#### FAREWELL SERVICE AND PRESENTATIONS

The large number who assembled for Evensong on Sunday, 5th February will not soon forget that service and the farewell sermon preached by our Vicar, the Revd. Peter Braby, before he left Badsey to become Vicar of Temple Guiting with Cutsdean on the Wednesday of that week. His text was from Isaiah, chap. 43, verses 18 and 19 (NEB): "Cease to dwell on days gone by and to brood over past history. Here and now I will do a new thing; this moment it will break into bud." In a striking and relevant address he spoke of the value of tradition in maintaining community life, a precious inheritance in an increasingly rootless age, but warned against the dangers of remaining tied to old customs and ideas. Tradition means literally a handing on, but it is something which must be built upon. We learn from the faithfulness and experience of all who have served the Church in former times, but we must not simply continue in the well-trodden paths of "what we have always done", for each generation is called by God to new ways of life, worship and Christian service, in the power of the Holy Spirit.

When the service was ended, Mr. Donald Hartwell made a short, appropriate speech in appreciation of all that Mr. and Mrs. Braby have done for the church and parish of Badsey and Aldington during their 15 years here. He then presented them with a cheque for £108 and a set of Worcester china dishes, a parting gift from parishioners. A special presentation from the choir followed, when Philip Brazier (choir-boy) and Nicola Cleaver (choir-girl) handed to Mrs. Braby a red glass goblet and to Mr. Braby a book-token. They gave warm thanks for the presentations and said that they hoped to have many friends from their old parish coming to see them at Temple Guiting in the course of the year.

#### A LETTER FROM THE VICAR-DESIGNATE

#### to Parishioners of Badsey, Aldington and Wickhamford

Dear Parishioners.

First I should like to say how much we are looking forward to our move to Worcestershire, to meeting you all and to living in our new home in Badsey.

The first glimpse we had of the two parishes was in 1971 on our way to holiday in Wales, and little did we realise then as we drove down the A44 skirting the edge of Wickhamford, that one day we would be living in such a beautiful part of the world as the Vale of Evesham. As you can probably guess, since last November my wife and I with our three year old son, Daniel, have penetrated further than the A44 into Wickhamford and Badsey. We have visited your two beautiful and well-kept churches . . . Daniel was so much taken with the gallery that we had the greatest difficulty in dislodging him. We have been able to look around the villages, and we have enjoyed the hospitality of Mr. and Mrs. Braby at the Vicarage. Also, I have met the Churchwardens, who were able to tell me much about the two parishes. All of which has made me look forward eagerly to April 3rd.

Not all new Incumbents are so fortunate as I have been in having a predecessor who has taken so much care in making the "Succession' as smooth as possible. Mr. Braby has really been extremely helpful with his advice and guidance, and for this I am most grateful. It is good to know that he will not be very far away at Temple Guiting.

You will, I dare say, be wondering what your new Vicar is like, and as one of the purposes of this letter is to introduce my family and myself, perhaps I should now do this. First, I think you ought to know that this is my first appointment as an Incumbent, and so I cannot disguise the fact that I shall be very green at the job. I am afraid that you are going to have to be patient and forbearing! I was ordained seven years ago, after having taught for some years, and my first post was as curate in a parish in Coventry. It was there that I met Christine who was teaching in one of the schools which we junior clergy had to visit as part of our post-Ordination training; matrimony was not intended by the organisers as an essential part of the course, but it has proved to be one of its most enduring and valuable effects.

From Coventry we moved in 1969 to Berinsfield, which is a new housing estate in the parish of Dorchester on Thame in Oxfordshire. It was here that our son Daniel was born at the very end of 1969. As we are surrounded by countryside, my wife has been able to pursue her hobby of riding, in the intervals of spare time she manages to find from her work as a social worker, employed by the Local Authority.

A question which is often asked of the new Incumbent of a rural parish is whether or not he is a countryman, and he is often made to feel that his future ministry depends upon his giving the correct reply! I never know in my case how to answer this one, but if I tell you that I was born within the sound of the Muezzin in Cairo, spent some of my early childhood in earshot of the bells of the Russian Church in Jerusalem, went to school within sight of the English Channel, and passed some of my happiest school holidays alternately in London and the Kentish and Sussex countryside, then perhaps you can draw your own conclusions.

Let me end, as I began, by saying how much we are looking forward to April 3rd and by asking you for your prayers on that occasion and during the time ahead.
