THE VICAR'S LETTER

16th February, 1972.

My dear People,

"We demand to be heard ... we want our rights ... our grievances must be settled."

This seems to be the bitter, complaining mood of humanity on all sides. The television screen and daily newspaper give us as our staple diet the means and resentments of angry fools with chips on their shoul-

Consider the Man who carried on his, not a chip, but a heavy cross.

"The divine nature was his from the first, yet he did not think to snatch at the right to be equal with God, but made himself nothing... He humbled himself, and in obedience even accepted death - death on a cross." (Phil. 3, vv. 6, 8).

Most of our miseries come from the feelings that we have rights to be snatched at. What it boils down to is that we think we have the right to be equal with God. We are such splendid judges - in our own cause.

The Mind of Christ

I write in the midst of the power and fuel crisis ' arising from the miners' strike, and of ever-mounting bitterness in Ireland. Do not expect me to comment on either. Whatever I were to say would be outdated by the time this is in print. Also my own views on the rights and wrongs are no more valid than those of any other member of the public. What I do think needs saying is that as Christians we have got to be very careful not to be carried away by the world's resentments and become angry fools ourselves. "Let your bearing towards one another", says St. Paul, "arise out of your life in Christ Jesus". Then he goes on to describe the mind of Christ, in the passage quoted

During Lent, and as we approach Good Friday, let us try to enter into the mind of Christ who uncomplainingly accepted the worst that men could do to him, and so made the shameful cross the instrument of healing and peace.

That most excellent gift ...

I am writing just after Quinquagesima Sunday, when we pray for the divine gift of Charity. Charity is the virtue which seems to be most lacking in public relationships today. Many people interviewed on television or making public utterances think themselves so incontestably right that they will not allow that the other side has a case, or that their opponents are motivated by anything but malice. There are far too many of these interviews, press conferences, and requests for statements. Publicity is a heady wine that goes to a man's head. Knowing that he is being carefully watched by the people on his own side, he is tempted to take an inflexible, belligerent attitude from which he cannot later retract. He has deprived himself of room to manoeuvre. So people drift further apart.

How refreshing it would be to hear one of these otagonists say: "Although we do not agree with the protagonists say: other side's case, we appreciate that they have their difficulties, and we believe they are well-intentioned."

Dangerous demand

It is a dangerous thing we do when we assert our rights - dangerous to ourselves. If we mercilessly insist on what we declare to be justly due to us from our fellow-men, we shall receive from God what is justly due to us - from Him. As Portia said to Shylock:

"Though justice be thy plea, consider this,
That in the course of justice none of us
Should see salvation; we do pray for mercy,
And that same prayer doth teach us all to render The deeds of mercy.'

"We all think we have rights - rights to so much pleasure and ease, rights to be let alone, rights to spend most of our money on ourselves, rights to receive apologies, rights to get our own back, rights to neglect other people's cares and concerns unless we have a fancy to meddle with them." (Austin Farrer, "The Crown of the Year").

Mirror of ourselves

Yes, when you or I watch those angry fools on the television screen, let us remember that we may be looking at a mirror of ourselves.

We may even be thinking at that moment that we have a right to be angry with them, instead of a duty to be compassionate.

Resentment, bitterness, complaining, grievance these quench all the joy in life that our Creator made us for.

So we must keep our gaze fixed on Jesus, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame.
