VICAR'S LETTER-

Dear Friends,

The Review

In a former issue I toid you how we were now looking for a successor to Mrs. Sears as Business Manager of the Parish Review. I am delighted to say that the search is over, and that Miss Jean Dyke has agreed to take on the job. I am so grateful, and relieved, that she has accepted it, as I know that we can be sure that the production of the Review can continue as smoothly as before.

You will have noticed that the Inset, 'The Sign', has changed its shape, with the consequence that it no longer fits the shape of our Review. We are sorry about this. as it is far tidier to have the Inset stapled into the middle of the Review than to have it folded loose. However, the decision to alter the format lay with the publishers...and so please don't blame us or Mr. Knight our printer!

Joint Services

The Church Councils and clergy of the seven parishes, in this district have decided to hold a joint Evensong on the fifth Sunday in the month whenever that occurs. The parishes concerned are: Cleeve Prior, the two Littletons, Offenham, Bretforton, Badsey-with-Aldington, and Wickhamford. The idea is that each parish will take its turn to act as host, and that the others will suspend their evening service on that day, so that the congregations may join each other in a joint act of worship. It is hoped that as many of our congregation as possible will take this chance to join other members of the local Christian Family. On February 29th there will be no evening or afternoon services in Badsey and Wickhamford, but, instead, we shall be going to Bretforton at the invitation of their Churchwardens and P.C.C. If you want or can give a lift, please tell the Vicar or Churchwardens; there should be no shortages of places in cars going from our three villages. Cars will pick up passengers at 6-0 from the Church (Badsey) and from the Sandys Arms (Wickhamford).

Lent Lectures

The Bishop of Worcester will give a series of lectures and lead discussion on the subject, 'Being a Christian in the 1970s'. These will take place at Prince Henry's High School on the five Wednesdays (March 10th, 17th, 24th, 31st, April 7th) in Lent. They will begin at 7-30 p.m. and it is expected that each session will end at about 8-45 p.m. These lectures have been arranged by the Evesham Council of Churches. On the 24th March the Bishop will be unable to attend, but discussion will take the place of the lecture that evening. If you want to go to this course (and I warmly recommend the opportunity to hear our Bishop) please tell the Vicar if you can offer or if you require a lift.

Maurice Bradey

Yorkshireman by birth and upbringing, Maurice Brady spent most of his life in Badsey, having come here

to live and work in this village in the 1920s. For nearly fifty years he and his wife, Irene, lived in their house in the Bretforton Road. He was much in demand during his younger days as a singer and entertainer at Social events. Throughout his life he was a keen painter in water colours, inheriting from his mother his artistic talent. A loyal Churchman, he had been for some years a member of the Church Council and a sidesman, and he did not let age stop him from walking to Church from his home at the Eastern end of the Bretforton Road, a distance which would inhibit many younger but less persevering Christians. His many friends will miss his presence. His widow is assured of our loving prayers in her sudden bereavement.

Harry Stewart

Harry Stewart was so much part of Badsey, so well known as a Vale Grower and Farmer and connected with so wide a range of local activities, that anything written in this brief tribute will seem inadequate for the occasion especially in the eyes of those who knew him. However, there are some who having moved into this village during the last few years will not have known him before his illness. He had been born and bred in Badsey, and together with his brothers he built up one of the largest firms of Growers in the district. At one time the firm had forty men working for it, farmed (apart from other land) four hundred acres of Brussels sprouts and ran its own bus to take the men up to the fields on the hills, in some cases as far as Guiting. Harry Stewart was much involved in local government, being a County Councillor, a member of the Evesham Rural District Council and Chairman of the Parish Council. He was a keen member of the Church and was for many years a member of the Parochial Church Council and a Churchwarden. There are many organisations in the village which at one time or another have been helped by his generosity, and certainly many in-dividuals who have cause for gratitude. To take just one example, it was he who saw to the clearing of the site for the new Churchyard extension and who had the stone wall built along the Eastern boundary after the demolition of the old cottages ('Sharp's Row'). Harry Stewart was the last of seven brothers to die, and with his death another chapter of Badsey history is concluded. May he rest in peace.
