automatically kept on. Everyone who wishes to be on the Electoral Roll must apply. The date for Badsey and Aldington before which application must be made is Feb. 22nd.

The application forms may be obtained at the church, or from the Vicar, or from the Electoral Roll Officer, Miss L. D. Core, 7, Old Post Office Lane, Badsey. When completed, they should be returned to her, or placed in the box in the church for this purpose.

It is sincerely to be hoped that all regular communicants and church members over the age of 17 will apply to be enrolled.

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting this year is to be on Tuesday, 14th March.

Home and Overseas Missions. The money sent to U.S.P.G. from the boxes in 1971 amounted to £62.26, an improvement on last year. A good way of giving regularly to help the Church Overseas is by having such a box at home, and putting in a regular amount each week. Boxes can be obtained at the church, or from Miss N. E. Smith. There are also the Children's Society boxes, from Mrs. A. Owen. Report of proceeds from these in 1971 and Christmas collections in next issue.

Grants from P.C.C. funds were made as follows: C.M.S. £30; S.P.C.K. £30; B. & F. Bible Soc. £30; Homes for Retired Clergy £10. It is hoped to increase these grants next year, when the results of increased giving from the Stewardship Renewal are seen. The Sunday School, from the children's collections, have given £10 towards the nursing training of Saria Joel at St. Monica's Hospital, Maciene, and £10 to the Worcester Cathedral Appeal.

What is a Christingle? On Sat., 11th December two children from Badsey Sunday School presented purses containing a total of £12.50 at a Christingle Service at Worcester Cathedral. The money had been raised at a Coffee Morning organised by Mrs. Owen in aid of the Church of England Children's Society.

This service at which children are presented with a "Christingle" – that is, an orange with a candle in the top, decorated with fruits and nuts and bound with red ribbon – is a revival of a Moravian Church custom. The orange represents the world, the candle the Light of the World, the fruits and nuts the fruits of the earth, and the red ribbon the Blood of Christ.

Every child in the Cathedral received a "Christingle" after the presentation of purses, and carried them lighted in a colourful procession. The candles were put out after the Blessing, to be re-lit on Christmas Day.
