THE VICAR'S LETTER

20th March, 1972.

My dear People,

Several old landmarks in Badsey have been disappearing: the Vicarage, the Bell Inn, the Mill House. There is nothing new about this. Demolition, adapta-tion, re-building have been going on in Badsey, as in other villages all through its history. Our forefathers had no cult of Conservationism. They did not preserve buildings for their antiquarian or picturesque qualities.

So we cannot blame the R.D.C. that, in its decision to adapt Silk Mill cottages to modern living conditions, it was unable to make use of the oldest part. This might have involved considerable public expenditure without justifiable result.

Nevertheless, it has been sad to see the old mill house go, with its grey weathered stone walls and mellow red tiles, and the date stone with the inscription SJE 1711. Joseph Smith the miller and his wife Elizabeth, with a growing family, presumably re-placed an older and less suitable building with this one. The mill was in the hands of this Smith family for generations, and exactly 100 years later, at the time of the Badsey Enclosure Act, Anthony Smith was in possession. Soon after that it was converted into a silk mill, and the big red brick building added, in those days a tall structure with four storeys, like many textile mills of the period.

There is no separate mention in Doomsday Book of a mill at Badsey, as there is at Aldington. But later we know that Badsey mill, like Aldington and Wickhamford mills, belonged to Evesham Abbey, and had to supply eels for the monastic refectory from its pond.

The silk mill does not seem to have been in operation for more than about twenty years. I do not know the exact dates. It seems to have been an offshoot of the successful silk mills at Blockley. The name of the proprietor (or manager) at Badsey was Wingfield Gee. Bentley's Directory of 1841 says: "A little S. of the church stands a silk-mill, which gives employment to about 70 of the villagers." This is not borne out by the National Census Schedules for that year, which list the occupations of only 5 people in Badsey, 9 in Wickhamford, and none in Aldington, as connected with the silk industry (throwsters, winders, yarnsters). No doubt there were several workers from other villages. But the business was probably already collapsing. In the Census of 1851 there is no trace of it. Billings' Directory of 1855 has this: "There is a silk factory in the parish, which has been closed for some time, but work is about to be resumed, the premises having been taken by Mr. Isaac Gee, who intends to carry on the trade on an extensive scale.'

These intentions did not materialise. The buildings and plant were sold by auction on 12th October, 1863. The bill of sale has a very interesting inventory of the machinery. The building was bought by William Parker, who resided at Badsey Manor. He knocked off the two top storeys, and converted the rest into tenement houses in 1864, as the date-stone in the central gable shows.

I suppose that neither he nor Wingfield Gee nor Joseph Smith would have been surprised to be told that further demolitions and alterations would take place

Change and decay, patching up, final dissolution. That is the lot of the earthly bodies that house us too. Just as well, because what we need is not conservation

REPORT OF ANNUAL VESTRY & ANNUAL CHURCH MEETING, MARCH 14

This year there was a disappointing attendance of only 23 parishioners.

The Vicar spoke appreciatively of Mrs. Anne Clark's work as churchwarden and regretted her having left the parish. He also thanked Mr. Don Hartwell, and Mr. Peter Tucker, Deputy Warden. Mr. Hartwell and Mr. Ralph Taylor were then elected Churchwardens for the coming year.

Mr. Michael Wood, Hon. Treasurer, was absent owing to the illness of his infant son. Appreciation was expressed of his able handling of the finances since taking over at short notice after the much lamented death of Mr. Maurice Harvey. The audited accounts were passed, showing a total expenditure from the general fund of £1728, of which £473 had been sent to Diocesan Quota, and £280 to missions and charities.

The Vicar reported that communicant numbers in 1971 (2875) were higher than the previous year, but not much above the average, which had remained constant for the last 20 years, in spite of increased population. The number of sick Communions continued to increase, there being 134 in 1971. The Sunday School had again suffered losses in teaching staff. The main feature of parochial life in 1971 had been the Christian Stewardship Renewal, exactly 10 years after the original campaign. Mr. J. F. Ives reported that, as a result, promises had been received which, with tax refund on the covenants, would bring an increase of about £500 p.a. The response offering time and ability was not so encouraging. Total membership 119.

Other reports were given of the formation of the Young Wives' Group, now numbering 46; repairs to the church fabric at a total cost of over £400; from the Pastoral and the Overseas Committees, and the Mothers' Union. The new Electoral Roll numbered 199 names against 366 on the old one. Sales of the Parish Review average 440-450 a month, but owing to increasing costs the price in 1973 would be 30p. per annum.

Discussion took place on the poor attendance at the administration of Public Baptism with Mattins on the 4th Sunday. It was agreed that, for an experimental period, beginning in May, Baptism would be administered at shortened Evensong at 4-0 p.m. on the 3rd Sunday, with no evening service that Sunday. It was hoped also that parents and godparents might find this time more convenient.

The Vicar said he wanted to encourage the laity to take increasing responsibility in public worship. He hoped the monthly 'People's Service' would be planned and conducted by different groups and committees, as had been done twice last year.
