Dear Friends,

First, let me say how splendid it was to have such a good number of you at the Holy Week and Easter Day services in Church. For me, and for many of you, the high point of joy came at the Family Eucharists in the two Parish Churches on Easter Day, with both buildings looking so beautiful, filled with so many families, young and old, and resounding with the music of the well-known Easter hymns. It really was a happy occasion, though 'happy' is perhaps a weak word in this context ... 'triumphant' is more appropriate, I think,

During the week after Easter I took a few days off, spending some of the time digging in the garden, and also browsing through the parish records of the past two or three centuries ... both of which activities taught me how little I know about horticulture and archives, but persuading me that if there were forty-eight instead of twenty-four hours in each day, both subjects would make a fascinating study.

One of the interesting things about parish life in the last century (and this is of more than merely academic interest) was the close interlocking of social and religious affairs. The Vestry Meetings under the chairmanship of one of the churchwardens, or the vicar, would deal with the whole range of local life from maintenance of the public roads and election of constables on the one hand to the repair of the Church bells and the enclosure of the Churchyard on the other.

Another interesting fact to emerge from even the most cursory glance at the parish records is the small scale of local life. In 1861 the population figures were: Aldington, 141, Badsey, 405, and Wickhamford, 124. Nowadays we are told that communities of that size are no longer 'viable', and are unable to control their affairs efficiently or economically, and yet a century ago these little communities appointed their own constables, maintained their own roads, administered their own poor relief, ran their own school, fixed their own rates, and manned their own Fire Brigade! Of course, there were instances of corruption and of inefficiency, but when such instances did occur they were on a parochial scale, and therefore more easily corrected.

It used to be fashionable to decry village life as being out of date, and incompetent. 'Parochial' became a dirty word. But now after years of urban experiments, the New Town planners are coming round to the view that people flourish in precisely those small groups which used to be the target of scorn, and so the ancient features of village life are being deliberately recreated in, for example, a new town like Milton Keynes with its neighbourhood schools, its neighbourhood shops and its neighbourhood councils. Sociologically, the small unit is back in fashion. Administratively, the trend is to-wards the bigger unit, but, no doubt, the pendulum will swing back again.

All of which brings me to the point of this rambling discourse, and that is the inestimable value of village life not only to those of us fortunate enough to live in such small communities, but also to the nation as a whole which is now beginning to look to the villages to provide it with a sane style of living.

On Sunday, June 9th, at 6-30 p.m., there will be in Badsey Parish Church a special service of thanksgiving for our villages and what they have given us. I have consulted Mr. Ron Churchill, the chairman of Badsey Parish Council, and at his suggestion have invited the members of the Council to participate in the service. I hope that other sections of Village Life will also be represented. At a later date perhaps could we not do something similar at Wickhamford?

The following poem was written by a member of the congregation who was present at the service, when Bishop Allenby confirmed twenty-three candidates from Aldington, Badsey and Wickhamford. I think it describes far better than can any prose account that happy occasion.

I saw a flock of young white doves They settled pair, by pair, With folded wings and dewy-eyed Before the bishop's chair.

Each answered softly to its name As prayerful hands were layed, An armslength off, a young priest knelt And intercession made.

The Annual Vestry and Parochial Church Meeting

This was held in the Parish Church immediately after Evensong on the last Sunday of March. The attendance was better than last year (there were about forty present compared with last year's figure of twenty-five), but it should be pointed out that forty is still only a minority of our adult church members. Churchwardens: Mr. D. Hartwell (Vicar's Warden) and Mr. R. Taylor (People's Warden), and Mr. P. Tucker (Deputy Warden). Hon. Treasurer: Mr. K. Cole. Deanery Synod members: Mr. and Mrs. A. Owen, Mrs. Betteridge (these three were elected last year for three years) and Mr. G. Willcox. **P.C.C.:** Messrs. J. Bartlett G. Toney, P. Tucker, R. Kyte, S. Gresty, H. Hatcher; and Mesdames Bell, Floyd, Harvey, P. Sparrow, Reed, Leak, Watkin; and Mesdemoiselles Sladden and Core.

Historical Footnote: In April 1869 the election of the People's Churchwarden was keenly contested by Mr. Thomas Hall (proposed by Richard Wilkins, seconded by William Bennett) and Mr. John Phipps. A poll of Mr. Hazeldene, seconded by Alfred Roberts). A poll of all the electors of Aldington and Badsey was held, and the result (after two votes had been disallowed) was Hall, 52; Phipps, 52. The Vicar, the Revd. Thomas Hunt had to use his casting vote, and Mr. Phipps was duly elected as People's Warden. The total number of votes cast was 107)including the two which were disqualified).

As the total population was at that time about 600 (of which a large number were either below the voting age, or too infirm to reach the polling station at the old school) this was an unusually high poll. History does not relate the personal issues which lay behind this election!
