VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends.

We have at this time of year two important festivals, one better known than the other. Harvest Thanksgiving is I suppose one of the better known events in the Christian Calendar, and in parishes where agriculture of one form or another is the chief industry it is fitting that people should want to thank God for the gifts of Nature. Less well known, though I believe equally important is St. Luke's Tide. At this time the Church, bearing in mind that Luke was a physician, thanks God for the skill of the medical profession, and for the achievements of medical science.

In an earlier and pre-scientific age the quality of the harvest, be it fruit, vegetable or grain, depended to a much greater degree upon forces outside man's control than is the case nowadays. With modern methods there is an increasingly small area of chance, and a correspondingly growing area where man can claim to be in charge. Weather, I suppose remains the one chief factor still outside the farmer's control.

The same was true of Medicine. Going to the doctor for our mediaeval ancestors was an extremely hazardous business. As for going to the dentist . . . well, when one recalls that there were no dentists as such, only barbers who did a bit of tooth-drawing on the side, one can imagine the horrors involved. I remember seeing in a history book when I was at school a copy of an old picture illustrating how one of these barbers went about his jolly trade. The memory of the picture still makes my flesh creep.

In those far-off days men turned to God and bid him intervene on their behalf in those wide regions which lay outside their control. Good Health, like a good harvest, was seen as a direct gift from God. Conversely, a disastrous harvest or a dangerous fever were thought to be evidence of Divine disapproval. There was in their praying a tone which we would now find unacceptable. A God whom we can manipulate to fill our barns or cure our agues is as remote from modern experience as the God who afflicts humanity with disease and drought as a means of punishment.

I believe that Christians have been helped by the discoveries of science towards a maturer understanding of God's Providence. We now see the 'Act of God' no longer in the sudden and inexplicable turn of fate (a miraculous healing to show God's approval, or a thunderbolt to mark his rage) but rather in the careful and gradual advance in man's knowledge and control of his environment. We thank God for the skills he has given humanity, and as long as we remember that all human knowledge is a gift from God, we shall not fall into the error of believing ourselves to be self-sufficient.
