# THE DIOCESAN QUOTA

The word 'Quota' is frequently on the lips of Church Treasurers at this time of year ... and it is uttered in a variety of tones, ranging from distaste to despair. What is it, this 'Quota' which seems to play so large a part in our discussion of Church finances?

It is the annual amount contributed by each parish to Diocesan funds, so that the Diocese can (a) support the stipends of the parish clergy, (b) maintain clergy housing, (c) provide an advisory service to the parishes.

It is, in brief, a tax levied by the Diocese on the parishes. Like other taxes it may be nasty, but it must be paid. Otherwise, more cuts in clergy manpower will be inevitable; more cuts, that is, than those already envisaged.

How much do we have to pay? In 1976 Badsey's Quota requirement was £964; Wickhamford's was £368. Both parishes met their requirements in full. In the current year all the parishes in the diocese are going to have to find between them 28% more to cover the corresponding increase in the Diocesan Budget. This is a bigger rise than the current rate of inflation, and is partly explained by the necessary increase in the diocesan contribution to clergy stipends and housing, and partly by the need to repay the substantial overdraft which has accumulated in the Diocesan Stipends Account over the past few years. In other words the Diocese has not been able to pay its way during recent years; the time to make up the deficit can be delayed no longer.

How is each parish assessed? This used to be done in the same way as Income Tax: the higher a parish's income, the more it was required to contribute to the Diocese. Such a means of assessment meant that some lazy parishes which did not attempt to increase income were being carried by the more industrious ones which were taking their responsibilities more seriously. The new way of assessing the amount of Quota payable by a parish avoids that unfairness by using not the actual income, but the 'potential' income; i.e. the income which that particular parish can reasonably be expected to achieve, taking into account a wide range of local factors. These local factors include population, nature of housing (for example the ratio of Local Authority housing to Private housing), 'Earning power' of the population (e.g. the proportion of pensioners and young couples to the middle aged), the pattern of church attendance, and so on. I believe that this way of assessing Quota is fair, because it places the heavier burden upon the shoulders of those parishes which are, or should be, able to carry it.

Finally, here are two useful figures to remember: Out of every £1 which you give in the Collections on Sunday, about 50p. is passed on to the Diocese. And of that 50p. about 30p. is used for Clergy pay and housing.

# A Lent Course
