Ascension Day

As you will see from the schedule of Church Services we shall be holding a combined service in Wickhamford Parish Church on Thursday, May 19th, at 7-30 p.m., to celebrate the Ascension of Our Lord. It is hoped that our congregations will make every effort to be present on what is one of the Major Feasts of the Church's Year. The service will be a Eucharist, and afterwards the congregation will be invited to go to the Hall for a cup of coffee. This will now be the sixth time the seven parishes in our 'group' have held a combined service (apart from the Lent Course).

The Gospel, The Cinema and TV

Many of you will have seen all, or perhaps part, of the recent ATV film on the life of Jesus Christ. I only managed to see the last two hours (it lasted six hours altogether - in two parts. broadcast on successive Sunday evenings), but what I did see made me regret that I was unable to see it all. The trial scene, the Crucifixion, and the Resurrection were all very well enacted, and it seemed to me that this film managed to catch the truth of the Gospel in a way which has eluded so many earlier attempts to film the life of Our Lord.

I must confess that I used to love the old Biblical epics, as produced by Cecil B. de Mille and others, but like most people, I enjoyed them because they were such excellent spectaculars, not because I believed they conveyed much by way of the Truth. They also contained some splendid moments of unintentional humour; for example, there was the scene in one of the more turgid epics when Sodom and Gomorrah were being demolished by the most tremendous display of Divine Wrath. and one of the actors was heard to say in a pause be-tween the thunderclaps and crash of falling masonry, 'Don't worry, dears, it's just one of our summer storms.'

Another treat afforded by the old Hollywood Biblical epics or quasi Biblical epics (Quo Vadis, Ben Hur, The Robe) was the appearance of well known actors in wildly improbable roles; for example, John Wayne, who in a film of the life of Christ (shown recently on TV, but not at all in the same class as the ATV production) turned up unexpectedly, dressed as a centurion, evidently ill at ease without his holster and six-shooter. But for me, at any rate, the show was always stolen by the mad emperor. It was usually Peter Ustinov doing his impersonation of Nero, though not always. 'The Robe' (early 'Cinemascope') lives in my memory because of the horribly mad Caligula, who so overacted his part that Richard Burton (fresh from the Old Vic and Stratford) hadn't a chance to keep up.

It was all very entertaining, but what it had to do with the Truth of the Gospel, or the Word of God in the Scriptures, I would not like to say.

But now something quite different seems to be happening. We have recently seen on our screens on Palm Sunday and Easter Day a film of the Gospel produced by one of the heavyweights of Show Business, Lew Grade himself. The script writer, the director, the actors and actresses, whatever their own beliefs may be, succeeded in conveying a credible account of Jesus Christ. There may have been details in the film which you did not entirely agree with, but the central character, Jesus. came across to me more convincingly than in any earlier film.

It is. I think, interesting and signficant that 'Show Business' can now depict Jesus without either sentimentality or cynicism; and if 'Show Business' is an accurate reflection of public taste, then things must be looking up, mustn't they?

A veteran of the South African War, Alfred Anker's life spanned nearly a century of English history; as a teenager he was present at the celebration of Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee, and he lived to see the Silver Jubilee of her great - great - grand-daughter. When he came to Badsey he worked for many years for the Bakery, and at one time was a familiar sight in the countryside around driving his horse-drawn delivery van. In old age he used to walk with a pronounced stoop, and would push his bike along beside him as a walking aid. It is thus that many of the parish will remember him. May he rest in peace.
