VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

In 1972 I said that I wouldn't...but I did. In 1976 I said that I wouldn't on any account sit through it all again...but here I am in the fourth week of July night after night glued to the television set, mesmerised by the Olympics. I confess that I have fallen once more into the thrall of Frank Bough and his team of eloquent commentators as they guide us through the manifold delights of the Montreal Games.

Some of you may be bored out of your minds by the whole Olympic ballyhoo, but I suspect that most of you, like me, have not been able to resist the fascination of so much athletic excellence concentrated into one place and one time. It's not that I am normally attracted by sport; in fact, I usually have to make a conscious effort to remember who is playing whom in the Test, or which side scored the winning goal in the Cup Final, and for many years I continued under the illusion that Maserati was the name of an Italian racing driver. who kept winning in a car called a Fangio.

No, it is not the names or the statistics that draw me night after night, nor is it the scoreboard of medals (though it would be rather nice for 'La Grande Bretagne' to win a gold from time to time). What is so compelling is the sheer excellence of achievement, the combination of brain and muscle, of concentration and endurance, of brilliance and guts which go to make an Olympic athlete.

During the same week our television sets showed us another, quite different, example of excellence: the landing of the American spacecraft on Mars. Here we were being shown pictures of that distant world, pictures so clear that they revealed the individual stones on the planet's surface. And yet the whole operation of landing the craft and the delicate manoeuvres which followed were being controlled at a distance so great that it was taking the radio waves fifteen minutes to travel across the intervening space. What an achievement of human ingenuity! Even if the results of the scientific tests carried out on Mars should be of no practical use whatever, surely the effort was wonderful.

How does one measure the value of human achievement in the fields of scientific exploration, of sport, of music or of architecture? Surely not by the meagre standards of practicality. Nadia Comenici circling and twisting around the asymetrical bars, the scientists putting a spacecraft on Mars, Yehudi Menuhin playing Mendelssohn's Violin Concerto, Abbot Lichfield ordering the Bell Tower to be built in Evesham...such different people and so varied their achievements, and yet they all have this in common: they have done something very beautiful and quite useless, and they have done it surpassingly well.

It will be a dismal day when we Christians become so jaundiced by the obvious failures of mankind that we can no longer applaud the equally obvious successes. Should we not thank God and praise Him for so much excellence of human achievement ... even if the achievement is of no practical value? After all, it is precisely these 'useless' successes which help to unite the human race and divert its attention from more practical and divisive concerns.

The experience of working together in sporting, scientific or artistic pursuits is one of the most fruitful ways of bringing about a real sense of unity and fellowship in living in community.

Badsey is fortunate and wise in having a number of activities and clubs which bring residents together in cooperation and friendly rivalry through different interests and pursuits. One hopes that as the population expands so will this development of an active and happy community life flourish and grow.
