#### FOR THE TWENTIETH TIME....

Christian Aid Week this year is from 17th to 22nd May. It will be the 20th successive campaign since 1956 when the churches made their first united appeal to the general public on behalf of the world's neediest people. For the first few years the campaign concentrated on the rehabilitation of refugees in Europe, the Middle East, Hong Kong and Korea. This period culminated in World Refugee Year when Christian Aid raised more money for refugee programmes than any other organisation in the world.

Then came the Freedom from Hunger Campaign and a broadening of Christian Aid's focus and function - today embracing the victims of endemic poverty as well as of war, persecution and natural disasters.

Since its institution in 1956 Christian Aid Week:—

- \* has brought the churches together for joint action in over 2,000 areas of England, Scotland, Wales and Ireland, leaving a legacy not only of Christian Aid committees but in many areas local councils of churches where none existed before;
- \* has raised a total of nearly £20 million for development and rehabilitation programmes the majority of, them administered overseas by churches and missions;
- \* has given its name to what is now a major development agency - which in 1964 changed its name from Inter-Church Aid and Refugee Service to Christian Aid:
- \* is the source of half Christian Aid's yearly income, which last year was £4,206,935 (£2,474,837 from Christian Aid Week).

Once again this year the campaign posters, literature, fundraising and display materials, reflect Christian Aid's development policy of working in partnership with the poor themselves. And once again Christian Aid asks local church people to offer themselves as campaign helpers in that same spirit of partnership.

The money raised will be spent on projects of selfsupport for the individual through agriculture, trade and small industries, and development of local communities through health, welfare and education programmes.

The catalogue of his activities has already been set out in the Obituary notice in the Evesham Journal. His work on the Flower Show Committee, for the British Legion, for the Church, and for a number of other organisations is well known. But valuable as all this certainly was, it was the man himself we valued most. We send our deepest sympathy to his widow in her bereavement.

#### Lilian Mary Hatcher

Lilian Hatcher (nee Careless) had lived in Badsey most of her life, having moved here with her parents from South Littleton. In 1926 she married Alec Hatcher and for many years she helped him on his market garden land. During recent years she had been in poor health, and was admitted to hospital a few weeks before her

death. Over the years her family have been connected with the Church: her mother, Mrs. Careless, at one time played the Church organ, her husband in his youth was a chorister, and her son, Maurice, was a chorister in the time of Canon Allsebrook. #### Footnote

The following extracts from 'The Times' may be of interest to those whose work involves a lot of footslogging:

The Russians have invented power-assisted boots, and my Moscow correspondent assures me it is not a belated April fool joke. The breakthrough, reported in Pravda, has been made at an institute of aviation.

The prototype is a pair of canvas boots with the heels hinged to the soles. Clamped to each heel is a small internal combustion engine with a 100-gram petrol flask. The compression of the cylinder produces a kick by the heel that propels the wearer on a forward leap of more than three metres—the hottest thing since seven-league boots.

The inventors claim that anyone should be able to cover 25kilometres in an hour on only 70 grams of petrol. They add, though that the device has yet to be vetted by physicians, and it is hard to predict how easily people will adapt to the strange foatwear.

They are preparing to test the boots first on artificial legs which will simulate the human stride, then on volunteer walkers. Pravda thinks the invention could be of use to shepherds with large flocks, and rural postmen with long routes. Anticipating scepticism, the paper makes the point that almost every technical advance is greeted with derision initially.
