The following Letter from the Archbishops was read in our parish churches at the main service on Sunday, October 19th. It is to be read against the background of the TV and Radio broadcasts made by Dr. Coggan during the week preceding the 19th.

A PASTORAL LETTER FROM THE ARCHBISHOPS

The Archbishops of Canterbury and York hope that you will regard this letter as a personal one from themselves to you. They are asking that it be read in all Churches today because they believe that there is a great body of seriously-minded men and women who are deeply concerned, not only about the economy of our nation, but about its spiritual condition.

During the last few days you will probably have shared through the media something of what we have been trying to say at this critical time. We have posed such questions as these – "What sort of society are we looking for?" and "What kind of people are needed for the creation of this society?".

We Christians believe that God reigns and that he cares about the nations.

We believe that he has demonstrated his concern in the life, teaching, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

We believe that his Spirit is operative today doing. his recreative work in individuals and groups.

If however a responsible society is to come into being everyone must realise that he counts and that his contribution matters.

The time has therefore come when we feel it is our duty to call all Christian people

(i) to pray steadily, persistently and intelligently for our nation.

(ii) to think seriously about our society in the light of what we believe, asking such questions as "What sort of society do we want?" and "What sort of people do we need to be in order to achieve it?".

(iii) to co-operate with Christians of every allegiance,

and with any others who are are willing to be associated with us, so as to influence society in a positive and helpful way.

(iv) to live out the faith we profess, that God reigns and

We therefore invite you as members of your local congregation to take seriously God's call to God's people in God's world, and to go on and work out in further detail in the next few months, what this will mean for yourself, your home, your parish and the community where you live and work.

The Harvest Festival and Supper

Harvest Festival was held on the first Sunday in October, and the Church was decorated for the occasion with an abundance of fruit, flowers and vegetables. The services were well attended, especially by the youngest generation, and we had a full choir for both the sung services. On the Monday following a band of volunteers parcelled up the produce and delivered the harvest gifts to a number of elderly and housebound parishioners.

The Harvest Supper was held this year in the Village Hall and took the form of a 'sit down' meal followed by some fairly vigorous country dancing under the leadership of Mr. Tex Blomfield of Evesham. Altogether a hundred and twenty-five people, young and old and in-between, enjoyed the occasion. Very many thanks to the anonymous donors who made generous contributions both in cash and food, and also to Mrs. Bell and her team of helpers who worked like beavers to prepare the meal. Thanks, too, to Mr. Mustoe for arranging the licence, and to him and Mr. Don Walker for kindly lending a large quantity of cutlery and plates.

The Meeting House

As most of you already know, we have now ceased to rent the Meeting House from the Society of Friends who own the building. The Parochial Church Council decided not to renew our annual agreement with the owners for two reasons: first, the owners want to sell the building and although they kindly offered us 'first refusal', we could not afford a sum anywhere near the sort of price they could reasonably expect. Secondly, even if we could raise the money to buy the hall, the P.C.C. considered that we would never be in a position to maintain it on the proceeds of lettings alone (on average we have been faced with an annual deficit of £100 over the past ten years, and we have had to make this good by taking money from the P.C.C. account). The only way to break even in running a hall is to hire it out nightly and to supplement income from lettings with money raised by bingo or dances ... and we did not think it was right or practical to follow a policy which would put us in competition with the Village Hall up

Since the end of September when our tenancy expired, all those groups who hired the Hall on a regular basis have been or will be accommodated elsewhere; the Sunday School in Mrs. Goldstraw's school-room; the M.U. in the Church; the Young Wives in the Village Hall; the Sixty Plus Club in the Legion Club; the Chrysalis Club in the Recreation Club's old building. The Youth Club has arranged with the Society of Friends to continue to use the hall until alternative premises are found.

Sister Susan Andrew

Unfortunately Sister Andrew was not able to visit us on Sunday, October 12th, when she was going to give us an illustrated talk on the work of the hospital in Mozambique where she works and with which we have connections through our overseas project. The Government of Mozambique has recently passed a new law to the effect that any foreigner who leaves that country for a period of more than ninety days might forfeit his or her re-entry permit. This meant that Sister Andrew had to return to Maciene before October 12th. She asked that her apologies for this unavoidable turn of events be forwarded to the congregation; she was very disappointed not to be able to meet us.
