VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

I want to write this month about Funeral Services . . . a gloomy subject you might think, but what I want to say can be said better in the context of a general letter such as this than in conversation with individual parishioners.

By an accident of history the service which is normally used at funerals in Anglican parish churches, is only one half of the ceremony originally prescribed, and because of this it tends to be an unbalanced and unnecessarily grim affair. Originally, the funeral rite comprised as well as the Burial Office, the Holy Eucharist (or Requiem Mass) in which the Victory of Christ over death was proclaimed and in which the faithful shared through the sacrament the Risen Life of Our Lord. By allowing the Requiem Mass to fall out of use, we retain in our funeral rite all the sorrow and grimness of death with very little of the Christian Hope of the Resurrection. Admittedly, there are in the prescribed readings and prayers references to that Hope, but the emphasis of our Burial Service is upon Man's mortality and 'the miseries of this sinful world'.

It is possible to redress this balance in two ways. One is by choosing appropriate hymns. It is not really necessary to choose gloomy hymns (of which there are distressingly many in our hymn books). There are many hymns, especially those which we sing at Easter, which are far more appropriate. I was at a Requiem Mass recently where the first hymn was the well known: 'Morning has broken like the first morning

Blackbird has spoken like the first bird. Coming as it did at the beginning of the funeral of someone who died young, this hymn and the Eucharist which followed were an unmistakeable acclamation of Hope, putting into correct perspective the sorrow of that occasion.

The other way of redressing the balance is to ask for a Celebration of the Eucharist at the funeral, for which our revised Book of Common Prayer makes provision. Indeed, this is something that all of us should seriously consider whilst we are alive and well. A clear indication of how we want our own funeral to be conducted is, like a properly drawn up will, the least we can do to help our relatives at a time which is bewildering enough without having to worry about which hymns to have and what service to ask for.

Is it morbid to make arrangements for one's own departure? I don't think so . . not if one believes in the Christian Gospel. Besides, one is probably a far better judge of these things than one's relatives will be at the time of their bereavement. It's worth considering.
