## VICAR'S LETTER

## Christian Initiation

Dear Friends.

There has been within the Church of England during recent years much discussion about our policy over Baptism and Confirmation. We in both the parishes will be participating in this discussion by holding a special joint meeting on July 16th at 7-30 in the Badsey Meeting House in order to give our opinions on the following questions:

- 1. Should there be a Service of Blessing for children whose parents cannot in conscience undertake the full Christian commitment required of them at Baptism?
- Should children be admitted to Holy Communion at an early age (i.e. seven years and upwards) before they have been confirmed?
- Should the rite of Confirmation be used more as an opportunity for a mature Declaration of Faith by young adults, rather than as a gateway to Holy Communion by young teenagers?

The reasons for this debate, and for some of the above suggestions, are complex, but are clearly laid out in a pamphlet published by the General Synod, 'Christian Initiation', copies of which are being circulated round the P.C.C.s. I would like to make a few comments on these matters for the benefit of those who do not have the chance to read the literature.

#### Service of Blessing

It is no secret that a number of parents, whose church membership is no more than nominal, come to clergy with the request to have their children baptised. Clergy are faced with the hard decision whether to baptise the infant, knowing that the parents are perjuring themselves when they make the explicit promises to bring their child up as an active member of the church or whether to refuse to baptise on the grounds that the parents are not in a position to make such a promise, and that to allow a baptism in these circumstances is seriously to devalue the sacrament. It has been suggested that a Service of Blessing might be offered, instead of Baptism, to those parents who find that they cannot make the Baptismal promises in good faith. My view is that if parents wish to have their child blessed instead of baptised, and if they fully understand that the Blessing is in no way a Baptism, then I would be happy to comply. In fact, I have already used a Service of Blessing in Badsey in such circumstances. But I do not think I would ever want to push this form of service at parents. Firstly, if it is used without proper understanding it will give rise in years to come to endless confusion about whether a person was baptised or not during his infancy. Just imagine having to rely upon Aunt Mabel's word for it that 'our John was done in that church down the road from where they lived in Isleworth'. So long after the event no one will recall exactly whether it was a Baptism, a Dedication or a Blessing. The second reason why I would hesitate to push this ceremony of Blessing at reluctant parents is that however weak I may judge their own commitment to Christ, I must remember that it is not my judgement that ultimately counts, and that it is the baby whom I am being asked to baptise, not the parents. Like my colleague the Vicar of Hampton, I would not hesitate to confront parents with their responsibility, but, also like him, I would never, except in very unusual circumstances, refuse to baptise a parishioner.

# Confirmation and Holy Communion

Confirmation combines two elements: a Declaration of Faith on the part of the candidate, and the bestowal of God's Grace enabling him to become a full member of the Church, and hence a communicant. Many people believe that these two elements should be separated so that full communicant status can be conferred upon a child after appropriate instruction (but not before he is seven years old), with a Declaration of Faith when he has reached maturity (say, eighteen years or older). Some people feel that it is unfair to demand of a young teenager that he make a declaration of lifelong commitment at such a tender age. On the other hand they hold that if the child is already a regular churchgoer it is equally unfair to withold the sacrament of Holy Communion from him until he is adult. There is no reason why reception of Holy Communion should not precede a full adult understanding of its meaning (indeed, does any adult ever understand the meaning of the sacrament in all its fulness?) Against these arguments for a change in our present practice we must consider the sort of anomalies which such a change might cause. We might find in some years to come the development of three classes of adult Christian: those who have been baptised, but who have not proceeded to Communion or Confirmation; those who have been baptised and who during childhood became communicants, but never proceeded to adult Confirmation; and those (an elite?) who have progressed through all three

I know that I have done less than justice to the subject in such a brief space, but I believe that people should be aware of what the P.C.C.s. of our two parishes will be discussing on the 16th, and I hope these comments, inadequate as they are, will give an indication. If anyone wants to see the arguments properly set out, I will gladly see that he gets a copy of the relevant pamphlet.
