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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

I want to begin by quoting some words written three hundred years ago by George Herbert, vicar of Bemerton in Wiltshire, but better known as a poet and Hymn writer:—

'The Country Parson upon the afternoons of the weekdays, takes occasion sometimes to visit in person, now one quarter of his parish, now another. For there he shall find his flock most naturally as they are, wallowing in the midst of their affairs.'

The point is still valid, although I doubt whether many parishioners would agree with the word 'wallow', unless they took it as a description of a particularly bad morning with the washing machine. It is the ideal of the parish system that the parson can keep in touch with his people during the weekdays when they are going about their normal business, and in an earlier age this ideal was most clearly realized when he had to hoe his bit of Glebe alongside the rest of the community.

However, when George Herbert wrote those words, there was one very important difference in Village life: everyone worked, ate, played and slept within the parish. Take Wickhamford, for example. At that time the population was somewhere between 100 and 150. About 40 of these would be able-bodied men, and the rest would be women, children and the aged. In the course of an afternoon's walk across the fields the parson could, and probably did, see (to wave to, if not to talk to) every head of family within his parish, and no doubt on his return from the fields he would look in at those cottages where there was illness or need.

Times have changed. Patterns of employment have altered. Population figures have soared. Much of the change has been for the better. Let's not be romantic about life in the 17th century; much of it was 'Nasty, brutish and short'. One of the results of these changes is that George Herbert's ideal for visiting is in many parishes no longer practicable. I still think however, that the main point of 'visiting now one quarter of the parish, now another' is valid, even if the visiting has to be drastically selective and even if some parishioners never see the parson from one end of the year to the other.

Another result of the modern diversification of work and recreation is that there is no longer any certainty about the best time for calling, and when the parson eventually **does** get round to calling, ten to one his visit will clash with the World Cup / Baby's feed / a visit from the In-Laws / Wimbledon, or whatever. (I remember once calling on an old lady, and interrupting her weekly dose of All-in Wrestling. The sound on the TV was duly switched down, but all the time we

talked and sipped tea from delicate Victorian china, those silent ogres writhed and grimaced in the corner of her parlour. It was an unnerving visit).

And now let me get to the point, and keep you no longer from 'Wallowing in your affairs'. My intention as your Vicar is to get round the three villages as much as possible. Whether I can suit the action to the word remains to be seen. What I do ask of you is this: if you feel that I have neglectel any part of the parishes, or have overlooked a family which you think want me to call, then please let me know. There are bound to be oversights, and unless someone gives the Vicar a prompt he won't be able to put things right.
