#### THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

I want to write this month about the Church's Ministry of Healing. You will recall from your reading of the Bible that again and again Our Lord expressed His ministry in terms of making people whole . . . physically, mentally and spiritually. When He commissioned His apostles, He sent them out 'to preach the Kingdom of God and to heal' (Lk.9. 1-2), and according to the record in the Acts the Church carried out His command.

For a long time now the Church has been carrying out Christ's ministry of Healing, but with the emphasis upon the Spiritual aspect of Man. In recent years there has been a movement within our own Anglican tradition as well as in the branches of Christ's Church to revive that other aspect of Our Lord's work: bodily and mental healing. By using the sacraments of Unction and of Laying on of Hands, and through the intercession of Prayer Groups, the Church is seeking to express her belief that Our Lord can and does cure a person at the deepest level of his being. That this cure is often manifest in physical and mental, as well as spiritual, healing is seen not only in the New Testament, but also in the experience of many men and women of our own times.

But I must stress this: our prayer to Christ is that He heal us at the deepest level of our being. To seek healing merely at the physical level is to miss the point of His Gospel.

At Weston Subedge parish Church from March 18th to 20th there is to be a **Healing Mission** under the guidance of a priest of the C. of E., the Revd. George

#### ST. JAMES, BADSEY 1924

Easter Day 1974 brings memories of my first service as organist 50 years ago today. The first service, 11 o'clock, started with a processional hymn from the porch. Canon Allsebrook's splendid alto voice led the choir (he always did!) I'll always remember George Jones ("Corporal") saying to me before the service "As long as we all end up on the same note that's all that matters!" How right he was! At the time I was 15 years old, and some of the choir boys were bigger than me. I cycled from Evesham along the lane. Only once did I miss a service, when I got to the village end the road was flooded too deep for me to get through.

The organ at that time was made by Price of Cheltenham, had 4 stops and small pedal board, blown by a long handle on the side. The last time I saw it, it was in Rous Lench Church.

The lighting was by oil lamps and two long swivel candle holders on the organ, these swivelled and if knocked, splashed fat onto the keyboard and my clothes.

The men in the choir, as far as I can remember were John Byrd, Harry Green, George Jones, Charles Knight, Bob Pethard, Archie Reed, Bill Sparrow, and the boys, in some cases more than one in a family, over the 18 years included S. Crisp, F. Field, D. Jelfs, the Kings, F. Knight, Major, D. Pethard, T. Sadler, P. Sparrow, the Wheatleys; those I have omitted please forgive, it's a long time ago.

There were two highlights in the year, the Choir outing and Christmas Day with carol singing round the village after Evensong. Canon Allsebrook always arranged the outing, everyone enjoyed themselves, including the organiser. I well remember my first Christmas Day here. I cycled over 3 times for the services, after Evensong the choir went round the village singing carols. Afterwards all the men went to George Jones' for supper. He and Mrs. Jones put on a real good Christmas meal. The rest of the time was spent singing country songs, (folk songs). I was amazed to hear Charles Knight singing songs of 20-30 verses with chorus, considering the refreshment taken round the village it was remarkable! I think I arrived home about 3 or 4 a.m. after a busy and enjoyable day.

The Parish Clerk, George Moisey was a splendid character, and took a real pride in his office. He was also a good shot and I used to take him shooting in the Cotswolds.

Alfred Sparrow, a very interesting person always arrived first at Evensong; we greeted each other in Spanish. I was studying Spanish at the time.

C. A. Binyon, who took a great pride in the clock – it was always accurate – once put a  $\frac{1}{2}$ d. on the weights to get it right, he was also the leader of the Bellringers.

The best services for singing were Harvest Festival and the Armistice service. The church would be full and everyone sang their best.

I have two personal memories of St. James' – the day of my marriage, Douglas Pethard took the organ for the service. I arrived early, and getting rather impatient waiting for my Bride I played the organ for a time. The other was when my son was married here and I played the organ for this service.

Space forbids further memories, but I have many more pleasant ones of people and happenings in the village.
